This will include three separate con tracts and materials which the city will purchase direct. The main contract will be in the neighborhood of \$200,000.

TAXABLE, DECLARES KOZER Baby buggies and invalid chairs are the only vehicles that are exempt from registration and licensing provisions of the state motor vehicle act, according to information which Secretary of State Sam A. Kozer sent to the Portland city officials today. This means that the state will insist on the payment of the vehicle tax on approximately 160 municipally owned and operated vehicles. The notice sets forth that "only United






