

RECALL ORATORS FLAY COMMISSION AND BIG UTILITIES

With 500 or more people in attendance at the recall meeting held in the Auditorium Wednesday night, and with Dan Kellaher, Peter D'Arcy of Salem and W. S. U'Ren to supply the fireworks, the public service commission, the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, Portland Gas & Coke company and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company received a combined dressing down that seemed to meet with the hearty approval of the audience.

KELLAHER FLAYS ACT

Kellaher, who as state senator bitterly fought the enactment of the public service commission act, sketched the history of that law, contending now, as he did then, that it was a statute "born in iniquity and conceived in sin" and had been put on the statute books for the purpose of providing machinery "by which the people of the state could be robbed." He said he had lived long enough to see his predictions come true and that he had not lost his desire or intention to see it put out of business. He attacked Fred Williams, chairman of the commission, who, he pointed out, had ridden into office on the slogan that "8 cents is too much for a 1-cent ride" and had then got out of the jurisdiction while the commission raised the rate to 8 cents so far as streetcar fares were concerned.

SQUARE DEAL ASKED

D'Arcy told his audience that the public service commission ought to be compelled either to give the public a square deal or to face the recall, and he contended that the commission had assumed the role of being master of the people rather than servant. It is stated by Robert G. Duncan, chairman of the Public Service Recall Committee, Inc., which is fathering the movement to recall Fred Williams, that the work of securing signatures to the Williams petition "is over the divide" with more than 26,000 signatures now in the hands of the committee. He also says he expects to receive some 4000 additional signatures today. Sufficient finances have been furnished the committee to put hired solicitors in the field, Duncan says, and he adds that there is no doubt about the recall being "put across" without difficulty.

Rose Growers Are Warned That Aphid May Get Foothold

Rose growers beware the green aphid! This is the warning sounded Wednesday by Walter H. Gerke, city arboriculturist, who says present weather is favorable to rapid development of the aphid pest and that it is appearing in many sections of Portland, with prospect of great damages to roses unless closely watched and suppressed. Gerke advises spraying with "Black-leaf 40," applied when there is no rain or mist. He says this should be mixed with soap in the proportion of two ounces of soap to five gallons of spray.

Moon Will Go Into Shadow of Earth For Total Eclipse

Regardless of clouds and rain, the moon, earth and sun will be in line tonight and a lunar eclipse will take place. It may not be visible in Portland because of the weather, but in all parts of the northern hemisphere where the skies are clear the shadow of the earth will envelop the moon. The first contact of the shadow with Luna is scheduled for 10:03 and the last contact is fixed at 2:32. From 11:23 until 12:05 the eclipse will be total.

Chicken-Raising May Go On Inside the City, City Council Rules

Diligent investigation has failed to disclose to the Portland city commissioners any city of size in the United States that has prohibited the keeping of chickens within its borders, and the commissioners feel that it would be use-

less for Portland to undertake such legislation.

This information was given Wednesday to folk who had gathered in the council chamber to urge prohibitive legislation and who set forth in graphic manner their sufferings from crowing roosters and cackling hens, and from the effluvia of poultry yards near their domiciles.

The council told the protestants that actions on individual cases as nuisances could be taken, and that investigation would be made of particular locations of which complaints had been made.

Mexican Bandit Is Beaten, Says Report

Del Rio, Texas, April 21.—(U. P.)—An end of the activities of General Murgula, rebel chief in the Burto mountain district of Mexico, west of here, was believed assured today following news received by Mexican Consul Jose M. Montemayer that a detachment of federal troops had clashed with Murgula forces in the mountains and defeated them.

Auto Bandits Hold Up Cashier's Car And Take \$25,000

Chicago, April 21.—(I. N. S.)—Five armed automobile bandits today held up John S. Amberg, vice president, and Norton F. Stone, cashier, of the Scheu-ber-Amberg State bank, and escaped with \$25,000 in cash.

Amberg and Stone were in an automobile conveying the cash to the Union Trust company when the bandits halted their car, compelled the bank officials to enter the robbers' machine, drove them several miles from the scene of the robbery and then dumped them out. The money was mostly in \$5 and \$10 bills.

8 More Arrested For Million Dollar Toledo Mail Robbery

Detroit, Mich., April 21.—(I. N. S.)—Surrounding a cottage at 360 East Mont-calm street late Wednesday night, fed-

eral agents and a squad of city detectives arrested eight persons, four men and four women, for alleged complicity in the \$1,000,000 Toledo postoffice robbery, February 17. The suspects were taken as they left the dwelling to enter a large touring car.

With the capture of the alleged robbers here, 36 persons now have been arrested or indicted in connection with the Toledo robbery.
