BUTTER EXPORTS

Market for butter is showing one of those tones that is hard to forecast the future. Immediate course of prices appears to be on a steady basis, with outside demand sufficient to hold values uncharged.

It develops that much of the strength of the California trade has been due to the liberal ex-port demand for butter. For one week alone San Francisco showed exports of \$7,380 pounds, or a total of 727,152 pounds since January 1, compared with \$10,746 pounds for the same period a year ago.

period a year ago. Burprising exports of butter to South America are shown. For one week they show a total of 31,250 pounds, while both Mexico and Panama were buyers. Alaska also figured in the San Francisco exports and it is wondered why the local trade is not participating. As long as Puget Sound is able to absorb the surplus stocks of butter at Portland, the trade is likely to remain good.




