

DAUGHERTY GIVES HIS VIEWS UPON DRY ENFORCEMENT

Washington, April 22.—It appears that the trials and tribulations embraced in prohibition enforcement are to fall largely upon the shoulders of the department of justice. Secretary of the Treasury Mellon has indicated that it is his purpose to recommend a construction of work under Attorney General Daugherty, and while Daugherty does not anticipate the responsibility with any keen eagerness, he is not, he says, "running away from it."

It was interesting, therefore, to get from Daugherty some of his views upon the prohibition enforcement situation as it exists in the country today.

In the first place, while sure that Mellon would be glad to relieve him of the burden now placed upon him in sharing through the internal revenue commissioner under him, the responsibility attached to keeping the country "dry," Daugherty believes that before his department can be handed the burden, congress must act in the matter.

FALSE PERMITS BILK PUBLIC
Meantime, however, apparently in anticipation of falling heir to this new and troublesome duty, Daugherty is making a broad study of the various phases to the problem. Already he has discovered two things:

First—That some one, or more, are carrying on a profitable trade in liquor permits in which the parched public is being bilked.

Second—That the larger cities in the country are finding their courts swamped with prohibition business and some relief must be effected.

Third—That state action toward prohibition enforcement can be made "very helpful."

On the first point Daugherty had the following to say:

"Sales of permits for liquor are being fraudulently made in New York and elsewhere. The claim is being made by those selling these permits that they can be obtained from the department of

justice. Of course this department has nothing to do with the issuance of such permits and the people interested are being deceived. We are investigating these sales now."

COURTS MUST BE HELPED

On the second point, the matter of prohibition cases clogging the courts in large cities, where numerous cases of more importance are pending, Daugherty declared he has ordered a careful inquiry to see what might be done to relieve the situation. He believed that in such cities as New York, Chicago, St. Louis, Detroit, Kansas City, San Francisco, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Indianapolis, some measures of relief would have to be afforded the courts soon.

He was not sure as to the exact remedy to be applied but he stated that he was investigating whether there could not be established through congressional authority in the leading cities, a commissioners court, inferior to the existing courts in status, to try nothing but prohibition cases.

Congress, he explained, would have to endow the courts with their necessary powers and permit their summoning judges. Judge Goff, assistant to Daugherty, is working on the problem and he has advanced the possible alternative of increasing the number of federal judges in congested districts.

Yap Is Essential To American Aims, Says U. S. Admiral

Washington, April 22.—Success of the American contentions against Japan for the internationalization of the island of Yap is indispensable to American commercial as well as strategic aims, in the Pacific, Admiral William S. Benson declared today.

Admiral Benson was chief of operations during the war and is a recognized authority on naval strategy. He also is a member of the international communications congress which has under consideration the disposition of the former German cables, including those which operate through Yap.

"Yap is the only connecting link across the Pacific by which we can secure cable communications with China and our island possessions," said the admiral. "By reason of great depths in the Pacific, which do not permit unlayed cables, it is necessary under present conditions for our cable messages to be sent through foreign offices where, of course, they can be read by foreign interests."

"If Yap were internationalized we could maintain our cable relay station there, and uninterrupted communication from the United States to Pacific possessions as well as China could be secured."

"Business secrets and such messages

as our military policy demand could thus be kept free from foreign inspection."

Weeks Restates Plea For 183,000 Soldiers

Washington, April 22.—(L. N. S.)—Secretary of War Weeks Thursday appeared before the house subcommittee considering the army appropriation bill and restated his position in favor of an army of 183,000 men. An appropriation for an army this size, he said, would support the nine army corps project and provide for replacements for discharges, thus maintaining the forces as already planned.

Catalogues Swamp Postoffice

Harvey Unfit for London Post, Says Senator Harrison

Washington, April 22.—(L. N. S.)—Charging Colonel George Harvey with "pursuing his scurrilous attacks" on former President Wilson when the latter was in "his sick bed" and with "disreputable conduct no respectable journalist would have employed," Senator Pat Harrison (D., Miss.), declared in the senate that Harvey is "unfit" to be American ambassador to London. Harrison accused Harvey of "mendacious, unwarranted, incenseable and scurrilous attacks" on Wilson in Harvey's Weekly.

James B. Shank of Salem Passes On

Salem, Or., April 22.—James B. Shank, husband of Myra L. Shank, city police matron, died here Thursday night after an illness of 12 years. For five years Mr. Shank had been an invalid. He was born in Iowa in 1855 and came to Salem in 1905. He is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mrs. C. W. Cox of Salem, Mrs. J. L. Irwin and Mrs. W. H. Baker of Albany, and two sons, E. R. Shank of Salem and J. V. Shank of Albany.
