New York, April 23.—Caruso walked out through the lobby of the Vanderbilt hotel Friday, charting a course between the plush chairs in which 20 men held drowsy night watches not so long ago waiting to flash the word that he was dead. He waved to the bell boys who hustled big steel tanks up to his apartments on the seventeenth floor only a few weeks ago from which the doctors forced oxygen into his lungs when every feeble heartbeat counted.
