

PRATT DEMURRER IS TO BE ARGUED ON THURSDAY

The demurrer to the indictment of F. B. Pratt, jointly charged with John L. Etheridge and Fred S. Morris of embezzling \$25,000 of the funds of Morris Brothers, Inc., will be argued before Presiding Judge Kavanaugh Thursday morning at 11 o'clock.

Demurrers to the indictments of Etheridge and Morris have already been argued and a decision in all three cases is expected soon.

J. C. JOHNSON ONE OF 15 PLACED UNDER INDICTMENT
J. C. Johnson, former confidential secretary of the Iver J. Roster company, charged with larceny by bailee, was among the 15 persons against whom true bills were returned by the Multnomah county grand jury late Tuesday afternoon. Johnson confessed to taking \$10,000 of the company's funds to give to a lady barber.

Another not true bill was returned against Concilio Lucetti, who stole a Nazareno Scafo. Two of the indictments were secret.

SUIT FILED TO PREVENT EJECTION FROM HOTEL

K. Iijima filed suit in circuit court Tuesday to prevent Clara L. Parson and Hazel E. Crowdon from ejecting him from the Standish hotel, on Washington street, which, he alleges, he was defrauded of.

Iijima claims he owned the lease on the Standish hotel and all of the furniture. This he agreed to trade for a sub-lease on the Harrison hotel and one half of the furniture in the latter hotel. The defendants, he alleges, told him the Harrison hotel was making a profit of \$800 a month. The defendants owned only a third of the furniture and the hotel was bringing in a profit of not more than \$400 a month, he claims.

According to the complaint, Iijima could not read and he signed the contract without knowing what he was agreeing to.

and our diplomatic representative abroad knows in a general way how the allies feel about it.

The German's proposal starts out with expressions of good will and a tone of hopefulness that America may help solve the problem. Concretely the Germans admit a liability to the allies of 50,000,000,000 gold marks, or approximately \$10,000,000,000. They, of course, cannot pay this sum at the present time, so they propose deferred payments extending over a period of 40 years. With interest accumulating, this would make the total German indemnity about 200,000,000,000 gold marks, or approximately \$40,000,000,000. To meet this situation the Germans propose a world loan.

Another thing, however, in the new proposal which has aroused the indignation of the allies is the suggestion

that German industries be permitted to restore the devastated areas of France under a contract between those industries and the German government.

In other words, Germany would at once give her business men a huge order which would mean quick restoration of German industry and would prevent the restoration of French industry. It would give the Germans promptly a revived export trade which would be a splendid basis for her own reconstruction. If there is any restoring to be done with German money that money ought, in the viewpoint of the French government, to go to French firms as a means of encouraging French industry.

EXPERT, SAY ALLIES

The term "fatuous" is applied by the allies to these suggestions from Germany and America will leave no doubt where the allies stand when their viewpoint is solicited by Secretary Hughes, either formally or informally.

The French and British see in the new German proposal an attempt to inveigle President Harding into the role of negotiator. The last paragraph of the German document, for instance, is a confession that the Germans themselves know the reparation proposal will be unacceptable, for they ask the American president to feel free to make any suggestions or any modifications which he may desire in the interest of a world settlement. The Germans appeal to Mr. Harding in a way that they believe will also appeal to American public opinion when the text of the note is published. But the allies believe the United States cannot act merely as a means of transmission and keep from commenting on the proposals.

The French and British would like to see America express a viewpoint that will discourage the German theories of friction between the United States and her associates in the war. It would not be surprising if the change in the situation did not cause the postponement of action on the Knox resolution.

OFFER CALLED CUNNING

Briefly, the French and British do not regard the new German note as a serious indemnity proposal at all, but a cunning attempt to reopen negotiations for a modification of the terms of the entire Versailles treaty, a proposal made under the impression that President Harding is friendly to such a position and that the allies cannot afford to turn down Mr. Harding's suggestions. But the Germans are mistaken. The policy of allied solidarity has already been proclaimed and the United States will give her moral support to the allies in the reparation controversy. The Germans must accept the allied proposals originally made or suffer further occupation of territory on May 1.

The tentative agreement between representatives of the city and the railroads involve:

A clearway of 60 feet on Front street, unoccupied by longitudinal railroad tracks, to be prepared when ordered by the city.

The granting of all reservations asked by the city in respect to streets which the railroads ask to have vacated, both as to overhead viaducts and underground conduits for water and sewage.

The dedication of a strip 10 feet wide for the purpose of widening Front street, this not to occur before the expiration of three years.

The use by the city for park purposes, until needed by the railroads, of block "V," immediately in front of the Union station, and block 112, which is the northernmost of the park blocks.

VIADUCT IS PLANNED

An overhead viaduct on Lovejoy street, to be connected with Broadway bridge at an angle which would carry the extremity of the viaduct over railroad property.

The improvement of Ninth street from the north line of Johnson street to Front street. The vacation of Tenth street from Johnson to Front, but with a connection from Tenth to Ninth by way of Johnson, a triangular strip, to be dedicated by the railroads.

The dedication by the railroads of strips necessary to connect the intersection of such streets as Fourteenth and Thirteenth with Front street.

The construction of a new Union passenger station when needed.

The suggestion that rights of way be reserved for a future bridge across the Willamette was reserved for settlement until the location of the bridge should be more definitely established.

The city council set 10 o'clock of next Friday forenoon as the time for a special session to consider the report.

The special terminal committee meeting was presided over Tuesday by H. B. Van Duser, its chairman, who is also president of the Chamber of Commerce.

BRITAIN ASKS BERLIN TO CLARIFY CERTAIN CLAUSES

London, April 27.—(U. P.)—The British foreign office today asked Berlin to clarify some clauses in her latest reparations offer.

The note indicated that if acceptable explanations of the vague clauses are received, the new proposals will not be rejected outright, but will be taken before the supreme council this week for careful consideration.

Newspapers urge France to study the latest offer with great care before taking military action.

\$100,000 Exhibit Of Imported Rugs Exposition Feature

An exhibit of \$100,000 worth of imported rugs will be one of the features of the "Build a Home" exposition at the Auditorium May 9 to 14. Space for the rug exhibit has been secured by Carozian Brothers and one of the members of the firm will be present during the exposition to explain the methods of rug manufacture in Persia.

More than one-half of the space on the main floor of the Auditorium already has been assigned to building material men and house furnishings, according to Coe A. McKenna, president of the exposition.

Every material entering into the construction and furnishing of the home will be on display and plans for bungalows and houses will be shown for the benefit of prospective builders.

The purpose of the exposition is to educate the public in home building.

"Portland ranks first among the cities of the United States in home ownership and the promoters of the annual 'Home Building' exposition propose to give the city an equally enviable reputation for beautiful homes," McKenna stated.

According to census statistics, 46 per cent of the people living in Portland own their own homes.

PARIS NOTIFIES JUSSEURAND PROPOSAL IS UNACCEPTABLE

Paris, April 27.—(U. P.)—The new German reparations proposals are not acceptable to France, it was stated officially today. Ambassador Jusserand at Washington has been so notified.

Officials were worried today as to the possible course of Britain and Italy. They were too concerned as to what America will do.

Italy does not approve the drastic military measures proposed by the French, and Great Britain is not enthusiastic over them.

Briand will go to London late this week to obtain final approval from the British for a quick advance to Germany.

The note proposed that the allies assist Germany in reconstructing her industry and trade, pointing out that the allies will benefit by such rehabilitation because it would put Germany in a better position to make her payments.

In this same connection Germany asks for an opportunity to compete in the world's markets and seeks the abolition of the restrictions at present imposed on German commerce.

MEDIATION IS DECLINED; MILITARISTS WIN IN FRANCE

Paris, April 27.—America's friendly attempt at conciliation on peace problems was yesterday wrapped up, labeled "Not wanted; returned with thanks," and dispatched back to Washington.

Burning his bridge behind him, Premier Briand, in a theatrical speech in the electrically charged atmosphere of parliament, threw down the gauntlet to his allies and announced that irrespective of the supreme council, France will occupy the Ruhr valley on Monday.

The speech marked Premier Briand's complete capitulation to the Poincare war party, which refuses to listen to any proposition for a compromise even though approved by the United States, without first seizing the richest section of Germany.

Diplomats are frankly astounded that the militarist attitude has triumphed despite President Harding's attempt at conciliation.

Mrs. Rachael Yenney, the doctor's mother, and his brother, Lewis O. Yenney of Walla Walla, were present at the memorial services and will accompany the body to its final resting place in Walla Walla, the doctor's birthplace.
