

JUDGES SEEK TO DISMISS JURORS SOON AS POSSIBLE

Those on Old Panel Are to Be Discharged as Cases Are Disposed Of; New Panel Is Drawn

Not desiring to cause present trial jurors in the federal court great inconvenience by keeping them on jury duty too long at this time of year, the federal judges will discharge them during the coming week, as soon as cases on the calendar are tried.

would materially increase the living cost of the average person. The regular tariff bill, as far as tentatively prepared in sub-committee, has placed tariff duties upon many food and other articles now on the free list. It is understood that Representative Young, Republican, North Dakota, of the sub-committee, confessed that he "didn't know whether there was any free list left or not. He declined, however, to say that he meant there was no free list at all. The Young emergency tariff bill, reported by the senate finance committee, contains unchanged the rates on the original Fordney bill on agricultural products.

WOULD PROTECT DYE
The foreign exchange adjustment clause, before the foreign currency depreciation of more than 66 2-3 per cent was recognized, has been eliminated. This, it has been said, would virtually embargo imports from Italy, Germany, Central Europe and other countries, whose money has declined more than two-thirds in terms of American dollars. An addition asked by Senator Knox was added to protect the American dye industry from dumping of German dye. In the interval between passage of the Knox peace resolution and the regular tariff bill, which will contain permanent dye production.

The Knox amendments extend for six months the war trade board. Permission of the board is required to import foreign dyes or dye elements. The bill proper is for ad valorem duties to be levied on the basis of "foreign home market value," or the "export value," which ever is higher.

BERLIN STEEPED IN GLOOM; UTTER HELPLESSNESS REIGNS

Berlin, April 30.—On the eve of the conference between Premiers Briand and Lloyd George in London today, official Germany was steeped in the blackest pessimism. There is much talk of "the coming catastrophe."

In Wilhelmstrasse and the lobbies of the reichstag there is confusion and a feeling of utter helplessness reigns. Hopes hinged on America are fading every hour because there is no answer from Washington.

American Commissioner Dresel is reported to have expressed himself as very skeptical about action by President Harding in his talks with officials of the foreign office.

The cabinet met last night in the reichstag in what was believed might turn out to be a fateful session. Two currents are running through official Germany. The Independent Socialists and the Social Democrats are creating a sentiment of capitulation and acceptance of the 228,000,000 marks demands. The Democrats and Catholics appear split in two, while the Nationalist parties are said to be for standing pat and let come what will.

The present cabinet, it is declared, is so committed that it could not accept the Paris demands. Therefore an acceptance would necessitate a new government.

Answering inquiries for clarification of her proposals, which come from the British, the German government, it is said, commits Germany to a rejection of the 13 1/2 per cent export tax and is disinclined to raise the interest on the suggested international loan above 4 per cent. In the appraisal of the German mercantile marine delivered to the allies, Germany appears to be willing to reduce her figures from \$7,500,000,000 to \$5,000,000,000.

SALMON PACKERS MAKE 3 CENT CUT IN PRICE OF FISH

New Rate to Be Paid Fishermen Will Go Into Effect When Season Opens Tonight.

Astoria, April 30.—A three-cent reduction in the price to be paid fishermen on the Columbia river for raw fish during the spring fishing season was made this afternoon at a meeting of the Columbia river salmon packers. The rate goes into effect at the opening of the spring season.

The price paid last year was 12 cents a pound, although some of the fresh fish caught in the Columbia river in 1920 was sold at 13 and 14 cents a pound during that time. The new fish rates established today are: Chinooks 9 cents, bluebacks 8 cents, steelheads 7 cents.

The spring season opens at 6 o'clock tomorrow evening. Hundreds took the last test of the spring season and final preparations at the receiving stations have been made for the new pack. The time is six hours later than usual because of the Sunday closing law which affects this district. As usual, the large fleet of small vessels will make the turn of the river about an hour before the opening hour, and according to reports received from the canneries this afternoon, the number to participate in the great industry of the Columbia will surpass that of last year.

Conditions are said to be favorable to both receiver and fisher, although the results of the 3-cent cut in price has been responsible for the calling of a meeting of the fishermen's union this evening. No trouble is expected, however, as the shortage of work along the river has caused the fishermen to have caused the signing of more gillnetters for this season that has been recorded since the shipbuilding era.

PROSECUTOR PAYS HIGH COMPLIMENT TO WOMAN JURORS

Seattle Lawyer Says Gentler Sex Is Balance Wheel; Other Speakers Add Word of Tribute

"After an experiment of 10 years I am prepared to say that women have made good in the capacity of jurors in Washington and that the bar and the bench would strongly oppose any effort to return to the old plan of men jurors only," said Malcolm Douglas, prosecuting attorney of King county, Washington, in addressing a joint meeting of the Oregon Civic league and the Portland Woman's Research club, Saturday at the Hotel Benson.

"The proportion of men and women on our juries averages about 50-50. One of the chief arguments against women jurors is that they have so many foot notions that they are unbusinesslike, emotional and sentimental. The fact of the matter is we have fool men jurors and we have intelligent, noble minded women jurors, and we have no right to make a distinction between them."

"The honors are about evenly divided. Woman's lack of business experience is more than offset by her sense of duty and responsibility. There is nothing a male jury likes to do so well as to bring in a verdict of not guilty in case of a woman who is on trial for the murder of her husband. Whenever there is a beautiful murderess on trial, one is constrained to wonder if the men don't pay more attention to the ankles than they do to the evidence."

Charles Hall, an attorney of Vancouver, paid a tribute to woman's discernment and to her sixth sense, which he said quite balanced any experience or business judgment that a man might have. He declared that since women have political equality in every other sense, it is an actual injustice for them to be denied the right to be jurors. He said he wished the selection of jurors might be made on the basis of intelligence rather than on the basis of being a taxpayer.

Judge W. N. Gattens said that if there was a little more sentiment injected into the administration of the law there would be considerably more justice and that he had always been a champion of the cause of the women jurors as he believed they would bring with them a new and finer feeling into the jury box that would be beneficial to all concerned. District Attorney Walter H. Evans said that women had been sitting on juries ever since they had been mothers and so he felt they were eminently qualified to act as jurors in the courts of the state.

The program was enlivened by remarks by George Beban, the moving picture star, who made a plea for better films, urging people to patronize clean pictures if only to register their protest against the salacious ones.

The singing of patriotic songs was led by Mrs. Lou Gray. A. C. Newell, president of the Civic league, and Mrs. R. H. Sawyer, director of the Research club, were joint chairmen of the day and Richard W. Montague introduced the speakers.

Attorney Sheaths His Golf Clubs to Tackle Legal Task

United States Attorney Lester W. Humphreys' golf clubs will pine for companionship for a few days while their owner digests a 433 typewritten page document which was thrust upon him Friday evening by attorneys for R. P. Butchart and Clark M. Moore. The document is a listing of objections to the legal methods employed by the government attorney during the recent trial of the men, and also to the rulings of Federal Judge R. S. Bean, which were not favorable to the defense. On February 23 Butchart was fined \$5000 and Moore \$2500 for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law in connection with their cement business. When the federal grand jury indictment was drawn several years ago, both men were officers in the Oregon Portland Cement company at Oswego.

Both men have been denied a new trial. Filing of the bill of exceptions is a step toward appeal.

Working Agreement In Building Trades Meeting Opposition

Adoption of a new working agreement between building construction employers and unions represented in the building trades council has met with opposition on the part of the employers' association. The agreement between the unions and employers, which went into effect in May, 1919, expired Saturday and, according to David L. Hoggan, chairman of the newly organized Building Construction Employers' association, it will not be renewed.

Some weeks ago the employers submitted a new wage scale, calling for a reduction of 12 1/2 per cent to the building trades council. An arbitration board, consisting of one representative of the employers, one appointed by the union and a representative of the public, decided upon a 10 per cent reduction of wages, effective May 1.

The arbitration board also recommended the adoption of a working agreement similar to the one which ruled the building industry during the past two years. The employers and the unions accepted the wage reduction and the unions were ready to adopt the proposed agreement, but officials of the employers' association stated that in accepting the award of the arbitration board they were not bound to renew the working agreement.

The building contractors have withdrawn from the General Contractors' association, which was a party to the 1919 agreement, and their new organization is incomplete and not ready to enter into negotiations with the unions, according to O. G. Huggins, manager of the Builders Exchange.

Steel Magnate Denies Government Charge of Unfair Competition Against Corporation.

New York, April 30.—Judge Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, in a statement tonight on the complaint filed against that concern and all subsidiaries by the federal trade commission, alleging unfair competition, declared he "will be glad to have the whole matter fully and carefully considered" and a "final decision reached."

The complaint alleged that the corporation is engaging in unfair competition with the steel industry.
