

## CREED NO CAUSE TO DISCHARGE, SAY SCHOOL DIRECTORS

Further Investigation Is Ordered  
Into Case of Worker Let Out  
on Alleged Religious Grounds.

The school board of Portland went on record Saturday in firm opposition to the discharge of any of its employees for religious reasons. It ordered that the case of deposed Janitor Galvin be returned to Captain George B. Edmonstone, superintendent of properties, for further investigation and report at next Thursday's meeting of the board.

This action was taken after a lively hearing on Galvin's discharge and in which much conflicting testimony arose. It was charged that the man had been discharged from a janitorial position at the Girls' Polytechnic school because he is a Catholic. School officials connected with the case said the discharge was based on long continued dissatisfaction with Galvin's work, brought to a head when Miss Edna Groves, supervisor of domestic science, made complaint that Galvin had refused to sweep up crumbs.

**MISS GROVES DENIES IT.**  
This later was denied by Miss Groves, who said she was speaking of janitors in general and not specifically of Dennis Galvin.

Thomas Mannix, attorney for the janitor, presented a petition signed by 18 teachers of the Girls' Polytechnic school, expressing satisfaction with the man's work, and also one of the same nature from Miss Vesta P. McGuinness, principal of the night school.

The testimony of Dennis Galvin was, in substance, that on April 30, E. F. Stuart, supervisor of operation, handed him a letter discharging him and that he was told he was being discharged under orders from Captain Edmonstone. He said when he pressed Stuart for the reason that he was told: "It is your religion and your nationality."

**DISOBEDIENCE DENIED.**  
Galvin said he had never refused to carry out any orders.

Stuart denied that he had in any manner intimated that the discharge was on religious grounds.

"I did say that he was unsatisfactory to me because of his connection with the Sinn Fein movement, in my conversation with Miss Arnold," said Stuart. "I told him also that I had heard a great deal of comment against him because he was connected with the Sinn Fein, and that I was surprised they were allowed to use the school building in which to hold their meetings."

"I said public opinion was opposed to a man sending his children to a parochial school and that, in he did, he was not entitled to any special consideration from any public institution, but this was all personal and was not connected with the order of dismissal."

Captain Edmonstone stated that a man's religion made no difference to him so long as he performed his duties properly, but that Galvin had caused him considerable trouble and that "with the authority of the board vested in me, and utterly disclaiming religious grounds, I ordered Stuart to discharge him."

There were various witnesses, producing conflicting testimony, and at times there were spirited passages between members of the board and others.

his subject, "What's the Matter With the World." The bishop indicated that he would also include his ideas covering the trouble between American capital and labor as gained in his area, which embraces the manufacturing centers in Ohio and Indiana.

**SEES HIGHWAY.**  
Bishop Anderson has episcopal jurisdiction of the Cincinnati area of the denomination.

Since the inauguration of President Harding the bishop has been called into conference with the nation's chief executive for his views covering European problems. Bishop Anderson deprecates the fact that the United States has lost its prestige with Europe. He said "Europe has a revised estimate of the United States." He is personally grieved "because the statesmen failed to follow the leadership of the American army."

**PRaises SOLDIERS.**  
That the Methodist church has a great part to play in the world's reconstruction program is the belief of Bishop Wilson, who arrived in the city Saturday night, but while doing his part the bishop believes the church should refrain from any political entanglements.

"I am intensely interested in the attitude of this government toward the allies," he said, "and am watching European developments with interest. We must never allow ourselves to become suspicious of those nations or allow any chilling of our friendly attitude toward them."

The bishop, who spent many months overseas during the war, said he could not stand to see the American soldiers criticized. He is high in his praise of the work of the American soldier and also feels that the "attitude of the men of Great Britain is beyond all praise" and that the "attitude of the men of France is beyond description of human speech."

**IN THICK OF FIGHT.**  
For six months during 1918 Bishop Wilson was in command of all the Y. M. C. A. religious work in France, and in that capacity had considerable front line experience. A number of times he was between the artillery of the allies and the enemy.

While inspecting the Italian front with a view to making recommendations for the establishment of "Y" work in the army, Bishop Wilson viewed a battle between the Austrians and Italians from a nearby mountain. Bishop Wilson was the first of the general officers of his denomination to go into the war area, his first trip being in 1917.

**HAS HIS DISTRICT.**  
Bishop Wilson has charge of the New York area of the church which includes New York city and its suburbs, the greater part of New Jersey except the district including and south of Trenton, the state of Connecticut as far east as Hartford, Long Island and the Hudson river valley almost to Albany.

There are three English, one German and one Swedish conference in this area. Because of the large number of immigrants arriving at New York the problem of the church in this area is a great one.

Bishop Wilson was a pastor and presiding elder before his election to the episcopacy in 1904. He served four years in the Chattanooga area as general superintendent of the New York area. He has been secretary of the college of bishops since 1908.

**PREACHES TODAY.**  
Bishop Wilson believes that the problems of the world can be solved through evangelism and to this end he believes Methodism should "address itself to the proper education of its own constituency in this and other countries."

"The church can use its influence in the wise adjustment of the world," he said, "inculcating as far as possible, not the spirit that seeks to demand its rights, as contrasted to the fact that all conditions of peace must rest ultimately upon certain concessions made by all."

Bishop Wilson will preach this morning at the First Methodist church in Cincinnati and tonight at the First Methodist church in Salem.
