

Majority of Sport Writers Select Dempsey to Beat Carpenter Before End of Sixth Round

Beavers Drop Two to Oaks; Fans Aroused

IT SURELY WAS Ascension Sunday for the Beavers. Going up in the air with the first play of the day, they took two sound beatings from the Oaks, 16 to 4 and 8 to 1.

The Oaks made a regular field day out of it. They scored 24 runs and made 30 hits, while the Beavers messed up practically everything that came their way during the first three frames of the first game.

BANNER CROWD SEES GAMES
There was surely plenty of action for the fans, the biggest crowd of the season—6155 of them passing through the turnstiles—had their money's worth in baseball and in the pophite and canteen.

McGrew delayed the game several minutes and delivered an ultimatum to Manager McCredie that he would not play the game unless given a full protection in 10 minutes. During the remainder of the game, cushions and pophotes were thrown onto the field from the grandstand and bleachers. The field looked like the wake of a cyclone.

FANS GO ON RAMPAGE
At the time the trouble started, Oakland had two runners on and one out when Flinn kicked on a ball decision. This started the fans and, when Willie walked after apparently making a three quarter swing at a low one, the fans began yelling and then the shower began. It lasted for several minutes and increased when Knight drove in two runners, putting the Oaks in the lead. The shower died down, but toward the end of the game it began with increased fury.

Oakland scored four runs off Sam Ross in the initial frame of the first game on but one hit. Young messed up a pop-fly from Pinelli's bat, after chasing it into the outfield. Ross booted Kearney and then proceeded to catch Pinelli at third was a trifle slow, and the Oaks had the sacks filled. "Hack" Miller fanned any Willie drove in a single, scoring two men, and Willie scored on White's long fly to Wolfers.

FIVE SCORE IN SECOND
In the second inning, the Oaks ran themselves dizzy, scoring five runs on five hits, two of them on a grand slam. Sid Ross replaced Sam Ross, but he did not seem to fare any better, as the Oaks drove in three runs off his delivery in the second and three more in the third. A wild throw by Young being responsible for three of the runs. Bunched hits and the grand old army came marching in to score four runs off Bill Hickey, who took Sid Ross' place in the fourth.

The Beavers landed on Ernie Allen's delivery for a dozen bingles, but only managed to touch the diamond in the fifth frame when they scored four runs on four bingles, an error and two boots.

SHOWER STARTS IN FIFTH
The Beavers played bang-up baseball in the second game until the fifth, when the "shower" started. They were one run in the lead as the result of singles by Toole and Butler, Kearney's boot and a sacrifice fly by Willie Hickey. Krause, who, by the way, pitched a very nifty game of baseball, allowed but six hits, out, Pinelli beat out a hit to Krug. Kearney sent Pinelli to third on a hit to right field. Cooper hit to Krug, who took for Pinelli at the plate, but the Oak beat the throw. Miller grounded out, and Willie drew a walk, and McGrew drew the ire of the fans. Knight then singled to right field, scoring two runs, and Cox prevented further scoring by making a backward assault catch of a liner from White's bat.

Harold Polson, up to this frame, had pitched great ball, but a sensational one-handed stab by Ike Wolfers up against the left field fence, which was really as remarkable as the catch by Lober made a number of years ago, saved him from being scored on in the second inning.

OAKS MAKE WILD FINISH
In the eighth, Oakland scored two runs, and with two down in the ninth, two walks and a couple of hits and a wild throw gave the Oaks three more tallies. Claude Cooper made a walk, and McGrew in the fourth inning, and there was some nifty fielding throughout the two games.
