SELECTING OFFICIAL BAND

It will be in the nature of a field organization, moving about with the queen and her retinue to the different scenes of the event.

EAGLE BOAT NAMED.

Advice from Admiral Hugh Rodman, commander-in-chief of the Pacific fleet, assures the festival board one division of destroyers, accompanied by the armored cruiser Frederick, which will be in the harbor for the annual event. It is planned to have a navy boat race between the crews of the ships.

Plans for the regatta and boat races are nearing completion. Eagle boat 38, naval reserve training ship stationed in Portland, has been chosen as flagship of the festival. During the entire festival she will be anchored off Stack street and during the regatta will fly the royal flag of the queen.

Albany, Or., May 13.—The anti-Jewish campaign of Henry Ford in his "Dearborn Independent" was scored by the Men's fraternity of the First Presbyterian church at its luncheon Wednesday evening. A resolution passed said that "we deplore the spirit of intolerance manifest toward our American Jewish citizenry and the Jewish citizenry of the world." The resolution also asserted our friendship and high regard for the Jewish brethren within our organization and all others wherever dispersed.

President Harding Unable to Join in Governors' Cruise

Salem, Or., May 13.—President Harding will not be able to accompany the governors of the United States on their trip to Alaska in July, according to a letter received this morning by Governor Olcott in reply to an invitation urging the nation's executive to participate in the junket, scheduled for July 20.

Declaring that it is his intention to visit the West, including Alaska, if possible, during the forthcoming summer, President Harding adds that "it is going to be wholly out of the question for me to get to the west coast so early as the time set for the conference."

M. C. Riley of Madison, Wis., secretary of the governors' conference, wrote that 16 governors have signified their intention to make the Alaska trip, 15 have announced inability to go and five are uncertain.
