

REMONSTRANCES ON STREET OPENING ARE OVERRULED

By unanimous vote, the city council this morning overruled the remonstrances on the opening of Delay street, from Larrabee to Russell street, and ordered that this project proceed.

This action followed a long hearing of the protestants, who had been reduced to 15.4 per cent of the area within the assessment district, as three protestants who own 15.4 per cent of the property within the district withdrew their objections.

The total cost of the proposed street opening is placed at about \$34,000. It will run through a large brick and several smaller frame buildings.

ALLEGED EXCESSIVE PRICES

On the one side, protestants on the Peninsula objected to the assessment reaching that far and they also claimed the prices placed on the properties to be taken are excessive; while on the other side, the owners of property to be taken for the street extension claimed the offer was too small. It was intimated that the matter might be taken into the courts for adjudication as to the just price to be paid for these properties.

City Engineer Laursgaard stated that appraisers' valuation varied greatly, ranging from \$11,000 to \$30,000 on one piece of property.

The Schlager property, a brick structure generally known as the Fisher building, is assessed for \$8,000. The highest valuation placed in it was \$30,000, and the city allowed \$17,000 as the price. The Tension frame buildings and real estate are assessed at \$4,570 and the city allowed \$10,500. The Tensions want \$13,500.

The Weinhard heirs' property is assessed for \$400 and the city allowed \$400, while the A. S. Benson tract is assessed for \$1100 and the city allowed \$400.

PROPOSAL LONG STANDING

The opening of Delay street is a project that has been under consideration for several years, but was held in abeyance during the war period. It was desired in connection with the construction of the extension of St. Johns river road, which was carried through by the county at an expense of \$238,000, so as to give direct access from this road to Larrabee street and the Broadway bridge.

Laursgaard stated that he has been assured by county officials that if Delay

street is opened provision will be made in the next county budget for the paving of the St. Johns river road.

LOW BIDS NAMED ARE ALL

BELOW CITY'S ESTIMATES

When bids for public work were opened at the session of the city council today, the following were found to be the low bidders:

Improvement of Sherrett avenue, from East Eighth to East Ninth streets, Hahn & Rehman, \$2444.10. The city engineer's estimate was \$2745.

Morris street, from East Sixty-eighth to East Seventieth streets, John Grider & Co., \$4402.50. The city engineer's estimate was \$5124.

East Fifty-eighth street, from the south line of Rose City Park to the south line of the Alameda, Hahn & Rehman, \$2315. City engineer's estimate, \$2307.

East Tenth street, from East Third to East Tenth streets, Warren Construction company, \$13,491. City engineer's estimate, \$13,500.

East Twelfth street, from Thompson to Braze streets, municipal paving plant, \$2211.50. City engineer's estimate, \$2781.

PROPOSED ASSESSMENT OF \$21,700 IS HELD ILLEGAL

City Attorney Grant holds that the city is not legally empowered to collect an assessment of \$21,700 from the O-W-R. & N. company for the widening of Gillman street, so as to eliminate the dangerous corner at that street and Third.

The railroad land proposed to be assessed is that located under the bridge approach. Grant holds that the benefits accruing to this property could not possibly be equal to the amount of the proposed assessment, which is about half of the total cost of the project.

Improvement. This decision means that a new assessment district must be formed if the present project is carried through; but a new movement is in progress to secure the widening of Gillman street from Third to Sixteenth streets.

ALL NIGHT THEATRE ISSUE GOES TO COUNCIL JUNE 8

"All-night" theatres will have a respite from city legislative action at least until next Wednesday. The proposed ordinance, regulating these places of amusement, was sent to the city council this forenoon by City Attorney Grant, but a delegation from the Women's Research club asked for a postponement of consideration for one week, as many women interested in the matter are in Pendleton attending a conference of club women. Their request was granted.

The proposed ordinance would prohibit women from entering any show house in Portland after midnight, but if they already are in attendance at that hour they may remain until the close of the performance.

The Oregon Humane society filed with City Auditor Funk today a record of its activities during the month of May, showing 50 cases handled; amount paid for stock sold, \$58.05; collections for feeding animals, \$54.95.

A petition has been filed at the city hall asking for the hardsurfing of East Fifty-fifth street, between blocks 22 and 23, Rose City Park.

11 Coming Back in Caskets for Burial In Old Home Town

Exhumed from the military cemetery at Basile-sur-Meuse, the body of Miss Norrene Mary Royer, who died overseas while serving at base hospital 46, will arrive in Portland Thursday for transshipment to Spokane. Funeral services will be held there from the church of Our Lady of the Lourdes. Miss Stella Brown will represent the hospital unit at the services.

Miss Royer died of influenza while attached to base hospital 46. She was buried in France September 16, 1918. She was a graduate of the Sacred Heart hospital and prior to leaving for foreign duty served at the military hospital at Camp Dodge.

The bodies of 11 soldiers who also died in France are scheduled to arrive, according to advice from Captain Vere Painter of the quartermaster's corps. These bodies will be sent from here to their old homes.

The bodies are those of: Private William L. Polley, Battery A, Tenth field artillery, Auburn, Wash.; Private George R. Wiedorfer, Battery B, 147th field artillery, Chehalis, Wash.; Private Albert S. Turner, Company C, 602d engineers, Or.; Private George W. Zimmerman, Company B, 137th infantry, Woodburn, Or.; Private Fred Kees, First gas headquarters, Pendleton; Corporal Alfred E. Babcock, 224th military police company, Albany; Private Nick Trout, Company C, 318th infantry, Hubbard, Or.; Private Thomas B. Dell, Bakery Company 3, quartermaster's corps, Dryad, Wash.; Private William T. Mullane, Company I, 205th infantry, Tenino, Wash.; Private Frank Mitchell, Company C, 11st infantry, Bay City, Or.; and Private Elmer Mills, Battery B, 147th field artillery, Newberg.

Tell Public More Of Medicine, Plea Made by Dr. Wight

Dr. Otis B. Wight, in a paper read at this afternoon's session of the Alumni association of the University of Oregon Medical school, urged the doctors to keep in closer touch with the newspapers of their towns and cities and to discuss frankly through the public prints and in informal meetings subjects on practice of medicine and surgery which would be of interest to the general public.

He talked to the physicians on practical medical publicity.

Dr. Wight said the physicians had been too reticent in giving out information relative to their activities and that as a result the public often did not know what the medical profession was doing to promote better health conditions.

Several papers were read at the afternoon session.

This morning the physicians attended a clinic at the Good Samaritan hospital. Tonight they will hear Dr. William Ophuls of the Stanford university deliver his lecture on Bright's disease at the Central library. He will deliver the lecture under the auspices of the Noble Wiley Jones lectureship.

Commissioners Fire Five of 20 Janitors Employed by County

The county commissioners, sitting en banc today, discharged five of the 20 courthouse janitors. This was a result of Commissioner Rudeen's investigation of extravagance and waste in watching and cleaning the county building.

The men discharged are: N. Wagner, with the county 11 years; G. Stevenson, with county two years; G. D. Zimmerman, with county eight years; F. B. Freund, with county one month; W. Riedemann, with county one year. Commissioner Hoyt objected to the firing of these five men on the grounds that several had been with the county a long time. Rudeen explained that Wagner did not wish to do janitor work. He has been "boss."

Germany Will Buy Gold From People

Berlin, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—The Reichsbank announced today it would purchase gold from the German people except personal jewelry. The metal will be melted up to apply on Germany's indemnity debt.

OREGON PROHIBIT LAW IS PARTLY BEATEN

Internal revenue laws will be liberated, according to Assistant United States Attorney Flegel, who is handling liquor cases here.

Boss Yuginovich and Cousin Boss Yuginovich, who are also known as Yugin and Yuginovich, were arrested April 23, 1920, three miles east of Boring, by federal prohibition agents. They pleaded guilty to violating the prohibition law at Oregon City and were fined \$500 each.

The officers found two complete stills, 75 gallons of moonshine, 1700 gallons of corn mash and two pints of caramel coloring matter. The stills were warm at the time of the raid, as if they had been recently operated. They were found on a five-acre tract then owned by George H. Bickford of Boring.

BEAN UPHOLDS DEMURRE

After being fined at Oregon City the men were charged with violating the federal internal revenue law by being distillers without paying the proper tax, by operating a distillery without displaying the proper sign and without posting the proper bond with the government. On June 18, 1920, they were indicted by the federal grand jury and on July 12, federal Judge R. S. Bean upheld the demurrer filed by Barnett H. Goldstein, holding that the men could not be prosecuted under the internal revenue law. Judge Bean held that the Volstead act repealed all sections of the internal revenue law which conflicted with it.

The attorney general's office ordered an appeal from Judge Bean's opinion, which was confirmed today by the supreme court. The decision does not prevent the Oregon prohibition director from levying the tax on the defendants, which, according to reports

in the United States attorney's office, are \$2565.55 and \$1440.

MEN GAVE SAME NAME

At the time of their arrest the two men gave the same name, so one of them was given the prefix "Cousin" for court convenience. The government never has prosecuted anyone as the owner of the still.

A few months later these men were arrested near Newberg and gave the names of Bob Ugan and Mike Basich. These men later testified in the federal court that they were employed by John Basich to operate the stills and that he paid their fines. They were fined \$500 each for their work at Newberg. The Newberg still and building were burned to the ground by Jesse Flanders, prohibition enforcement director in Oregon.

John Basich has since been convicted as the operator of the Newberg still and has appealed his case to the circuit court of appeals at San Francisco.

Divorce Is Sought By Spokane Official

Spokane, Wash., June 1.—Charging that his wife has abandoned him and has lived apart from him for more than a year, Dr. Ralph Hendricks, city commissioner of public affairs, has filed suit for divorce from Mamie L. Hendricks. They were married in Cheney, Wash., in 1896, and have two children of age.

Inquiry on Health Service Inaugurated

Washington, June 1.—(U. P.)—The long promised "thorough airing" of the public health service is expected to begin within the week, following appointment today by Senator Penrose of a subcommittee of the senate finance committee, composed of Senators Smoot, Watson and Reed.

Enterprise Youth Is Named as Head of W.S.C. Student Body

Don Stewart of Spokane beat out Harold Roberts of Colfax for vice-president, and in a field of five candidates, Agnes Frial of Waterville was highest for secretary. Harold Eddy of Hillyard, sticker candidate for executive council, won out over a baritone voice and is fond of music.
