 Richard F. Scholz, president of Reed college, will deliver the graduation address. The diplomas will be presented by President Campbell, president of the University of Oregon.



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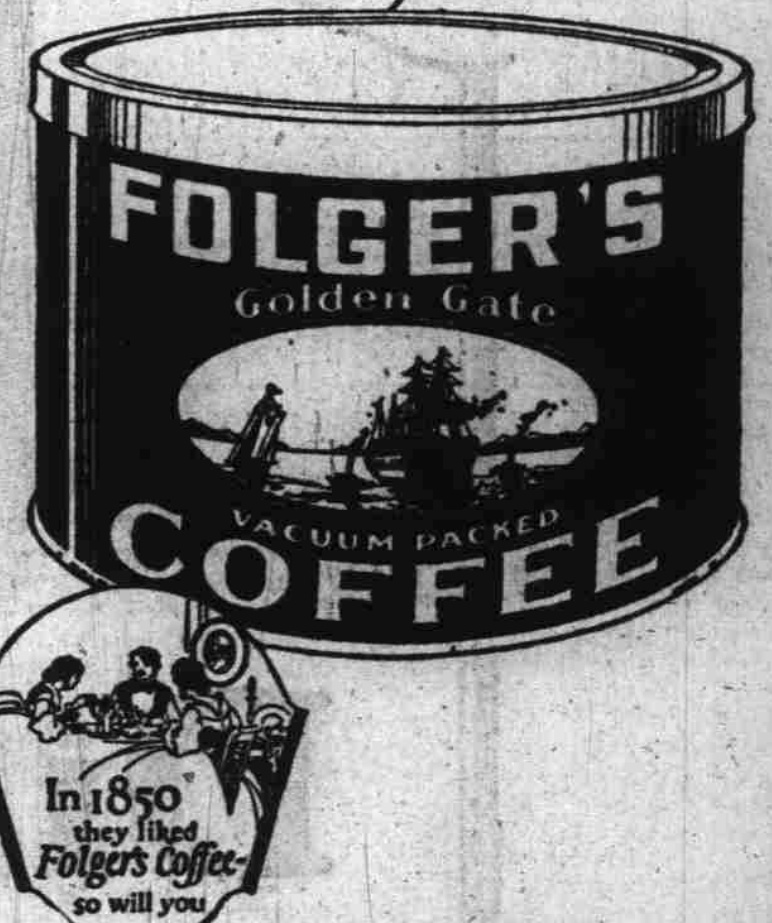
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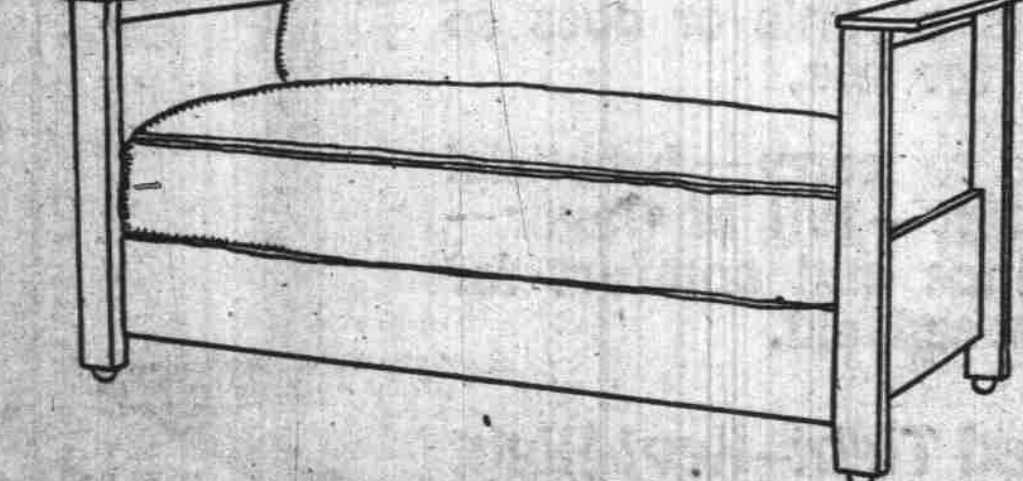
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
