

CITY ASKS THAT PHONE HEARING BE HAD JULY 18

Although the Oregon public service commission designated June 27 as the date for the rehearing on the telephone rate case, present indications are that the hearing will not open until July 18.

After the formal order was issued City Attorney Grant took up with the commission the matter of extending the time of hearing, so as to give more opportunity for the preparation of data to be used in the case. The commission indicated that either July 11 or 18 would be satisfactory, and Grant has now asked for a definite selection of July 18.

The extra time is desired by the city attorney, as investigation of the books of the telephone company was not permitted until after the state commission had issued its formal order, and a vast amount of work has to be accomplished before the city is ready to present its case.

City Attorney Makes Changes
A change has been made in the arrangement of work in the city attorney's office, whereby Deputy City Attorney Robert A. Inlay, recently added to the staff, will assist Deputy Fred Stadler in municipal court work and Deputy E. Y. Lanning will resume work directly in the city hall office.

City Bonds for Sale
Authorization has been given by the city council to City Auditor Funk to advertise for sale municipal improvement bonds in the sum of \$180,000. Bids for these bonds will be opened by the city auditor at 11 o'clock on the forenoon of June 10.

Pipe Contract Let
The city council has awarded a contract to the Peerless Pacific company for galvanized pipe for the water bureau to the amount of \$5752.91, and to Crane & Co. for furnishing corporation cocks amounting to \$2714.15.

To Take Over Streets
The city council at Wednesday's session initiated proceedings for the taking over as city streets certain portions of Jersey street, St. Johns avenue and Kellogg street, heretofore designated as county roads. The matter was referred to City Attorney Grant for preparation.

German Catholic Resolutions Termed 'Wholly Disloyal'

Severe condemnation of the resolutions passed by the Federation of German Speaking Roman Catholic Societies in Oregon is made in a lengthy resolution adopted by 10 patriotic organizations Wednesday night. Federal officials are called upon to make an immediate investigation of the church organization and to take drastic action "to curb and exterminate further unpatriotic utterances."

John K. Kollock was chairman and Walter Bear secretary of the meeting. Among those who denounced the German resolutions were Judge J. O. Stearns, L. D. Mahone, Robert E. Smith, Mrs. Martha Daniel and J. H. Gay.

The resolutions conclude as follows: "Whereas, the said resolutions are and were intended to be pernicious, offensive, disloyal, wholly un-American, and were presented and published for the purpose of destroying the spirit of loyalty and patriotism existing in these patriotic organizations and hampering and resisting the efforts of our loyal citizens to promote the principles for which our government stands, now therefore, be it resolved, that we brand the resolutions as being

wholly un-American, unpatriotic, disloyal and antagonistic to the principles of true and loyal Americanism, and "Be it further resolved, that we urgently request that an immediate investigation be made by the United States government of this so-called Federation of the German Roman Catholic Societies of Oregon, and those guilty of these disloyal and seditious utterances and that drastic action be taken to curb and exterminate further unpatriotic activities."

HELP FOR LAND SETTLERS URGED

When Oregon or any other section of the West adopts truly helpful plans for rural settlement instead of programs of mere land selling, then the settler will come; but he will not come under present conditions. E. F. Benson, manager of the department of immigration and industry of the Northern Pacific railway system, uttered this opinion on his arrival here this morning.

"There are thousands of settlers who are willing to come to the West but they receive no encouragement now. We must find places where the settler can make good," said Benson.

DEFINITE PLAN SOUGHT
With this program in mind the executive will confer with owners of logged off lands and other unsettled territory to see if they are willing to inaugurate a definite settlement program by formation of settlement companies. Benson addressed the agricultural committee of

the Chamber of Commerce on this subject at noon today.

"Oregon is blessed with more opportunities for land settlement than almost any other state in the nation. There are plenty of settlers to come. Can we not organize a program to bring the land and the settler to each other? The settler must at least be met half way," said Benson.

"I have been asking owners of logged off land if they are willing to form land settlement companies. Wisconsin has made a success of this plan. In Wisconsin the settler gets long term credit and an amortization system which extends payments over a period of 30 years."

IS OREGON WILLING?
"Is Oregon willing to allow the settler 20 or 40 years to pay for his property and extend the financial aid and backing that is necessary?"

"We're used to a purely land selling program where the settler may or may not be subject to exploitation. Under the present plan the settler is dumped haphazard, to manage for himself. We must make it so that the settler need only make a small initial payment and then be prepared to loan back even more than he has paid for his property."

"A program must be mapped so the settler can make a reasonable profit above the cost of production. Logged-off lands take long to clear and if they are to be settled the settler must be aided by some tangible system."
