

21,000 MEMBERS IS GOAL SET BY CLUB FEDERATION

Pendleton, Or., June 3.—Ten thousand members and \$21,000 is the goal set for the coming year by the twenty-first annual convention of the State Federation of Women's clubs, which closes at noon today.

Mrs. Ida B. Callahan of Portland was unanimously reelected president. With one exception, the other officers will remain the same as last year.

Mrs. C. W. Elkins of Prineville was elected first vice president; Mrs. William Bell of Roseburg, second vice president; Mrs. Charles Hines of Forest Grove, recording secretary; Mrs. S. K. Harlock of Corvallis, corresponding secretary; Mrs. John Van Zante of Portland, treasurer; Mrs. L. E. Bean of Eugene, auditor; Mrs. E. T. Wade of Pendleton, first director; Mrs. George Cochran of La Grande, Mrs. Ida Callahan of Portland and Mrs. William Bell of Roseburg, directors; Mrs. Charles Castner, general federation state secretary.

Mrs. J. W. Saddler, a director last year and who was ill and unable to attend the convention, wired that she would be unable to accept the nomination offered her, and Mrs. Cochran was elected in her place. Mrs. Sarah E. Evans, past president, formally installed the officers amid cheers and expressions of good will. There was not a dissenting note in the whole ceremony. Mrs. Castner presided during the election.

Many invitations were received by the convention for next year. Mrs. L. C. Smith of the Newport club extended the invitation to the convention for Newport, the Women's league of the University of Oregon and the clubwomen of Eugene spoke for Eugene, and the Chamber of Commerce of Medford and the city of Tillamook sent in invitations.

OPPOSE DIVORCE DETAILS

The federation went on record opposing the publication of sensational details of divorce proceedings. The women's jury bill, the merits of which were explained by Mrs. Alexander Thompson of Portland, was endorsed, as well as the soldiers' aid and loan bill.

One of the principal aims of the federation will be the creating of interest in the proposed crippled children's hospital. The Owens-Adair marriage bill was also endorsed.

Mrs. Millie Trumbull of Portland presented a resolution, which was adopted, asking President Harding to initiate the call for a conference of nations, in which the question of peace between them would be taken up. The resolution also urged that no appropriations for further army or navy equipment be made until after the conference.

The convention closed with a vote of thanks to the hospitality of Pendleton, on the part of the local club women, the business men and others who made the visit of the delegates a pleasure. The press was also thanked for cooperation.

COURT S ORDERED TO DIVULGE HIDING PLACE OF CHILD

The court of domestic relations and the Waverly Baby Home were ordered by Presiding Circuit Judge Kavanaugh this morning to tell where Francis Allen, daughter of Mrs. Florence Schuller, is located and with what family.

Mrs. Schuller is conducting a fight in circuit court to get her child back. The child was turned over to the baby home by Judge Kansler of the court of domestic relations and afterward taken out of the state and placed in a private home.

The domestic relations court, in answer to Mrs. Schuller's writ of habeas corpus complaint, stated that Mrs. Schuller was not a fit person to have the custody. The child was turned over to the court after its grandmother, in whose care it had been left by the mother, was adjudged insane. When the mother returned to Portland to visit she found it in the Waverly home, where she left it with her address, saying she would be back for it as soon as possible.

According to Paul Long, attorney for Mrs. Schuller, the home gave the child out for adoption without notifying the mother.

The action today was on a motion to make the return on the writ more definite and certain. The trial was set for June 8.

Extortionist Fails To Show Up to Get \$2500 Demanded

Thursday night the police again lay in wait for an extortionist, who, in imitation of "Shadow" methods, attempted to frighten E. Speciale, fruit dealer, 237 Tenth street, into delivering \$2500. Both the police and the extortionist had poor luck. They failed to get him, as on former occasions, and he failed to get any money.

The police are not certain whether or not it is just a joke, or a gang of "blackhanders." Thursday morning Speciale received a letter written in Italian. He was told that if he did not deliver \$2500 before 11:30 at a certain place near Ladd avenue and Elliott street, his family, including four children, would be destroyed.

Speciale was very much frightened and did not report to the police until 4 o'clock. At the proper time Speciale and another man approached the appointed place. Lieutenant Maloney and five detectives were hidden nearby, each watching for the extortionist.

The party waited for several hours, but nothing happened at all. The extortionist did not appear.

RIVER HALTS, BUT RISE IS COMING

Continued rises in the Snake and Columbia rivers were reported to the weather bureau this morning with the result that E. L. Wells, district weather forecaster, predicts a rise of half a foot Sunday and another half foot Monday in the Willamette river backwater flood.

The Willamette had reached a stage of 22 feet this morning, a fall of .3 of a foot since last Sunday. The river was expected to remain stationary until Sunday when the rise would resume. Fairly warm weather continues through the Columbia watershed.

The rise in the Columbia river at Wematchee was .6 of a foot and in the Snake river at Lewiston .3 of a foot this morning. While the warm weather continues the weather bureau anticipates continued rises in these two streams.

Warmer weather still prevails in the Columbia drainage section than in the Snake river basin. Thursday, Boise, Idaho, had a temperature of 80 degrees, the warmest reported yet and indications were that the remainder of the Southern Idaho country was warming up.

A rise of .5 of a foot in the Columbia river at The Dalles was reported this morning, indicating that the effect of the new run-off is being felt farther down stream. The weather bureau predicts a stage of 23 feet for Portland Monday morning.
