

EX-OREGON GIRL SUSPECT IN BUGS COIN CASE; 2 HELD

Seattle, Wash., June 6.—(U. P.)—Arrested Sunday afternoon by federal secret service operatives, Ralph Groff, 20, former soldier, and Mrs. R. E. Gilmer, 40, are held in the county jail while counterfeiting charges are being prepared against them by the district attorney's office.

Thirty-five counterfeit half dollar pieces and 40 pounds of metal for casting spurious coins are held as evidence against the pair. The mounds were not found. Groff claims they were destroyed. Groff was arrested with the counterfeiting alloy in it. He is said to have told his captors that he had "cold feet" and was on his way to Tacoma.

WOMAN IS HELD
Mrs. Gilmer was arrested in a house on the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Madison street which the couple had rented when they came to Seattle last week.

According to the story told Captain Thomas B. Foster, chief of the Seattle secret service office, and W. R. Jarrell, his chief assistant, Groff and Mrs. Gilmer met in Vancouver, Wash., after Groff had been discharged from the army. They spent some time in Buckley, where Groff worked as a barber, and then came to Seattle.

Groff's alibi is said to be that he bought the metal to make rings for prizes at carnivals and fairs.

SECRET IS LEARNED
Mrs. Gilmer, he is said to claim, learned the secret of making bogus coins when a little girl in Oregon. She was taken to a picnic by a neighbor and his wife. It is said, and while there the wife's father showed her a counterfeiting outfit set up in the woods. The actual passing of the coins was done by Groff. Captain Foster states Mrs. Gilmer accompanied him. It is stated, and gave him one coin at a time, so that if the fake was detected he could claim that he had lost the one coin and had taken it as change.

Mrs. Gilmer is said to be a writer of song poems.

SERVED IN WAR

Thompson of Missions Presbyterian church made answer for Dr. Pence, saying it might be possible for a Methodist minister to vote for his congregation, but the government of the Presbyterian church makes it necessary for the pastor to refer such measures to the church session.

ASKS FOR VOTE
Dr. Edward Constant of Highland Congregational church took the floor twice to urge that the association ask for a vote in all communities represented in the body. This again brought forth a protest from the Sunday supporters, who could see certain failure with the negative votes from Lutheran, Episcopal and Congregational churches. It was finally decided to allow churches to vote whose pastors belonged to the association. Time limit for the vote was set at August 1.

Election of officers was quietly disposed of, the report of the nominating committee being unanimously accepted. The new officers are: President, Edward Constant of Highland Congregational church; vice president, Dr. Frank L. Wemett of Centenary-Wilbur Methodist church; secretary-treasurer, Ralph C. McAfee, executive secretary of the Portland Federation of Churches.

Chaplain Howard secured the passage of a motion calling for a special mass meeting to consider resolutions to congress urging disarmament. He also asked for books and magazines to be given to sailors on ocean-going vessels. A special request was made for books in Dutch and Scandinavian.

The address of the morning was given by the Rev. L. Myron Booser, student pastor at O. A. C., who spoke on "The Need and Opportunity for Religious Work in State Colleges."

A letter was read from Mrs. L. M. Sheppard, formerly office secretary of the Wabery Baby home, in which she accused Mrs. T. C. Allison of dismissing her because she would not allow Protestant babies to be adopted by Catholic families. No action was taken on the letter.

H. P. Lee urged the ministers to call upon the national administration to take a hand in the Armenian situation and the Near East massacre. At the suggestion of Dr. Pence the new executive committee was instructed to give the matter early consideration.

Pueblo Makes Good Fight; May Accept Portland Aid Later

Pueblo is struggling manfully to meet the flood emergency, according to a message received by Acting Mayor Bigelow this morning from James L. Lovell, chairman of the Pueblo city council, in answer to Mayor Baker's offer of help.

"Your kindly offer received," says the message. "We are caring for the present emergency in good shape. It may be necessary to call upon you later for assistance."

Railroads Ready to Spend Big Sum Now If Measure Adopted

An immediate outlay of \$700,000 for additional ground necessary for the projected union freight terminal at Guide lake and of \$500,000 for construction of its first unit will be made by the railroads following Tuesday's election if the voters pass favorably upon the measure authorizing the city council to vacate certain small portions of streets. Such is the statement made by Arthur C. Spencer on behalf of the roads in response to a request for a definite announcement as to their program.

The completion of the big terminal would necessitate an outlay of approximately \$2,000,000 and would give Portland what is declared by experts to be one of the finest in the country in point of usefulness.

Completion of the first unit of the freight terminal would enable the Northern Pacific Terminal company to permit the operation of all steam passenger trains in and out of the Union station, including the coast service of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, as the congestion there would be relieved sufficiently. This would be, it is pointed out, a very great convenience to the public.

According to official announcement, the railroads stand ready to proceed with the terminal project immediately following approval by the voters.

Josselyn in Race For School Board

B. S. Josselyn, former president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, filed his nominating petition as a candidate for director of the Portland school district, with R. H. Thomas, clerk of the school board, at 7:45 o'clock Sunday evening. Josselyn's entrance as a candidate increases the list to 11.

Transportation of Stolen Auto Charge

R. W. Dawson, alias R. W. Long, was brought to Portland today from Cheyenne, Wyo., by a United States deputy marshal to await trial on a charge of transporting a stolen automobile from California to Oregon. He was arrested at Green River, Wyo., and given a hearing at Cheyenne before a United States commissioner. Bond was fixed at \$1000.

\$3,600,000 in Road Bond Issues in Nine Counties Face Voter

County road bond issues totaling \$3,600,000 will be voted on in nine counties of the state in Tuesday's election. In most cases the funds derived from the sale of the bonds are to be used in cooperation with the state in improving the main highways on a 50-50 basis.

Highways affected by the bond issues are: The Dulles-California, in Wasco and Deschutes counties; the John Day, in Wheeler and Grant counties; the Roseburg-Coos Bay, in Douglas and Coos counties; the Pacific, in Douglas county; the Mt. Hood loop, in Hood River county; and the Roosevelt, in Curry county.

Federal prohibition agents arrested Wade Saturday night in the downtown business district. He is alleged to have had 24 quarts of whiskey in his possession when taken into custody. The federal officers claim he brought the liquor to Portland from Canada.

DRAINAGE DISTRICT NO. 1 ASKS COUNTY FOR ROAD RELIEF

With 8000 acres of farm land in Multnomah county drainage district No. 1, the residents have only one road, the Cully road, to connect them with the outside world, according to J. O. Elrod, who appeared before the county commissioners today to ask that a new road be built.

Because of the sloughs, a number of farmers cannot reach their fields with wagons and machinery, Elrod stated. He proposed that a stretch of road three miles in length be built west from where the Cully road reaches the bank of the Columbia river.

Elrod said the farmers would grant the right of way, dedicate it to the county and then the grading if the county would cooperate by putting crushed rock on the road.

Commissioner Hoyt pointed out that there are a number of communities

that are in the same predicament and that the county has been unable to do anything for them. Sauveux and Government islands were given as examples.

Commissioner Holman asked that the farmers grant the right of way and stated that their needs might be cared for in the next budget.

ENGINEER ADVISES TESTING
INTERSTATE BRIDGE PILING
Immediate soundings should be taken in the Columbia river to see that the flood waters have not undermined the piling of the Interstate bridge, G. T. Forsyth, engineer, advised the county commissioners today.

The sand formation in the river bed shifts quickly under pressure, Forsyth stated, and while there probably has been no serious damage done in the last two weeks, it is impossible to tell definitely until the depth of the water around the piling is determined.

Forsyth stated that he had investigated the effect of the high water along the Union avenue approach to the Interstate bridge and found the fills holding well. Seepage was discovered at two places, however.

Statutory Charge Dismissed
Fred Rentner won't have to stand trial on a statutory charge. His case was assigned to Circuit Judge Bagley today, but the girl who was to testify against him turned bashful at the last moment, so Chief Deputy District Attorney Mammery dismissed the case.

Shipping Board Is Arm of Government, U. S. Court Holds

Overruling the contention of W. S. U'Ren, counsel for striking seamen, that the shipping board is not an arm of the government, Federal Judge Wolverton this afternoon held that such a discussion is improper.

Wolverton declared he is satisfied that the shipping board actually is an arm of government and that he had previously satisfied himself of that during the shipbuilding period, when efforts were made to bring suit against the government.

U'Ren then challenged the jurisdiction of the Oregon district court, holding that all the seafarers' unions defendant in the injunction proceedings brought by the government are California corporations and therefore outside Judge Wolverton's jurisdiction.

Argument on this question was proceeding during the afternoon.
