

DANCING QUESTION MEETING STORMY; McLAREN OUSTED

McMinnville, Or., June 6.—Following a stormy meeting at which the charter amendment regulating dancing was discussed in hot debate, Rev. W. G. McLaren of Portland and his chauffeur were escorted from the city Monday night. The chauffeur had previously been put in jail for a few minutes, when members of the American Legion threatened to duck him in the park swimming pool.

The auditorium was packed. Walter L. Toose Jr. reviewed in detail the arguments of the Moral alliance, addressing its members personally, and with respect and others with denunciation, charging un-Americanism and misrepresentation at a meeting last Saturday night.

Charges against the morality of the city's young people he declared unfounded, and he made a strong arraignment against the assertion that dancing is criminal. He explained the amendment, as he had drafted it, as having been endorsed by a committee of 25 representative business citizens.

McLAREN MAKES CHARGE
At the close of his address McLaren arose in the center of the audience and asked for a hearing, as he had come in for a share of the denunciation. The privilege was granted with the understanding that his remarks should be confined to the arguments of the evening and not a restatement of charges made in Saturday night's meeting.

He opened with the statement that some person in the recent trial in the circuit court for moral delinquency had been instrumental in changing the character of the indictment from that by the grand jury, whereupon R. A. Kilka, facing him upon the platform, denounced him as a liar and demanded to know to whom he referred. He replied that it was Judge Belt, which aroused the ire of the judge's friends, and at once there was a rush for the platform to get hold of McLaren.

FIGHT IS Averted
Chairman Jameson and others interfered just in time to prevent a general mixing of fists, and McLaren was escorted off the platform by Mayor Houck.

Members of the American Legion accosted McLaren's chauffeur, who became noisy outside the building, and threatened him with a ducking in the park swimming pool. He was taken in charge by Chief of Police Snodgrass, who demanded that he cease his talk. He replied he would not and was placed in the city jail for a few moments until McLaren and his car could be found, when they were escorted outside the city.

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GREAT PRO-HUN IS MADE G. O. P. HEAD

Washington, June 7.—(WASH.-NAT.)—Under the new program of the Republican national committee, which meets here tomorrow, John T. Adams of Iowa is to be chairman and Ralph E. Williams of Oregon vice chairman, with the approval of the national administration. The advancement of Williams, long a member of the committee and a member of its executive committee, seems a logical development, coupled with a desire to recognize the West, but how is Adams to be explained?

Adams has been vice chairman of the committee and has a clear title as a standard-bearer, but his selection is nevertheless a puzzle for those who believe it is not a policy of wisdom to confer the highest honors of the party organization upon a man who was conspicuous only a few years ago as an admirer of

the German kaiser and sounded him praises as one of the noblest characters of history while the kaiser's legions were crushing Belgium.

ADAMS ONCE BEATEN
Who is the explanation for Adams being put forward at this time? He is believed to be chairman of the national committee once before, when Will H. Hays was chosen, but was defeated because of his pro-Germanism. This objection has now been waived, possibly on the score that people are no longer interested in the attitude that Adams took before the United States entered the war, for it is not understood that he continued his praise of the kaiser after the United States entered the conflict.

It may be thought, too, that there is political advantage to the Republicans in selecting this type of leader as showing that "the war is over." There is no denying, however, that Adams is a different type from Representative Mondell, the Republican house leader, who in a speech in the house opposing the so-called political refugee amendment to the immigration bill exclaimed:

"Why, under this we would have to admit William the Damned, if he came to our shores!"

JUSTIFIED INVASION OF BELGIUM
Adams was in Germany when the European war broke, and for some time thereafter. He sent letters to Iowa newspapers declaring the war had been concocted in England and that English propaganda was responsible for blaming the kaiser. He forwarded German newspaper clippings justifying the invasion of Belgium to refute slanders in the United States. In a letter to the Dubuque Telegraph-Herald, published October 25, 1914, Adams wrote:

"God never made a more gentle, upright, noble character than the German kaiser. He is the active head of a government which has done more to promote the happiness, contentment and prosperity of all its people than any other government on earth."

ADVOCATED HUN CAUSE
When the truth is all made known, Benedict Arnold, denouncing Washington as the great American traitor, will make no picture more striking than that of Sir Edward Grey pointing to the German kaiser as the cause of the European war.

After this, through 1915 and into 1916, at least, it appears, Adams continued to advocate the cause of Germany against the allies. Some wonder is now expressed that he is now regarded as the ideal leader for the Republican national organization.

Cooperation Urged
Between Park and School Directors

Cooperation between the city park commissioners and the members of the school board was urged today in an address by W. F. Woodward at the annual convention of the directors of the Pacific coast, which opened this morning at the Multnomah hotel. Other speakers were E. T. Mische, who advocated the planting of shade trees on residence streets, and Charles H. Cheney, consultant of the city planning commission, who outlined the plan for the development of parks and boulevards.

Following the forenoon session the commissioners met at luncheon in the dining room of the Multnomah with the Kiwanis club and left for a tour of the Columbia highway at 2 p. m. Election of officers will follow dinner at Chandler Inn. Acting Mayor C. A. Bigelow delivered an address of welcome to the visitors at the opening session of the convention.

Delegates to the convention were: G. A. Hill and wife and Fred Mottet of Tacoma; Carl F. Biedenbach and wife and J. W. Gregg and wife of Berkeley, Cal.; A. C. J. Weeks and wife, J. Rogers and A. S. Wootton and wife of Vancouver, B. C.; John Gibson and Baker Fitzwater of Bellingham, Wash.; P. F. Morley of Aberdeen, Wash.; Mrs. Frank A. Steele and J. W. Thompson of Seattle; C. V. Piper, agronomist, representing the secretary of agriculture, Washington, D. C.; George Rae, Paul E. Doty, Zed E. Dorris, L. M. Thielens, E. T. Mische and W. F. Woodward of Portland.

Officers of the organization are, Commissioner S. C. Pier, president; C. P. Keyser, secretary. The purpose of the organization, according to Keyser, is to determine a general policy for the development of public parks and playgrounds.

Rich Chinaman and Money Gone; 'Flends No Can Catch 'Em'

Immigration Inspector E. P. Bonham has requested money from local Chinese leaders to assist them in the search for Chin Tan, wealthy Chinaman, who has disappeared. This is the last resort the Chinese have for locating him as their own secret methods of communication have been unavailing. Chin is reported to have had between \$20,000 and \$75,000. It is believed he made his way to Mexico. As Chin was one of the bondsmen for Chew Sim, who is at liberty under \$10,000 bond until the latter part of this week, when he leaves for Mexico, federal officials made arrangements Monday afternoon to have another wealthy Chinaman go Chew's bond.

ELEVEN BIDS FOR FIREBOAT HOUSE ARE SUBMITTED

Eleven bids were submitted for the construction of the fire boat house and dock for the fire boat at the foot of Randolph street. The lowest bidder was Oscar Wayman, whose offer was for \$35,388. The matter has been referred to Commissioner Bigelow for his recommendation, and may be acted upon at Wednesday's session of the city council.

The specifications provide that the contractor shall be allowed 120 days after the signing of the contract within which to complete the job, but Battalion Chief Lee Holden, who prepared the plans and specifications, says that approximately only 90 days' time will be necessary if the high water subsidies so that work can be carried on to advantage.

COMMISSIONER BARBUR TO RECOMMEND IMPROVEMENTS
Commissioner Barbur will recommend to the city council Wednesday the granting of petitions for the following public work:

Improvement of Campbell street, from Killingsworth avenue to Almsworth avenue.

Wygant street, from Gay street to Delaware avenue construction of concrete sidewalks and curbs.

Hard surface pavement for Thirty-second and Thirty-third avenues southeast, from Fifth to Fifty-first streets southeast.

Hard surface pavement for East Forty-fourth street, from Belmont to East Yamhill streets.

Hard surface pavement for East Seventy-second street, from Sandy boulevard to the city limits.

East Seventy-fourth street, from East Stark to Halsey streets.

Tacoma avenue from East Seventeenth to East Nineteenth streets.

Sewer in East Thirty-fifth street, from Almsworth avenue to North street.

Sewer in Seventieth street southeast, from Fifty-first avenue southeast to Foster road.

CITY HALL BRIEF

C. McFee has applied to the city council for a permit to maintain a wood and fuel yard at the southwest corner of Tillamook and East Eighty-fifth streets.

Commissioner Barbur will recommend to the council Wednesday that remonstrances be overruled and the time and manner of adoption be adopted for improvement of Grand avenue, from Beacon street to block 1, Villa Heights.

Remonstrances totaling \$8.58 per cent. of the property proposed to be assessed have been filed in the matter of the improvement of Twenty-eighth avenue southeast, from Forty-first street southeast to the east line of Richmond, and the city council on Wednesday will order the discontinuance of all proceedings. Similar action will be taken on the project for the improvement of Folk street from Hudson to Fessenden streets, where - 66.79 per cent. remonstrance has been filed.

Parliament in North Ireland Is Opened By British Viceroy

Belfast, June 7.—(U. N. S.)—With much pomp and in the presence of a brilliant assemblage, the new Northern Ireland (Ulster) parliament was opened today by Lord Fitz Alan, British viceroy of Ireland.

This was the first visit Lord Fitz Alan had made to Belfast since his appointment to the viceroyalty. He represented King George.

The members of the new parliament took oath upon a table that was last used in the old Irish parliament in 1793. Premier Sir James Craig of Ulster announced his cabinet as follows: Home secretary, Sir Dawson Bates; financial minister, H. M. Pollock; minister of education, The Marquis of Londonderry; minister of labor, J. M. Andrews; minister of agriculture, E. A. Archdale.

The Ulster parliament was created under the new home rule (partition) act which established Irish legislatures, one for Northern Ireland at Belfast, and the other for Northern Ireland at Belfast.

The Unionists, anti-Sinn Féiners, control the Northern Ireland parliament. Formal announcement that King George will come to Ireland and formally open the Northern Ireland parliament on June 12 was made by Premier Sir James Craig.
