'Dr. Howard Childs,' Convicted in Oregon, Located in Prison

Word was received by Sheriff Hurlburt this morning that the notorious "Dr. Howard Childs," who escaped from the county jail June 15, 1919, just before he was to begin serving a sentence of from one to five years in the penitentiary on charges of obtaining money by false pretenses, has been found in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga. He is serving a sentence for impersonating a federal officer and is going by the name of W. W. Byrd.

Childs was convicted of fleeing people in this locality in connection with the promotion of a patent medicine selling scheme. Although not a physician, he was handling the medicine for the manufacture of the church at Portland, lured several people to contribute to the financing of a campaign which was not conducted. He would sell 300 cases when only 50 of them were full, it was charged.

Following his conviction, Childs appealed to the supreme court when he made his escape. Childs term at Atlanta expires August 3 and he will be brought back to Oregon to begin sentence here.

Childs sawed the bars to the fall window while the guards were eating. His wife, who was supposed to be visiting him, stood guard. He climbed along the ledge of the inner court, over the top of the courthouse and made his way down through the law school on the seventh floor. A bicycle was waiting for him in the street.

Foremen Constitute Important Factors In Molding Workers

Importance of the foreman of labor to the industrial development of the nation was emphasized to business men who gathered for the members' forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce Monday noon, by J. T. Daves of the Business Training corporation of New York.

"There are a number of problems which must be overcome before America can assume the industrial leadership of the world which it is endeavoring to attain," said Daves, who is making a speaking tour of the country.

"One of the most important is industrial leadership, which must be based on the stability, character, fiber and quality of the working people. The foreman of labor is the most important factor in gaining a unification of working forces. More attention should be paid to the plant foreman. He can get the message to his working squad better than any other man."
