

MAN BRUTALLY ATTACKED HER, WOMAN ASSERTS

Laura Breake, who claims that W. T. Pearce brutally attacked her April 12, told her story in Circuit Judge Bagley's court this morning.

"I was in my apartment when a man broke through the door. He had nothing on but some handkerchiefs around the upper part of his head and over his nose and mouth, leaving only his eyes showing. He grabbed me and tried to throw me out. I ran toward the kitchen and he followed and got a half nelson on me. I tore down the wall telephone and tried to get to the desk phone. Then I kicked him and he ran out of the room."

Mrs. Breake's husband was not in the apartment house at the time. Pearce is also married. His wife sat beside him in court today. It is understood that his defense will be that he was recovering from influenza and was in a delirious condition when the alleged assault took place.

ASSETS MAY BE USED FOR CREDITORS' BENEFIT, RULING

Assets of the Oregon Elgers Music house may be used for the benefit of the creditors of the bankrupt Elgers Music house, according to word received here of a decision of the circuit court of appeals in San Francisco. Action of the federal district court of Portland is sustained. A ruling was made on some months ago, but Tom Mannix, attorney for Hy Elgers, demanded a rehearing on the grounds that the federal district court had no jurisdiction by reason of the fact that a prior suit on the matter had been started in the Oregon state courts. This is the second time the appellate court has given this ruling in the Elgers' case. A dissenting opinion was given this time, as before, by Judge Erskine M. Ross.

The dissenting opinion by Judge Ross is considered significant in the present situation by Hy Elgers, president of Oregon Elgers Music house and the central figure in the controversy. Even though the circuit court of appeals has rendered this decision the case is still in somewhat of a dilemma as the state courts of Oregon have asserted their jurisdiction in the case as well as the federal courts. It will take further legal controversy to decide whether the state or federal courts are entitled to jurisdiction. Federal Judge R. S. Bean allowed the case to be admitted here and refused to dismiss the action on the grounds that the entire matter belonged in the state courts.

Thomas Mannix, attorney for Elgers, wired the clerk of the circuit court of appeals today requesting him to prepare the record for review by the supreme court of the United States, where the matter will be finally settled.

TRUSTEES' SUIT AGAINST RECTOR SET FOR THURSDAY

The case of the board of school trustees of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon against Dr. A. A. Morrison, rector of the Trinity Episcopal church, was postponed until Thursday when called on the circuit court docket today.

The trustees charge Dr. Morrison with fraudulent manipulation in securing certain lands and demand that he give an accounting. Dr. Morrison, in his reply, states that the land deals entered into during the time when he was a member of the board were as well conducted by the other members as by himself. The plaintiff, represented by C. E. Cochran, claims that while Dr. Morrison was on the board he secured 112 acres of land in Yamhill county by selling a 160-acre tract to the board for \$25,000 when it was actually worth only \$10,000. Dr. Morrison replies that the board got more than twice as much for the land and he says the members knew exactly what they were doing at the time. The plaintiffs are Bishop W. T. Sumner of the Oregon diocese, the Rev. E. H. Clark, the Rev. John Rice, the Rev. J. H. Hutton, Walter J. Burns, C. Huggins and J. W. Ganong. The three last named are the lay members of the board.

\$50,000 ESTATE LEFT BY DEATH OF ELVA HUMASON

An estate of \$50,000 was left when Elva Humason, daughter of the late Phoebe M. Dekum, died in Los Angeles May 13, according to the petition for probate of will filed in probate court Monday afternoon. The petition was filed by Lavilla Humason, Los Angeles, sister and principal heir. Only \$10,000 of the estate is in person.

amendment with an affirmative majority of 15,398; the marriage examination bill with 9869 more negative than affirmative votes and the women's furor bill with a lead of 2545 votes.

LEGISLATIVE AMENDMENT LOST

The legislative session amendment has gone down to defeat for the second time. It having been in virtually the same terms as at present written, defeated by the voters of the state at the November election. The amendment, briefly stated, made provision for the extension of the regular sessions of the legislature from the usual 40 days to not more than 60 days, while it also increased the compensation of the members from \$3 to \$5 the day.

The bonus amendment authorizes the issuance of bonds to the amount of the assessed valuation of the state, which, in round numbers, will provide a fund of approximately \$1,000,000 on the basis of the present valuation in the state as a whole.

THOSE ENTITLED TO BONUS

Under the authority of the amendment, affected by the legislative act passed by the 1931 session and ratified by voters yesterday, soldiers, sailors and marines who entered the service in the World war between the date of the declaration of war by America, April 6, 1917, and the signing of the armistice, November 11, 1918, and who served between the declaration and November 11, 1918, will be entitled to a cash bonus of not more than \$500 or a loan of not to exceed \$4000. They must have been residents of Oregon at the time of enlisting in the service. The administration of the bonus act is placed in the hands of a commission consisting of the governor, secretary of state, auditor general and two commissioners appointed by the governor.

LOAN DESIRED ABOVE CASH

It is stated by T. M. Boyd, commander of the Portland post of the American Legion, that approximately 85 per cent of the Multnomah county legion men will take the loan and not the cash bonus, while it is thought that this percentage will be increased in the rural districts. The loans are to be for home building purposes only, at long time and low interest.

The emergency clause veto amendment gives the governor the constitutional power to veto the emergency clause of a measure whenever he considers it has been attached to a bill by the legislature where no real emergency exists. The veto will not affect the other provisions of the bill in any manner other than to bring it within the application of the referendum and to postpone the date it goes into effect to a law until 90 days from the date of the adjournment of the legislature.

The marriage examination bill provided that both applicants for a marriage license should undergo an examination by a reputable physician and be given a certificate that they are free from venereal disease or mental defect before a marriage license could be given them by the county clerk. In event of disease or mental defect the license could be given where one or both of the applicants submitted to sterilization.

The women's furor bill provides that women shall be listed as jurors the same as men, though a woman chosen on the panel may claim exemption on the ground of sex on application made to the proper authorities. The measure also provides that at least half the jury must be women in all criminal cases where minors under 18 years of age are either complainants or defendants. It is also added to the existing law by the bill that registered voters are to be included in the basis for the selection of jurors, rather than those found on the assessment rolls only, as has been the case.

POST COMMANDER WARNS

MEN ABOUT USE OF BONUS

Voicing "unanimous thanks" to friends and voters who aided in securing the adoption of the bonus amendment, and at the same time sounding a note of warning and a plea for cool deliberation to the service men who will be the beneficiaries of the bonus plan, Henry Boyd, commander of the Portland post, American Legion, issued a public statement this afternoon.

In it he places the continued efforts of the Portland post to conduct a campaign of education intended to turn the veterans to the loan rather than to the cash bonus, and warns the members of the legion that any firm or individual that approaches ex-service men with propositions that have to do with the expenditure of the aid money should

be viewed in the same light as ambulance chasing lawyers.

NO NEED OF HASTE

He urges that there is no need for haste on the part of the men, that it will of necessity require three or four months before the machinery of the new law can be put to function and counsels that "there is a need for cool deliberation in order that every dollar may receive value returned."

Commander Boyd's statement, in part, is as follows: "A word of warning is therefore timely. It will be at least three or four months before the bonus can be made in the operation of this measure. No beneficiaries of this bill should obligate themselves in any way to dispose of the funds they are to receive until they are sure of the value of the bill. They should appoint themselves a committee to talk with their friends among the ex-service men and prevent hasty action."

LEGION AS ADVISER

"The American Legion will immediately announce committee and act as advisers to the ex-service men. I cannot too strongly urge all the ex-service men to confer with us before they enter any contracts, purchase any lands or obligate themselves in any way. There is no need for haste. Rather there is a need for cool deliberation that every dollar may receive value returned.
