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LOOP GRADING
CONTRACT LET
FOR \$193,786

Work Covers Stretch From Multnomah Line to Zigzag; County's Share to Be \$170,000; Clackamas Portion Is \$80,000.

Contracts for grading the Mount Hood loop highway were let today by the state highway commission. Unit No. 1 from the Multnomah county line east a distance of 11.88 miles was awarded to Dixon & Howitt, whose bid was \$47,980. Units 2 and 3, 12.37 miles, were given to the Johnson Construction company, the combined bid being \$139,786.

The improvement will cover the entire distance between the Multnomah county line and the national forest boundary at Zigzag. From this point to Government Camp the road has already been improved.

COSTS MULTNOMAH \$170,000

To the cost of the work Multnomah county is to contribute \$170,000 and Clackamas county \$80,000. No action was taken by the commission in the matter of contracting for the paving of the road between Williams and Sheridan. This work was contingent on the cooperation of Yamhill county to the extent of \$50,000. To raise this sum it was proposed to bond the county but the bonding measure was defeated in the recent election by 67 votes. The Yamhill county court appeared

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FREE CANAL
TOLLS O. K.'D
BY COMMITTEE

Senatorial Body Urges Passage of Borah Measure Favoring American Ships in Coastwise Trade; Sentiment to Be Tested

Washington, June 13.—(U. P.)—The Borah resolution, providing free tolls through the Panama canal for American ships engaged in the coastwise trade, was ordered favorably reported today by the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals. The vote was unanimous.

Senators Borah, Johnson of California and McKinley of Illinois, Republicans; and Walsh, Montana, Democrat, voted for it. Chairman Borah was authorized to cast favorable votes for Senators Randall, Louisiana and Trammell of Florida.

The favorable report is believed to foreshadow similar action by the senate.

Senators Poindexter and Jones of Washington, Republicans, indicated a willingness to withhold for the present their bills providing for the free use of the canal by all American vessels engaged in both foreign and coastwise trade if Senator Borah (Rep., Idaho) thought his measure would be the best step to take.

Borah said he believed it would be better to "test out the sentiment of the senate" by first proposing that the canal be thrown open to coastwise American vessels. Poindexter and Jones then agreed to support his bill.

Penrose Has Bill
To Increase Number
Of Revenue Agents

Washington, June 13.—(I. N. S.)—A bill to increase the number of internal revenue collectors from 64 to 74 and to increase the number of collection districts accordingly, will be introduced in the senate today by Senator Penrose (R., Pa.).

Penrose stated that the bill was recommended by the secretary of the treasury, who urged that it be enacted into law before July. The bill was referred to the senate committee, of which Penrose is chairman.

U. S. MARSHAL
OF S. F. HUNTS
BADBIT CHASE

Comes North to Take Personal Charge of Hunt for Roy Gardner, Who Escaped From His Deputy; Other Prisoner Caught

Kelso, Wash., June 11.—United States Marshal J. B. Hollohan of San Francisco, with Postoffice Inspectors G. H. Austin and George E. Lewis of San Francisco, and C. W. Linnebaugh of Portland, arrived here about 11 o'clock this morning to take charge of the hunt for Roy Gardner, fugitive mail robber. Approximately 30 men are searching for Gardner in this section.

The appearance of a speed boat going up the Cowlitz river between 8 and 9 o'clock Sunday night led to speculation as to whether some one might be aiding Gardner from the river. The boat did not reappear and its destination was not known.

United States Marshal J. B. Hollohan of San Francisco arrived in Portland this morning and left on the next train for Kelso, Wash., to take charge of the hunt for Roy Gardner, mail train robber, who escaped from a San Francisco deputy Saturday morning at Castlerock. He was met at the Union station by Postal Inspector Limebaugh.

Hollohan was disheartened with the reports he received from Deputy Thomas Mulhall, so he decided to come north and personally conduct the hunt.

Few other federal officials are on the ground, the posse being made up mainly of railroad special agent deputy sheriffs from Kelso and Castle Rock, and a few volunteers.

Interest in the hunt reached fever heat Sunday with the capture near Kelso of N. H. Pyron, counterfeiter, who escaped from the federal guards along with Gardner. Reports were received about the same time that a man answering Gardner's description had been seen sneaking into a swampy wooded tract. A posse was thrown about the swamp.

W. A. Pratt, a Kelso photographer, who had joined the posse searching for the two fugitives, saw footprints along the railroad track north of Kelso. He followed them up a bank and came upon Pyron hiding in the grass.

Pratt brought up his gun. He won the fight.

Pyron was put in jail in Kelso, then after showing Sheriff Hoggatt the exact spot that he had followed to Gardner on Saturday, a few hours after his escape.

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Fiesta Fund
Left Nest
Egg for '22

Approximately 10 per cent of this year's Rose Festival fund will be left as a "nest egg" for the next Rose Festival, after all outstanding bills are paid. All bills should be settled by Tuesday as a meeting has been called for this evening to consider final settlement.

These announcements were made at the members' forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce at noon today by O. W. Mielke, president of the Rose Festival association, who presided at the presentation of Rose parade awards to the prize winners. Seventy prizes were distributed. H. J. Blasing, president of the Portland Rose society, presented special Rose exhibition silver cups to Thomas E. Wallace and Mrs. William Scott Nash, prize winners in the special Chamber of Commerce exhibit.

Announcement was made by Mielke that the special community prize award would go to the Elliott sector and that the name of the community would be engraved on the handsome community cup which will be on display at the library. H. R. Van Duzer, president of the chamber, was presented with three red bow neckties as a special award for the Queen's float, which was donated by the Chamber of Commerce. Chester A. Folger explained features of the new soldier's bonus act, which was approved at the referendum vote last week.

WILLAMETTE RIVER
BEGINS TO REcede

After attaining the highest flood stage in 27 years Sunday, the Willamette river began to fall slightly this morning and the weather bureau is sending out the advice that the 1921 flood danger is waning.

The river reached a stage of 24.3 feet Sunday and although the report shows the same stage this morning, E. I. Wells, district weather forecaster, said that the water had started to recede slightly. In 1899 the river reached a stage of 24.2 feet, but a higher stage in the river than that recorded this morning has not been attained since the 33 foot flood of 1894.

At Lewiston the Snake river fell .5 of a foot despite warm weather in the Snake river drainage territory. At Wenatchee the Columbia river was reported down .3 of a foot and at Umatilla the river had fallen .2 of a foot. Cooler weather is being recorded in the Columbia river basin.

The weather bureau reports that the river will fall slowly at Portland during the next three or four days.

THREATENED LEAK CHECKED
IN DIKE SOUTH OF KELSO

Kelso, Wash., June 13.—A threatened leak in the dike of District No. 4, south of Kelso, was quickly checked Saturday night and the condition of the dikes remains good with the exception of the upper unit of District 3, where a seepage is considerable and an extra pumping plant is being installed. Here a board was built on the top of the dike to allow a low plane to be run, and water stands a board high on this wall. It has not yet broken through, nor is it likely to.

The Dalles, June 13.—The Columbia here this morning had dropped a foot in the 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock, to a stage of 41.7 feet. The river is going down steadily, the turning point occurring some time Saturday night, and it is thought further danger of high water is over. Half the business district basements are still flooded.

Portland Woman
Hurt When Train
Strikes Machine

Eugene, Or., June 13.—(U. P.)—Mrs. H. W. Smith of Junction City last night, about 7:20 o'clock, when a Southern Pacific train, traveling about 40 miles an hour, struck the automobile in which she and her husband were riding. The car was thrown about 60 feet, according to Mayor C. O. Peterson of Eugene, who rushed Mrs. Smith to the University City for medical attention. She sustained injuries about the head and face, but the husband was not hurt, it is reported.

In some manner they managed to free themselves from the car just as the box engine box down upon them, according to meager details reaching here. It is supposed that they did not hear the train as they approached the crossing.

COURT ORDERS
EILERS HELD
BY MARSHAL

Federal Judge Bean Takes Drastic Action to Compel Music House Man to Produce Books Needed in Lengthy Litigation.

United States Marshal George Alexander was ordered this morning by Federal Judge Robert S. Bean to take Hy J. Eilers, president of Oregon Eilers Music House, into custody until Eilers produces the records of his corporation which the court has demanded. The order was given from the bench at 10 o'clock this morning.

"It thus appears that Mr. Eilers has continuously and apparently studiously obstructed the proceedings in this estate," said Judge Bean.

COURT NOT SATISFIED
"His excuse is that these accounts are lost and he is unable to produce them, but the evidence is that they were taken, some of them by himself, and having disobeyed the order of 1918 impounding the books he is responsible for their production and the mere fact that he says now he cannot produce them, or that they are lost or misplaced is not sufficient to satisfy the court as to his good faith in this matter."

"Now the power of the court to punish for contempt is a power that should be exercised cautiously and I have endeavored to do so in this case. Indeed, I think I perhaps have erred on the other side rather than take any drastic measures to enforce the orders of the court but that time has now expired."

ORDERED INTO CUSTODY
"I am not disposed to further postpone the matter or give him any more opportunity to disobey the orders and obstruct this investigation and the order of the court is he shall be committed to the custody of the marshal until he produces these books and accounts, such others as the experts may wish or until he is further discharged by order of the court."

LABOR IS UNIDENTIFIED,
DECLARES GOMPERS

Auditorium, Denver, Colo., June 13.—The labor union movement has been tried in the fires of antagonism but still faces the world with ranks unbroken. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared in addressing the annual convention here today.

"The movement has survived all of the bitterness and antagonism that could be leveled against it," the veteran head of the labor organization declared.

SAYS UNIONISM FIRM

"The gigantic system of corruption and subordination made the drive against the unions under the guise of friend ship."

Gompers turned to the open shop movement.

"The open shop drive is designed to weaken the spirit of the laboring man so that they may lower the standards of life and further cut wages," the speaker said. "The labor movement stands intact—and will," he stated.

Before the next snow file the labor movement will pass the five million mark, he stated.

The open shop movement has been under way for two and one-half years, but they have not denied unionism, Gompers declared.

URGES ALLIANCE

Gompers urged labor organizations to make a close alliance with farmers of the country, "so the farmers and workers will not be crushed by the capitalists of finance."

The speaker said there was a drive on to destroy the federal department of agriculture and labor.

"We will do everything in our power to prevent such destructive legislation," Gompers said.

He said that labor cannot depart from the principle of "America first."

"Doing what we can to promote international good feeling, we must protect our own interests," he said.

It was his only reference to international questions with the exception of an expression of belief that disarmament will come.

"FIGHT TO FINISH"

The convention gave a resounding endorsement to the statement by S. P. Oplinger, temporary chairman, that labor would "fight to a finish" the open shop campaign.

"In our battle with the enemies of labor we will echo the words of a famous French general, 'They shall not pass,' Oplinger declared.

Mayor D. C. Bailey in welcoming the delegates declared Denver had less unemployment in proportion to its population than any other city in the country.

Oliver H. Schoup, Colorado's governor, and James C. Bulger, president of the Colorado Federation of Labor, delivered welcoming addresses.

Edward Keating, labor paper editor and former congressman in addressing the convention declared "Bourbonism drunk on war profits" was the real menace to the country. He stated, "Bourbonism had no great danger to America."

Keating referred to the assistance given the labor movement by the churches of the country.

"The attitude of churches of America has shown capital may control the finances and credit of the country but it cannot control its soul."

Ruth Raps Out Two
Homers in One Game

New York, June 13.—(U. P.)—Babe Ruth, although failing in his initial appearance as a pitcher this season, made two home runs in the New York-Detroit game this afternoon—his twentieth and twenty-first this year. One man was on base in the seventh.

MORRIS PLANS TO
SUE ETHERIDGES

Fred S. Morris, through his attorney, Martin L. Pipes, requested permission from Federal Judge C. E. Wolverton this morning to include Earl C. Bronough, trustee of the bankrupt bond house, in a suit which he intends to file in the state courts against Mr. and Mrs. John L. Etheridge.

After hearing the petition the court advised Pipes to go in touch with the trustee and ascertain his position with regard to the property in question and return with that explanation. "The matter will probably be decided by the court before the closing of court today," Pipes stated that Morris desires to bring suit against the Etheridges to recover the former Etheridge home in Irvington, against which he is said to hold two notes.

Etheridge bought the home originally from Morris and gave him a mortgage in return. Part of this mortgage has been paid off, according to the presentation made this morning by Pipes. When Etheridge left for the East a few days before the bond house crash came, he is said to have borrowed an additional \$10,000 from the house of Henrietta Morris, sister of Fred S. Morris.

According to Pipes, all the notes held against Etheridge by either Miss Morris or Mrs. Morris have been transferred to Morris and the latter is about to bring the suit for the purpose of collecting the mortgage.

Bronough, as trustee, has claimed the Etheridge home as part of the assets of the bankrupt estate. This claim prevails Morris from bringing the suit in the state court against Etheridge without first securing permission from the federal court to make Bronough a party to the suit. Bronough, who is an officer of the court, cannot be sued in his official capacity except with the court's permission.

Robbery Stories
Told by Man Who
Took Poison Vary

Eugene, Or., June 13.—(U. P.)—John A. Witt, a 25-year-old farmer of Vida, on the McKenzie valley, who is at the Eugene hospital suffering from the effects of an overdose of poison, will not die, it is thought. Witt, according to Sheriff Stickels, said that two men in soldiers' uniforms had forced him to swallow the stuff Friday night, but the doctor says that his condition was such that he could not have been ill with other amounts. As far as Stickels could tell at 5:45 o'clock Saturday morning.

At first he said that he was robbed of \$1800, later \$600, and then several other amounts. As far as Stickels could tell, he says, the man had not that much money in the banks he named, and had perhaps overdrew.

SEA COOK THOUGHT
MISSING IS FOUND

Barney Martin, cook on the Swift-scout, who was missed Friday and Saturday following a fight near the river bank with a group of unidentified men, was found Sunday at Beaverton by J. J. Sauer, chief gunner's mate of the navy recruiting station force.

When Martin left the vessel Friday night with Adolph Julian, messboy, both were set upon by a gang of men, whom, according to Julian, were striking seamen. Julian escaped after receiving a few blows. Martin was beaten and part of his clothing was torn from him. The clothing was found on the river bank Saturday, which led federal officials to suspect foul play. A search was instituted Saturday afternoon by department of justice agents to find Martin, but without result.

Late Saturday Martin appeared at the navy recruiting office and tried to get a group of sailors to go to Victoria Island, where he learned through press reports that Martin was missing he notified federal officials. According to Sauer, Martin signed up as a cook in the United States navy on October 21, 1920, but was discharged six months later for the good of the service.

Fire Attacks Army

Three in Auto Are
Killed by Electric
Train Near Seattle

(By United News)
Seattle, June 13.—Three persons were killed and another fatally injured Sunday when an automobile was struck by an electric interurban traveling 55 miles an hour at Algona, 15 miles south of here. Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gilmette and Mrs. Gilmette's father, O. L. Burruss, were instantly killed. All the victims are from Auburn. Mrs. Burruss is not expected to live.

Tacoma Banker Gets
Ten-Year Sentence

Tacoma, Wash., June 13.—(U. P.)—Ole Larson, former president of the defunct Scandinavian-American bank of Tacoma, convicted on two indictments charging him with illegally borrowing money from his bank, was sentenced to serve from three to 10 years on each charge by Superior Judge Askren today. The sentences are to run concurrently.

Cruiser Frederick
Is Last to Leave

Headed down stream the cruiser Frederick, flagship of Rear Admiral H. A. Fields, sailed for San Pedro, Cal., at 10 o'clock this morning. The ship had been in the harbor during the week to attend the Rose Festival. Lying in mid-stream below the Broadway bridge she was visited by thousands.

The Frederick was the last of the naval vessels to leave port. The American destroyers and the two Canadian ships left out Saturday afternoon.

JUDGE SAYS PROHIBITION
AGENTS RECKLESS

Wanton recklessness in the use of firearms was charged against the five prohibition agents who attempted to arrest Robert W. Hedderly the night he was shot and killed on the east side, according to an opinion read this morning by Federal Judge R. S. Bean.

MOTION DENIED

The statements were made in connection with the motion of three revenue agents, W. R. Wood, J. J. Higgins and D. C. Smith, for a new trial. The motion was denied. The two policemen who have not been tried are W. D. Morris and E. M. Jackson.

The agents had no warrant for the arrest of Hedderly, the court said, and failed to notify Hedderly that they were officers of the law or that he was under arrest before the shots were fired. The court intimated that Hedderly had been given the inference that the officers were holdup men.

Evidence in the case was that when Hedderly attempted to shoot Hedderly with his weapon that Hedderly refused to comply and speeded away in his automobile. All the officers but Wood fired at the car from their places of hiding. Hedderly died a short time later at the hospital.

Woman Hurt When
Auto Is Overturned

Albany, June 13.—Mrs. G. C. Wire suffered a broken collar bone and a broken shoulder when an automobile, driven by her husband, overturned near the Linn county fair grounds Sunday afternoon, resting upon its top. Miss Allie Worrell was badly bruised, Miss Naomi Bondine and Roberts Wire suffered minor injuries. They were on their way to a baseball game.

WOMAN HURT WHEN
AUTO IS OVERTURNED

At the hospital a pint flask of whiskey was found in Hedderly's pocket, and afterward a flask of colored water was found in the automobile. George Lewis, who was with Hedderly in the automobile before the shooting and who was arrested by Morris, testified that they intended to deliver the flask of colored water to a prospective customer, and to use the pint flask only to give their customer a sample.

The opinion was rendered in connection with the \$7500 damage suit which the widow brought against Morris and Jackson. The five agents have been freed on charges of manslaughter by a trial in the federal court.
