Honors at
Orpheum

SOME folks still doubt the contagious quality of a smile. They are among those who were not present at the Orpheum Sunday. These same folks, too, missed a new demonstration of the wonderful power of fame—the fame that put Trixie Friganza at the top of the bill when John Irving Fisher was so near at hand.

We're not trying to deny that Trixie, with her "Little Bag of Tricks," is entitled to very high ranking in a head-line type of entertainment, but rather seeking to agree with an unusually large late season audience in giving Fisher, in an act with Wallace Bradley and Grette Ardine, what's coming to him.

Trixie—she's a big girl now—brings a set of new songs and a new line of chatter that could only be improved by more of the same. Her monologue is a diverting treat, a careless bit of a chat with a bunch of good friends. Her songs, in the main, are pleasant little ditties whose welcome would be greater if she would refrain and cleanse that piece of bouboir gossip in which she spells out a salient salience to shield the ears of a 1-year-old stepson. The last song and dance lent up to much and in some ways enough to bring the mighty Trixie back for an encore.

She makes her entry in a great brown bag and when she doffs it, a black, spangled creation appears. Under that is another and another until her last, a cloth of gold gown with a Spanish twist to it, reveals very plainly that Trixie is in the polka, take off another stitch.

Getting back to Bradley, Ardine and John Irving Fisher, Bradley is a speedy dancer and his voice is good. Grette Ardine is a natty little beauty with an athletic ability as great as her dancing prowess. She makes no pretense at song. Their act, "Polka of Song and Dance," is a clever thing, fully warranting headline type, in a beautiful setting that lends a cozy, intimate sort of an atmosphere to reflect that as one of the most popular acts of the season, it is bound to be the easiest thing he knows. Meanwhile he has been nonchalantly inspecting the front rows, casting occasional glances at the cheering, confounding, smile imaginable. That smile stops the show.

At the end of the bill come Van Horn and Inez (Mr. and Mrs. Earl Van Horn), Portland youngsters on roller skates, whose startling array of novelties heaped applause upon them. They are at least equal, if not far better, than any team of the kind local audiences have seen.

The opening act is Home Romaine, an aerial eccentric with some spectacular stunts. He is a pleasant bit of springtime fun, with a number of bad puns, much in evidence throughout the day.

The Hawaiian troubadours, with their excellent instrumental and vocal numbers and native dances, provided entertainment for the grown-ups. Cane-pole parties were plentiful, and a few of the border spirits were bathing in the river.

Toward night a party of bold, bad pirates, in true pirate costumes, appeared on the grounds and for a time were the center of attraction. The lights came on and made the place a fairland.

A day of pure, clean, wholesome enjoyment, typically American, that sent the crowd home cheerfully tired, was the reward for the outing.
