Precipitation has occurred along the North Pacific coast, along and near the Canadian boundary, and at a number of southwestern stations. A thunderstorm occurred at North Head, Wash. The weather is much cooler in parts of Washington, Idaho, Arizona, and Illinois, and is much warmer in Northern Saskatchewan. The temperature is still above normal except over parts of the Pacific slope and in the extreme North.

Diphtheria Cases at Baby Home Curbed
City Health Officer Parrish states that the outbreak of diphtheria at the Waverly Baby home apparently has been curbed, as no new cases developed yesterday and the six babies and two adults afflicted with this disease are doing well and in no danger. Dr. Parrish says he hopes to be able to lift the quarantine within a short time.

Growers to Operate Old Packing Plant
Operations at the old Sellwood Packing company will be taken over by an organization of the fruit and berry growers in the vicinity of Portland, according to an announcement made by M. E. Lee, Portland realty dealer. Lee has directed

the formation of the growers into an organization to do their own canning on a cooperative basis. He states canning will be started this month.

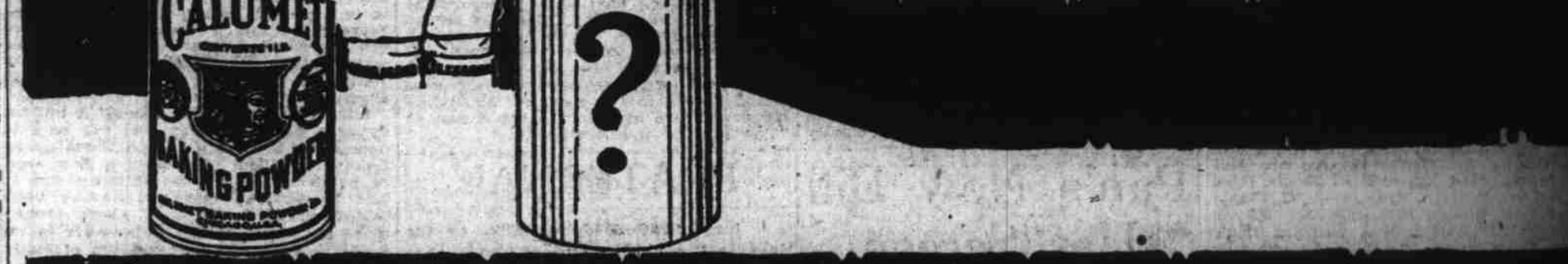

Snake Stationary From New Floods; Columbia Falling
Extended hot weather in the Southern Idaho territory has stopped the fall in the Snake river, which remained stationary this morning, while the Columbia river continued to fall slowly at Wenatchee. Despite the new brush of flood waters in the Snake, weather bureau officials feel confident that a new rise will not send the waters higher at Portland. The Columbia river was falling all along its course this morning. The slightest fall was at Wenatchee, where a 2-foot reading was taken. At Portland the waters fell two-tenths of a foot overnight, and the Willamette river stood at the 24-foot stage this morning. The forecast is for the waters to continue to fall slowly for the next four days.

Liquor Offender Is Given 3 Months in Jail, Fine of \$500
M. Pigle swayed on unsteady legs before District Judge Bell Monday afternoon. "I don't want no attorney. I want a job working for the United States all my life," he shouted. Judge Bell fixed his eye coldly on the prisoner and said: "Your sentence will be a jail term of three months and a fine of \$500." Federal agents found Pigle at Patton road with 55 pints of white liquor. He insisted on an immediate trial, though against the advice of the agents who told him to sober up first. He recently finished a six-month term having liquor.
