Water Power Asked On Louise Creek to Develop Mine Mill
Salem, Or., June 18.—Freeland & Young of Grants pass have filed with the state engineer's office here an application for permission to appropriate water from Louise creek, tributary of Jump Off Joe creek, for the development of 50 horsepower to be used for milling purposes in connection with a hydro electric plant. The development is estimated to cost approximately \$30,000.

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Suggestions on Canning Fruit

(Retail price of strawberries for the week end was practically unobtainable. From 11.75 to 22 cents per crate for 24 boxes. Liberal stocks of Wilsons for canning are coming and this is the most favorable time to get them.) WHILE the crest of the strawberry season may be said to be over, there is still a large supply available and at some favorable prices. All canning and preserving of the berries should be done within the next few days, as the quality and size will not remain up to present standards much longer.

Strawberry and Pineapple Jam
Take ripe pineapples, peel, slice and core, and chop them fairly coarse, weigh and add an equal weight of ripe strawberries and pound for pound of granulated sugar; place all in preserving pan and cook slowly until the jam is thick, stirring well; put in jars and cover with paraffine.

Strawberry Jam
Take freshly gathered fruit, only barely ripe, place in a preserving kettle over a moderate fire, till the juice is flowing freely; the berries may be crushed a little with a wooden spoon; let simmer for about 25 minutes, then strain off and measure the juice; return it to the pan and boil fast for 10 minutes or so, while you heat the oven sugar to the amount of 12 ounces to the pint; stir the sugar in very gradually, a little at a time. This is best done with the pan off the fire. Boil up fast for a few minutes, until the jelly sets.

Strawberry Marmalade
Crush two pounds of strawberries and pass them through a sieve, then mix with them a strong syrup made with two pounds of sugar and cook until the marmalade is done.

Strawberry Preserves
Choose sound, clean berries, just under ripe. For every five cups set aside in a preserving kettle four cups of sugar and one cupful of water; bring this to the boil, then put in the berries and cook for ten to fifteen minutes, and shake the pan to and fro. Lift them out very carefully, one by one into glass jars, and on to form a border on the pan and allow the syrup another boil up for five minutes and pour it into the jars; let the strawberries settle down before covering the top, and, if need be, fill up with the syrup.
