

# HAPGOOD POINTS OUT SUBJECT FOR COOLIDGE'S PEN

 Washington, June 21.—Williams college did something mean to Vice President Coolidge Monday. While Amherst was listening to his words of spiritual persuasion, what possessed her sister college and traditional rival to deal a blow to all he stands for?  
 Williams gave an honorary degree to Judge George W. Anderson. This proceeding will force the overworked vice president to write a series of articles on the menace of thought in men's colleges to everything that civilization holds dear.  
 Coolidge is now running a series showing that the daring of the young ladies in their colleges is shaking the pillars of the world. After the behavior of Williams he will be compelled to get after the men.  
**SCOLDING PALMER**  
 George W. Anderson is the man who upset all right believing persons by scolding Palmer's department for not releasing a lot of long hair individuals who had been heard by detectives to say that they hoped some time in remote ages to live in a world somewhat different from the present.  
 I cannot offhand recall another case of a college conferring a degree on a man while he was a storm center on the side unpopular with the money ele-

ments. Did Williams today break all records?  
 Receiving the degree did not make Judge Anderson behave any better. He argued that if after defeating Prussia, we adopted Prussianism ourselves it would not prove much. Alluding to a now notorious speech made recently in London, he said:  
 "The world is told officially, if not authoritatively, that America went into the war for no foolish and flimsy moral and peace securing ideals; that we had no purpose to rescue humanity from all kinds of menacing perils; that we were simply 'afraid not to fight' in a word, that we went into the World war because we were scared into it."  
**NEES NO PLAN AHEAD**  
 After satirizing the ambassador's views, Judge Anderson indicated that he had reached the conclusion that the administration has no plan. As he put it: "We are simply drifting and acting in subservience to an ephemeral, shiftless, partisan opportunism." Then he asked what was the result.  
 "In the United States there are more unemployed than at any time in recorded economic history."  
 I think the judge is not quite fair to the administration. A high government official today expressed to me the view that the president does not realize that our troubles here grow out of failure of exports, that failure of exports grows out of demoralization in Europe and that therefore our home business will not recover until we help Europe get headed right. I think he does.  
 The Republican party is divided. That party has committed itself to a lot of things just because Wilson was committed to the opposite. Therefore the administration is embarrassed and politically harassed, but nobody is more convinced than the president and his cabinet that something must be done about Europe. If they do not act according to their thoughts it is because they are afraid of forces outside the cabinet.  
 Government experts will investigate the possibility of raising cotton profitably in Australia.

## Says U. S. Witness Talked With Juror Over Liquor Case

Charges that J. D. Hopkins, a government witness, talked to Sam Tunstall, a juror in the Ralph Constantino liquor case, were made in the federal court Monday by counsel for Constantino during the argument in which a new trial was asked.  
 Constantino was found guilty Thursday by a jury in Judge Bean's court on two counts of an indictment charging him with manufacturing liquor on his place at Bell station, on the Estacada line. Assistant United States Attorney Austin F. Fiegel, in his answer, stated that the juror did not talk about evidence in the case, but about a statement made by Hopkins on the witness stand when he claimed that Texas is the best state in the Union. Tunstall, a resident of Hillsboro, is said to have challenged the statement. Judge Bean took the petition under advisement.

## Chicken and Booze Report Bids Fair to End Labor Shortage

Kansas City, June 21.—(I. N. S.)—A rumor that fried chicken and Kansas corn whiskey was being served harvest hands in the wheat fields caused a rush at the federal employment bureau here today.  
 "Lead us to it," chanted four parched huskies from the east. The employment agent denied any such inducement as chicken and "corn" was being offered by farmers but hundreds signed up just the same. If the rumor persists the shortage of harvest hands bids fair to be speedily ended.

## Pumping Plant of Diking District Is Raised From River

Kelso, Wash., June 21.—The machinery of the pumping plant of diking district No. 5, west of Woodland, which was submerged by the freshet, was raised this week with the assistance of a diver. The machinery was not seriously damaged, nor had it been carried far from the place where the pumping plant had stood. The electrical equipment has been taken to Portland where it will be baked in a large baking oven for a month or so to remove all moisture from the coils.

## Wasco Cherry Crop Damaged Slightly; Shipments Continue

The Dalles, June 21.—Damage estimated at about 1 per cent was done to the cherry crop in Wasco county by the light rains Saturday and Sunday. This will not interfere with the carload shipments east, nine of which have already gone. Two of these were dispatched to Chicago and one to New York. Four more cars were being packed Monday night for early dispatch Tuesday.


