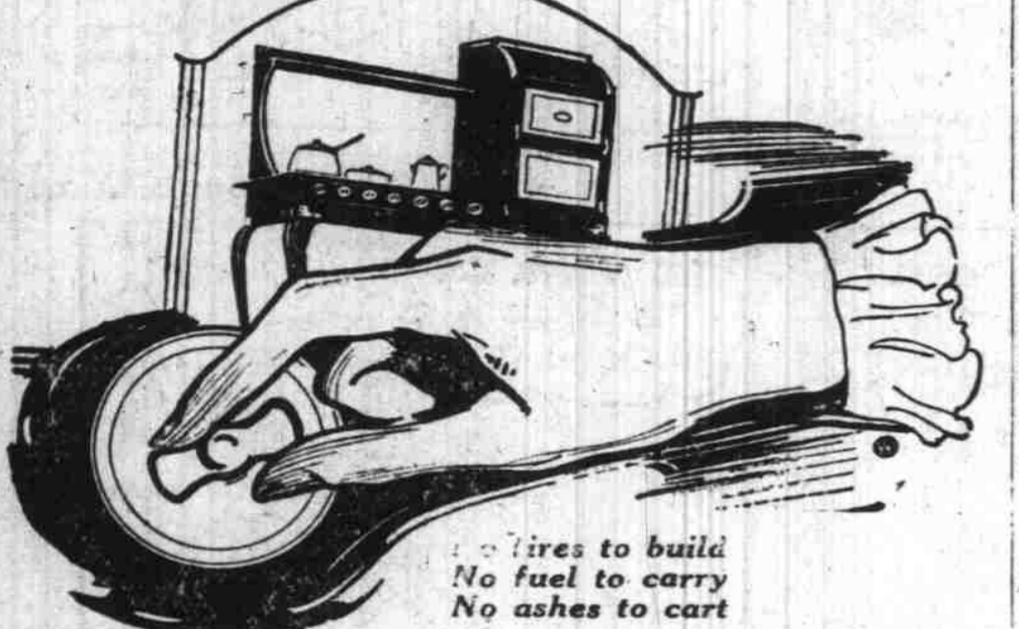
Bland, Mo., June 22.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Amanda Martin, 68, presented her husband, who is 70, with a bouncing baby boy today.

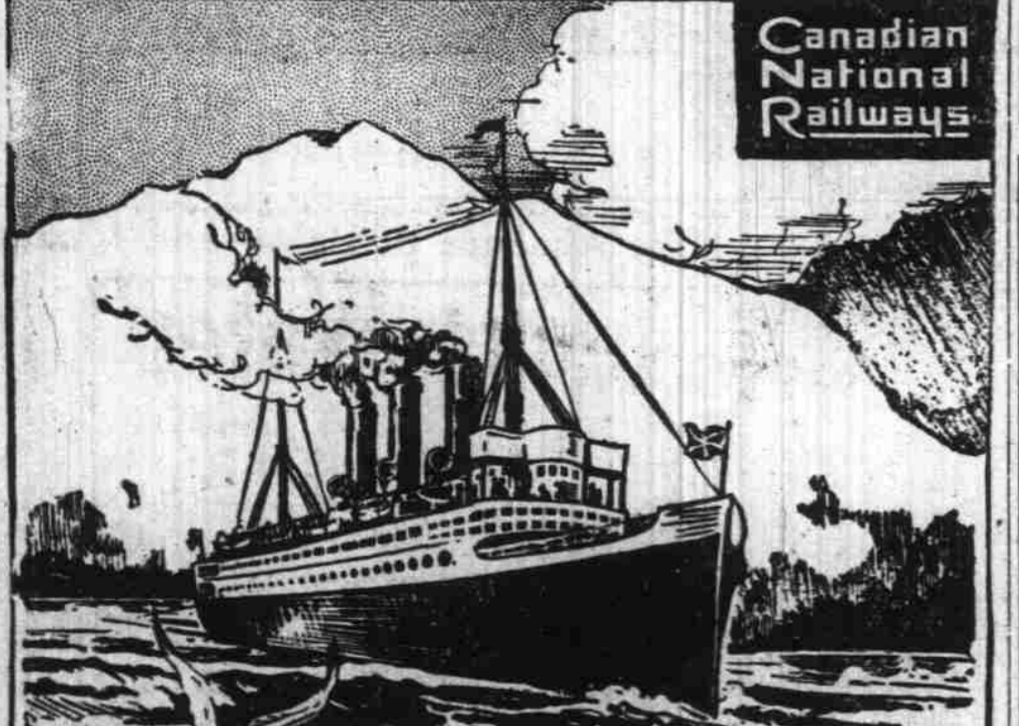

New York, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Enjoying a breathing spell for a day from the downward movement which had been steadily in progress for over a month, the stock market again became unsettled in the final trading today under a series of bear drives against individual issues.
