Officials of the department of commerce today were considering asking the army or navy for planes to patrol the little frequented stretches of coast near Cape Hatteras for some trace of the merchant vessels which have mysteriously vanished there.

While the number of vessels which have vanished is not unusual, the fact that no trace has been found of them and that so many were last heard from near the same spot, is unusual If they had blown up, ran aground or even captized, some bit of wreckage would float ashore which would explain their fate.
