

CHINESE LEPER IS STILL HERE; NEW HITCH DEVELOPS

Louie Poy, the Chinese leper, confined in a barred room in the basement of the isolation hospital out at Kelly Butte, and waiting day after day for deportation to the government leper colony at Carville, La., has almost lost faith in humanity. He has begun to look on this stuff about moving him as all "Melican talk."

Weeks ago, after strenuous efforts had been made by city officials and representatives in congress, the United States public health service finally advised that the government colony barracks at Carville would be ready to receive this patient "within three weeks." Poy brightened up at the prospect of a change.

Then came a long lapse and finally came the word that the time was set for leaving more than a week ago, but there came a hitch between the public health service and the railroad company in regard to the mode of transportation.

The government provides a compartment in a sleeper and a sleeping car section for the leper and his attendants. Representatives insist that this means practically hauling one car the entire distance between Portland and Baton Rouge, La., for the two fares and that in justice the company should be remunerated for that loss.

The matter has been appealed to Washington and the two fares and that about moving him is all a sham.

CRUSHED ROCK SHIPMENTS FROM ST. HELENS RENEWED
Supply of crushed rock for the use of the municipal paving plant is again available from the St. Helens quarries. The first movement since the high water, about 400 cubic yards, was brought to Portland Monday, and about the same amount today.

This rock will be used on the paving of East Thirty-ninth street from Woodstock to Henry street, where 1790 yards of crushed rock will be required. The next job on which crushed rock will be needed is the paving of East Forty-seventh street between Clark and Gilliam streets, where 9000 cubic yards of rock is required.

CITY SWIMMING TANKS WILL OPEN JULY 2 AND 3
Mrs. Felix Zaver and Walter F. Brodie, playground directors at Peninsula park, announce that the schedule for the swimming tank provides for the opening on July 2 for girls and July 3 for boys. The tank will then remain open for use until Labor day. Days for girls are Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 12 noon to 3 p. m. and Sundays from 11 until 2:30. For boys the days are Mondays and Wednesdays from 12 noon until 8 p. m. and Sundays from 3 to 8.

City Hall Briefs
Bids will be opened at the session of the city council on July 6 for the following public work:

The city civil service board has announced examinations as follows: July 22, instrument men for the engineering service; July 26, chairman for the engineering service; July 29, plan examiner and engineer, inspection service.
Civil service examinations for positions in the fire department will be held July 12 and 13. The examinations on the first date will be for promotions from the ranks of hosemen to lieutenant. Applicants must have served continuously as hosemen for two years from the date of their appointment after passing the civil service examination for hosemen. The examination on July 13 will be for hosemen, truckmen and drivers.

MAKES COVERTION
Cooley confessed, Sheriff Kendall says, that the robbery had been planned for Saturday night, but was deferred because no automobile could be secured. Cooley denies that the car employed Sunday night was stolen. He declares it was rented from "Skinny" Spence, whose father owns the car. The terms of the rental were, Cooley claims, \$25 or a gallon of moonshine.

The trial will be heard in the justice court this afternoon.

Cooley maintained this morning that he was expecting to be caught and was awaiting the Corvallis officials at a lumber camp at Blodgett.

Cooley said he was in the rear seat of the automobile at Halsey when the citizen posse began firing. He dropped to the bottom of the car and thus avoided the hail of shot that killed Henry Schultz and wounded William Schultz and William Wright, the other members of his party. Cooley says that when he found his companions to be wounded he released Wright at the steering wheel and drove the car to the east end of the Willamette river bridge at Corvallis.

There he alighted and hid in a thicket until after daylight.

Charges against Wright and Schultz probably will be filed late today. Meanwhile the prisoners will remain in jail. Both boys say the did not return the fire of the Halsey posse during the attack, although they were thoroughly armed with four guns Wright had procured from a sporting goods store where he was employed at Corvallis. Sheriff Kendall says he inspected the pistol and found only one of them had been fired. The other three were empty and had been tested previously and had not since been fired.

William Schultz is suffering from wounds caused by birdshot which struck him in the arm and the head. Wright, however, received the charge more directly.

The Schultz brothers and Wright served in the navy during the war.

Arrangements are being made by Frank Moore to have a special train for the delegation.

The convention at Eugene is expected to be the largest held in the state. Reservations in the Osburn hotel have been made for the married members of the post while the bachelors will be quartered in the various fraternity houses on the campus of the university.

One of the features of the convention will be the initiation of new members by the Forty Hommes at Eight Chevaux, the secret society of the legion. This ceremony will be held in the Eugene Armory and several of the delegates have been chosen for membership.

The newly organized state auxiliary will be in attendance. W. A. Elvers is president of the body.

Mrs. Agee Fails To Make Plea on Murder Charge
Throngs in the courtroom of Presiding Judge Kavanaugh this afternoon were disappointed when Mrs. Anna Louise Agee, charged with the murder of Harry Agee, her husband, failed to appear for formal pleading to charges against her. On account of the absence of her attorney in another court, Deputy District Attorney Graham moved that the hearing be set over until Wednesday at 2 p. m., which motion the court granted.

Judge Kavanaugh sentenced William Crombie, who pleaded guilty to forging some \$600 worth of checks, to three years in the penitentiary and paroled him pending good behavior. Earl Bump, who admitted the theft of \$117, was given two years and a parole, and Gordon Raymond, an automobile thief, was given three years and paroled because of his young wife.

All the paroles were granted because these were first offenses and the prisoners were young men.

School Director Rejected
Weston, Or., June 23.—At the annual school meeting John Banister was rejected director. He has completed his sixteenth year as a member of the local school board. Herman Goodwin was chosen clerk. The following teachers have been engaged: L. L. Robe, superintendent; Luella B. Pinkerton, Thelma Anderson, Hazel Duncan and Louise Rintoul. Esther Husband, a member of the high school faculty last year, will return.

HI ELLERS' TRIAL IS OPENED, AFTER TWO YEARS' DELAY

Hy Ellers, former head of the Ellers Music house, went on trial before Circuit Judge Stapleton today on one of the four indictments for larceny by embezzlement returned against him by the Multnomah county grand jury, in connection with alleged mishandling of the firm's money.

The specific charges in this case is that Ellers appropriated for his own use \$1000 of the funds of the Ellers Talking Machine company. He is alleged to have taken the money on February 15, 1913, and the indictment was returned on August 29, 1913. Many delays have been interposed, putting the case off for two years.

The morning was taken up in securing a jury. Thomas Mannix and Dan E. Powers, attorneys for the defense, laid stress on the question as to whether the recent publicity given Ellers as a result of bankruptcy proceedings in the federal court would influence the jurors.

Chief Deputy District Attorney Hamersley is handling the case for the state and is being assisted by Arthur Murphy and John Booz, the latter representing a music house of Chicago.

ACCUSED YOUTH SUBNORMAL, BUT HE MUST FACE TRIAL
Leon V. Starr, 17, one of the pair accused of attacking Mrs. Eva Knox last week ago, was examined in juvenile court Monday afternoon by Dr. S. C. Mohs, psychologist, and found to have the mentality of a boy of 13 or a few months older. Starr's mentality was declared to be "dull normal," but it was high enough to justify his being bound over to the circuit court for trial.

The Stanford-Binet intelligence test and the Kohs ethical discrimination test were used by Dr. Kohs. The former gave Starr a mental power of 85 per cent, that of a boy of 13 years 6 months; the latter gave him a mental power of 77 per cent, that of a 13-year-old boy. His mental growth has been obtained. Starr and Leonard Wilson are alleged to have invited Mrs. Knox to ride to town in their car and then attacked her.

STOPS PAYMENT OF CHECK; FINED ON GAMBLING CHARGE
H. J. Seck pleaded guilty to gambling and was fined \$25 by Circuit Judge Stapleton, but Paul Bradshaw, alleged to have been implicated in the same game, refused to fight it out in court and a returned a verdict of not guilty.

Seck gave Bradshaw two checks, amounting to \$115, and then stopped payment on them. Bradshaw sued for the amount and the case came up in district court. Seck stated that the checks were given for a gambling debt and that therefore he was not liable.

On the testimony of the two men in this case they were indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury.

AUTO DRIVER ON TRIAL ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE
Arnold Adler, charged with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Ida M. Stern, who was killed in an automobile accident on December 1920, went on trial today before Circuit Judge Duffy of Prineville, sitting in Judge Tucker's department. Adler is alleged to have run his car into Mrs. Stern's car and thrown her out against a streetcar.

Janitor's Claim Rejected
C. A. Green's suit for \$2333 overtime pay for work he claims to have done for the school board as janitor was thrown out of court Monday afternoon by Circuit Judge Duffy of Prineville, who decided Green produced insufficient facts to constitute a basis for action. The plaintiff, Deputy District Attorney Pierce pointed out to the court, failed to present his claim for overtime to the school board for audit.

Woman Gets \$1250 Verdict
Mrs. Rose Joseph, who sued the P. R. L. & P. company for \$20,000 damages as a result of a fall from a streetcar at Park and Washington street, was awarded \$1250 by a jury in Circuit Judge Bagley's court.

Gets \$1000 for Leg
Donald F. Foster, 5, will get \$1000 for the leg he lost under a Southern Pacific train, May 24, in East Third street. Suit was filed in circuit court for that amount Monday and judgment was confessed by the company.

Man Is Accused of Attacking Garage, After Family Row
J. Grenz had a hatchet, a wife and a garage. Early this morning he got mad at his wife—according to the story told the police.

With his hatchet he sought to demolish his garage. So effective was his attack that Mrs. Grenz became alarmed and called the police. Motorcycle Patrolmen Flemming and Jewell arrived at 763 Hood street in time to save a good portion of the garage.

MORRIS CREDITOR COMMITTEE BIDS ON ALL ASSETS

Following the sealing of the nine bids Monday noon for the assets of Morris Brothers, Inc., bankrupt bond house, a letter was received by Earl C. Bronaugh, trustee, from the creditors' reorganization committee, announcing the intention of the committee to bid on the entire assets.

The communication, which was signed by A. M. Panning, chairman, and James Cunningham, a member, states that the committee could not prepare a bid by noon Monday owing to its inability to get in touch with all the creditors and adjust financial matters.

The letter was written as a formal notice to Trustee Bronaugh, and in it the plans of the committee to purchase the entire assets were outlined. A bid for the entire assets, if unsold, will be made within 30 days, the communication states.

The trustee did not announce his position in the matter, but decided to turn the letter with the sealed bids over to Referee A. M. Cannon at noon Wednesday, the time set for opening of the bids. Should the referee and the committee decide to allow the creditors a little more time to submit their bid, they can defer opening of the bids received Monday.

The reorganizers have already received an extension of 60 days' time from April 23, and have not completed their work in the two months. If the nine bidders raise a serious objection to a further extension, the court may not take into consideration the request of the reorganization committee.

As Referee Cannon is out of the city no action will be taken today.

Britain Requests Japan for More Time on Treaty
London, June 28.—(U. P.)—Great Britain has asked Japan for a three month delay in renewing their alliance, the United Press was reliably informed today.

The reason advanced in a note asking the postponement was that the conference of the British premiers is just beginning to consider the question. Britain, it said, desires the premiers shall reach a decision before a new treaty is signed.

No mention was made of the American attitude toward the alliance.

DIRECTOR THOMAS' TRIPS FOR SCHOOL BOARDS ARE SCORED

Director George B. Thomas' junkets, past and in contemplation, meet with the disapprobation of the Southeast Portland Civic club, according to a communication sent to The Journal by Fred Van, its secretary.

In addition to expressing disapproval of the Thomas type trips the organization expresses its commendation of the stand taken by Director Shull in opposing them, and at the same time warns the board against again attempting to secure the authorization of a mill tax levy. The statement of the club's position, sent by Secretary Van, says:

"The Southeast Portland Civic club takes notice of the press reports regarding the junketing of School Director Thomas with enormous expense to the taxpayers. We as taxpayers of the city severely criticize the school board, and particularly Mr. Thomas, for the useless expense which his trips entail. The Journal reported that his various junkets have cost us up to this time more than \$4000, and it is difficult to gauge what the future expenses in trips will total. At this time when the cry for the lowering of taxes is heard from every side and when the 3-mill tax levy was defeated, such an act ought to stultify itself and receive the condemnation of every taxpayer.

"Mr. Shull's stand in opposing farcical trips must be commended. We should at this time suggest to the school board not to be tampering with the expenditure of the people by an attempt to bring up again the 3-mill tax measure."

Joe Colich Held to Grand Jury Quiz On Woman's Death
A coroner's jury Monday night investigating the death of Mrs. Matilda Super, who died at St. Vincent's hospital Saturday as a result of tetanus caused by wounds received several days before when she jumped from her back porch, ordered Joe Colich held for grand jury investigation. The action of the coroner's jury was due largely to conflicting testimony.

Mrs. Super is said to have jumped from the porch at the family residence 85 North Second street when some sort of disturbance was in progress in the middle of the night. Annie Super, 8 years old, testified that she saw Colich in the house with a knife in his hand running after the mother.
