

DAILY PERMIT IS DENIED FOLLOWING NEIGHBORHOOD TILT

The Kanton neighborhood controversy over the Charles Sumski dairy, which has had several slings before the city council, came to a climax today when the council by unanimous vote denied Sumski a new dairy permit for a location on the east side of Interstate avenue, near Winchell street.

Neighbors for a distance of five or six blocks appeared for and against the applicant and there were spirited passages between them. Sumski previously had a permit for a dairy, which later was revoked by the council. He then secured a new location, but this also raised a storm of protest, and after various persons had withdrawn their names from the protest there yet remained 14 thereon.

The matter, in the course of hearings, brought forth a written statement to the council from Dr. D. W. Mack, head of the milk division of the city health bureau, in which he declared that the system of granting permits to small dairies within the city is a menace to public health.

COUNCIL DELAYS ACTION ON FOSTER ROAD SEWER

Action by the city council on awarding the contract for construction of the Foster road trunk sewer will not be taken until Wednesday of next week. At that time Commissioner Barbur, in charge of public works, will recommend that the contract be awarded to J. F. Shea. Meanwhile Deputy City Attorney Latourette will file an answer in the circuit court to the suit brought by G. W. Chilson to restrain the city from proceeding with the work, and will urge speedy action by the court so that, if possible, the matter may be cleared away before time to award the contract.

ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING STAGE TERMINALS ADOPTED

The city council today adopted the ordinance providing for the establishment of interurban stage terminals within the city and designating the district within which such shall not be located. This ordinance is in conformity with the plans discussed at various meetings of the special traffic committee. The Oregon Interurban State Co-operative association today received from Salem its certificate of incorporation and will proceed at once to carry forward plans for the construction of its proposed union station on Couch street.

City Hall Briefs

The city council today granted permits for storage of gasoline to the Standard Oil company for 55-7 East Burnside street and to P. W. Goodrich for a location in Main street, between Second and Third streets.

The city council has referred to the special traffic committee the petitions of the St. Helens and Portland chambers of commerce asking that the speed limit be increased on the road to Linnton from 15 to 20 miles per hour.

Hearings on revocation of licenses were set by the city council today for 2 o'clock of next Wednesday afternoon.

At the same time plans for making of revoking the rooming house license of Margaret McDonald and the soft drink license of Jack Hayes and Carlo Borrelli.

The city council today turned down a proposal of the Best-Way Advertising company asking for a franchise to place sanitary trash receptacles on the streets.

Coal Company Favored

After viewing the premises, the city council today decided to overrule the protests and to grant a permit to the Albina Fuel company to erect and maintain a coal bunker on lots 4 and 5 of block 4, Broadway addition, 86 feet east of the east line of East Thirty-second street, in Sullivan gulch.

To Confer on Incineration

Acting Mayor Bigelow, City Engineer Laurgaard and the superintendent of the city incinerator are to have a conference today to discuss plans for taking care of the constantly increasing garbage of Portland. The incinerator, which has a daily capacity for handling 150 tons, is faced with the problem of trying to handle more than 180 tons.

Oregon Bankers to Evolve Plan to Aid Salmon Industry

Astoria, June 29.—A committee from the Oregon State Bankers' association has been appointed, it was announced today, to investigate the salmon industry and evolve plans for means of financing it during the present depression and overloaded condition of the market.

S. L. Eddy, vice president of the Ladd & Tilton bank of Portland, is chairman, with J. T. Burdick, assistant manager of the Bank of California, and W. A. Tyler, vice president of the Astoria National bank, as co-workers. These men will endeavor to devise means of stimulating the industry and finding a market for the product.

Drink With Kick Draws Fine

Vancouver, Wash., June 29.—Clark Groves and Gerald Kneaves, operating the Pastime billiard parlor in Camas, pleaded guilty to the charge of having grape juice with a kick in their possession and were fined \$150 and costs by Judge Vaughn. The sum total \$161.30 was paid.

Doctor Makes Denial

Dr. Paul C. Olson, who is charged with attempting to coerce Miss Gine Bratberg into paying a \$35 bill twice by the use of forms representing court processes, pleaded not guilty this morning before Federal Judge Wolverton. His trial was set for July 13.

HEALTH PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED BY LEADING DOCTORS

Problems confronting state, county and municipal health authorities are being threshed over and discussed by the county and city health officers of Oregon at their annual session here today.

The physicians were welcomed to the city, when their meeting was convened, by Acting Mayor C. A. Bigelow. He told the visitors that Portland has accomplished a great deal in the past by cooperating with the state board of health.

Dr. F. R. Menne, speaking on the laboratory as an aid in the diagnosis of communicable diseases, said it should be used more by physicians in diagnosing cases coming under their care.

FOOD SANITATION

Dr. Thomas Wynne Watts spoke on the diagnosis of the eruptive communicable diseases and N. C. Maris, speaking for C. L. Hawley, state dairy and food commissioner, who could not be present, took for his subject the sanitation of foods.

He exhibited samples of milk containing sediment which he said was the result of carelessness and lack of cleanliness.

Dr. G. S. Whiteside, talking on the venereal problem, told the physicians that in his opinion social diseases were gradually being brought under control through the activity of federal, state and city officials as a result of legislation enacted during the last 10 years.

This afternoon Dr. E. A. Sommer will speak on public health education in the public schools. He is expected to strike out boldly at individuals and organizations who are seeking to prevent physical examinations, sanitary training and vaccinations in the schools of the state.

OUT-STATE REPRESENTED

Fifty or more city and county physicians are here from different sections of the state for the meeting. Tonight the state board of health will hold a short meeting for the purpose of certifying the attendance of the physicians who have come to Portland to be present at the meeting.

The meeting will continue in session Thursday and Friday, but the business sessions will be completed today. Tomorrow the doctors are going in a body to visit the new isolation hospital where a program is to be presented under the direction of Dr. George H. Parrish, city health officer.

\$200,000 GAP IS FACING SCHOOLS

\$845,000 and for grounds \$105,000, a total of \$950,000.

According to the estimate of R. H. Thomas, clerk of the board, it will be necessary to carve some \$200,000 out of the budget items other than buildings and grounds, if the building program is carried out.

Director Shull believes that, if necessary, it will be possible to curtail the building plan this year, and suggests that the contemplated additions to the Rose City Park school could be abandoned temporarily and that section continue to use the 10 portable buildings now there. At the same time the assembly hall for the Alameda school could be delayed and the money thus saved could be used in constructing a "cottage type" school of Arleta, which is badly in need of additional room. These, however, are chance suggestions and will have to be worked out by the board.

The suggestion is also made by Director Shull that quite a sum could be saved by increasing the room population over what it is now.

The most obvious condition presented by the statement given Mr. Shull is that the money voted for the construction of new buildings and the purchase of additional grounds, has been squeezed by the general demands of the district until it is necessary either to cut \$200,000 from other portions of the budget or fall that amount short of the sum specially voted by the people for those purposes.

The board will meet this evening, at which time Mr. Shull will lay the statement before it and a start at least will be made in an attempt to keep the financial demands of the district within its pocketbook.

NEW BUDGET ROUNDUP IS DAWES' LATEST

fiscal affairs are concerned. He will come and go within the departments of cabinet officers without consulting them.

GRANTED WIDE AUTHORITY

This wide authority—greater than has been accorded any other officer of the government—has been given General Dawes with the full consent of the cabinet itself.

When the meeting opened this afternoon, General Dawes read to the assembled cabinet heads and bureau chiefs the following statement:

"The permanent success of the budget system in the United States depends upon certain basic principles which at its inception must be so firmly established, both as concepts and as rules of action, that they will never be hereafter questioned."

"The budget bureau must be impartial, impersonal and non-political."

"The director of the budget in the matter of government business administration has no responsibility under the law save for the administration of his own bureau. He is simply an adviser to the president and congress in the matter of correcting business administration."

"The director of the budget in the gathering information for the use of the president, acts for the president; and he calls upon the chiefs of bureaus and other administrative offices for purposes of consultation or information take precedence over the cabinet head of a department, or any head of an independent organization."

"The budget representative in each department, being appointed by the cabinet head, will present to the director of the budget the views of the cabinet head, upon the wisdom of conclusions drawn by the director of the budget, for the use of the chief executive and congress; but, as in the case of bureau chiefs and other officers, the call of the director of the budget for their presence and advice takes precedence over the cabinet head."

Taxation estimates which have genuinely alarmed administration leaders have been produced in congress and are directly responsible for the haste which the administration is putting into the budget plans.

One set of these figures—which aroused widespread comment showed that unless rigid and drastic economy is put into effect at once, every man, woman and child in the United States will, theoretically, contribute \$60 next year to the upkeep of the federal government alone, aside from the state, municipal and county taxes.

PRESIDENT TO SPEAK

With the addition of these latter the per capita tax for every man, woman and child in the United States next year will be around \$82, it has been estimated by congress.

For the average American family of four persons this amounts to the amazing total of more than \$325 for each family.

The president himself opened one of the most unusual meetings ever held in the capitol shortly after 2 o'clock.

The president spoke briefly and with an earnestness that was apparent and then he turned the meeting over to the picturesque new director of the budget.

PRESIDENT TALKS

The president addressed the gathering merely as "fellow workers" and said: "It is doubtful if a meeting like this was ever held before. I am glad to have you and to stand sponsor for this meeting. This administration is committed to a period of economy and specifically in government."

When the president had concluded General Dawes took charge of the meeting. He threw his hat to one side and "tore into" his subject. He said he wanted every person present to understand that his duty was collecting information for the president.

"First keep in your minds," he said, "that I am only a gatherer of information. It is your duty to get the facts and to seek material for criticism or for praise, but to get information for the head of this great business corporation—the United States."

General Dawes featured his speech with frequent poundings of the table. Frequently he looked back at the president who nodded approval.

The president for the first time in history is appearing in effect, the rules of business such as obtain in any well run corporation," continued Dawes.

None of the bureau chiefs present, Dawes said, could tell him anything about the duties and responsibilities of a bureau chief.

"I was one 20 years ago myself," said Dawes, "and I understand you, in making up your estimates, grabbed for all you could get from congress. You more or less had to for self protection. A rule has prevailed among you never to figure on minimum expenditures."

Dawes said he would start out with a pledge to reduce the appropriations for his own bureau 25 per cent during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

"ESTABLISH A MARK," he said, "There's a mark for you to shoot at," he said, pounding the table.

There was dense silence at this remark and not a ripple of applause greeted it. Apparently the bureau chiefs present, or a large number of them, did not believe it possible.

"I am not going to get very far with you," said Dawes, "unless you believe I am honest and if the president will excuse me, strictly on the square."

Dawes turned to the president and the latter nodded approval.

"I did not realize the immensity of my task," continued Dawes, "until I came to Washington and found that Hays, Mellon and Weeks did not believe any radical reductions in the expenditures for the present year were possible. So far as I know the rest of the cabinet are of the same opinion, although I have talked only with those three."

General Dawes didn't mind his words, nor was he in any apparent awe of all the rank present.

"Some of you are not on your toes yet on this proposition," he said, facing squarely the members of the cabinet. Some of you have been yet given the name of your budget representatives and I want to tell you now that I want these names tomorrow."

When he had finished speaking, Dawes looked out over his audience and said: "Now all of you bureau chiefs rise to your feet and pledge to the president that you will meet this test."

Everyone rose and then resumed their seats.

"I thank you for your commitment," President Harding said.

Walter Prichard Eaton, magazine writer, dramatic critic and author of Boy Scout stories, was a Portland visitor Tuesday. Accompanied by Mrs. Eaton he arrived in the city Monday preparatory to a trip he is making through the Crater Lake district and the Cascade mountains.

This is Eaton's first trip to Oregon. He expressed himself as being happily pleased with the scenery. Scenery is going to be his stock in trade this summer, for he has agreed to write articles on the Oregon country for the New York Times and he wants to see as much of Portland and its tributary territory as can be crowded into a five weeks' stay.

Today Mr. and Mrs. Eaton will leave with Fred H. Asner and pay for South Central Oregon. They will visit Crater Lake and then move out into the heart of the Cascades and make camp. Returning the party expects to climb Mount Hood.

Eaton's home is in Sheffield, Mass. He won fame some years ago with his series of bird house stories based on observations made in forest and field.

A group of Boy Scouts met Eaton at the Union station on his arrival in Portland Monday night and escorted him to the Multnomah hotel.

ARMAMENT BLOCKS U. S. IN REDUCING EXPENSES

United States out of the League the strength of each power depends upon special combinations with other powers and until America comes forward with a better plan for an association of nations to embrace all countries and participates in it, the chances of a general disarmament program will not be bright.

TALK CONSIDERED ACADEMIC

The disarming plan for an association of nations has already been outlined sufficiently for the European mind to understand that under no circumstances will America assume any obligation to preserve peace, especially as regards quarrels in Europe. The European countries maintain armies and navies largely to protect themselves against local disturbance, which, like that in the Balkans, developed in a world-wide war and, inasmuch as America will not agree to throw her power into the scales, European diplomats look upon talk from the United States about disarmament as merely academic.

Harding has hesitated to make known his disarmament plans. Senator Borah has been forcing the issue, but the position of the Idaho senator is itself the biggest paradox of all. He is the leader of the nationalist group which sincerely believes America should have nothing to do with Europe and should do nothing to guarantee European peace, and yet, on the other hand, he is so strong in insisting that Europe give up her means of defense without offering any help from America to insure against possible war.

EUROPE COULD PAY

Behind the disarmament problem is the larger subject of a League of Nations, and the cutting down of military and naval budgets everywhere so that America can get back some of the big sums of money she lent Europe during the war. In other words, if Europe ceased spending

imposing large income taxes on its citizens in order to get the money to pay interest on liberty, he is wrong in insisting that Europe give up her means of defense without offering any help from America to insure against possible war.

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
