

BOOKS SUBMITTED IN LARCENY CASE AGAINST HY EILERS

Books and records of the Eilers Talking Machine company, were introduced as evidence today in the case of the state of Oregon against Hy Eilers, who is charged with larceny by embezzlement of \$1000 of the firm's money.

A. W. Brookings, at present cashier of the Ladd & Tilton bank and formerly with the music house, today took the stand and identified the records of the company which were produced by the state. Among these were ledger sheets, certificates of deposit in the First National bank of Portland, which feature in the case, and, especially, deposits in the Cornell special account of \$1000.

Eilers is alleged to have taken \$1000 from the funds of the company and deposited it to the account of his bookkeeper, W. L. Cornell. This money he later converted to his own use. It is alleged.

Arthur Murphy, formerly deputy district attorney, who is associated with Joseph Hammerley and John Booz in the prosecution, stated in his opening argument that Eilers instructed Samuel McCormick, president of the talking machine company, to open the special account in the Ladd & Tilton bank in the name of W. L. Cornell.

On February 15, 1918, Murphy alleged, Eilers told McCormick to withdraw \$1000 from the firm's funds and deposit it to Cornell's account. Another \$1078 was deposited to the account a week later, he charged.

In March, 1918, a part of this money was drawn in favor of Mrs. Mabel Lavanway, Murphy alleged, and the money ultimately returned to Eilers' pockets.

Tom Mannix of counsel for the defense avoided the argument on the checking account in his opening statement and contented himself with hurling charges that Eilers had been persecuted by John Booz of Chicago and other representatives of creditors.

Hoffman Millinery Store Takes Lease
The entire ground floor of the Eaton hotel building at West Park and Morrison streets, with the exception of the space occupied by the hotel lobby, has been leased by the Hoffman Millinery company. The lease runs for a period of five and one half years and the aggregate rental called for is approximately \$85,000. The property is owned by A. B. Steinhach. The Hoffman Millinery company now occupies a portion of the space covered by the lease.

Woman Is Accused
Elizabeth Stetson was arrested Tuesday night on a charge of larceny following a complaint filed by J. Gaynor, who alleges that she stole a pair of \$50 earrings.

Three Creditors of Transportation Co. Would Guard Rights

Three creditors of the Transportation Marketing company filed an involuntary petition in bankruptcy against the concern Tuesday in the federal court, alleging that they had paid \$500 each into the capital stock of the company, and that since that date the concern had committed an act of bankruptcy by going into the hands of a receiver. They also objected to C. Wilson acting as receiver, contending that he was one of the stockholders, and asked the court to restrain Wilson from disposing of any of the assets. The petitioning creditors are P. C. Rifenberg, M. C. Rifenberg and C. M. Johnson.

Marshall Fraser, who organized the company, was recently sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge Gaten after conviction of violating the blue sky law in connection with the selling of stock in the Your Transportation company, organized in Columbia county, Washington, and stock of which was sold in Oregon.

While the trial on this count was going on Fraser and his associate organized the Transportation Marketing company in Portland. Both companies were based on the scheme of having working men purchase \$500 worth of stock and giving them jobs with the concern.

Fraser and his associates were recently indicted in connection with the affairs of the latter company and they are now awaiting trial.

Charges of Theft And Passing Forged Check Face 2 Men

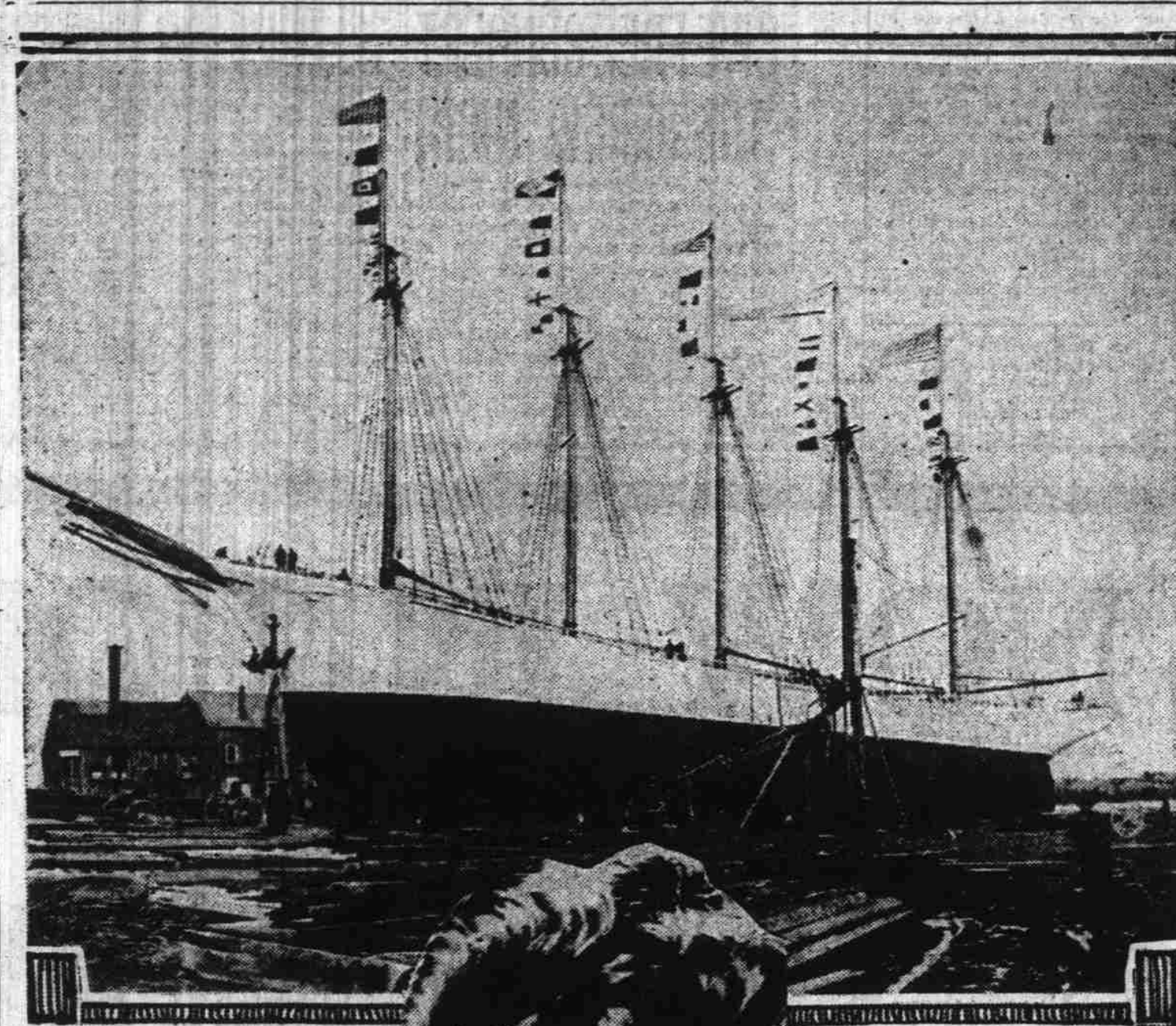
Charges of passing a worthless check and stealing jewelry at the L. R. Matthews jewelry store, 1651 East Thirtieth street, were placed against Ernest Mills and B. A. Eskew this morning following an alleged attempt of the pair to make a "cleaning" from Matthews. Both are being held under \$1500 bonds for the grand jury.

Mills and Eskew drove up to Matthews' store in a taxicab this morning and went into the shop to have a check cashed. Matthews claims that while he had his back turned examining the check that 11 Shrine emblem pins were taken. Suspecting that the check was forged Matthews called the police and Inspector Miller arrested the pair. Three other checks aggregating \$110, which are also supposed to be forged, were found on the men.

Charge of Theft of Trousers Loses Out

A directed verdict in favor of J. H. Hickey, alleged boxer thief, was ordered this morning by Federal Judge Bean at the request of the defendant's attorney, John Collier, who stated that the government had failed to produce enough evidence to warrant the case going to the jury. Hickey was released from custody by the marshal. He had been charged with stealing several pairs of trousers from a boxcar in the Albina yards. The contention was that the government failed to identify the alleged stolen property in the grand jury indictment.

\$100,000,000 Road Expenditure in 10 Year Period Is Seen

Oregon within the decade will have spent \$100,000,000 for improved roads—50 per cent from the state, 25 per cent from the counties and 25 per cent from federal cooperation, said R. A. Booth, chairman of the state highway commission, before the Ad club at the Benson this afternoon. By 1925 one highway will be completely paved across the state—the Pacific highway—he further said.

C. H. Purcell, district representative of the government in road building credited to Oregon one of the most advanced road construction programs in the United States, and added that this will be the first state west of the Mississippi to belt the entire state with a paved highway. Musical features were offered by Miss H. Tryon and H. R. Johnson. County Commissioners Holman and Rudeen were guests.

Brave Boy Saves Young Woman and Child From River

Astoria, June 29.—Chester Moats, 14, saved two lives Tuesday, when he plunged into the upper Youngs river and dragged Miss Ina Capps, 23, and Gerald Stroh, 6, both unconscious, to the bank, where they were revived.

The two were in a rowboat with Gerald's two older sisters. The child fell overboard. When Miss Capps leaped to his rescue he fastened a frantic grip upon her. Both sank several times. Moats swam out from the bank to save them.

War Veterans Hurl Fight Challenge at 'Red Flag' Speaker

Detroit, Mich., June 29.—(U. P.)—Bursting into the hall where the national convention of Socialists was being held this morning, 75 veterans, delegates to the convention of Disabled American Veterans of the World War, demanded an explanation of a speech made yesterday in which the speaker is said to have declared "there is only one flag, the red flag," and demanded that the Socialist delegate who had any such idea "step out and fight."

Cameron King, Socialist editor, and Algoner Lee of New York city, replied the convention had taken no action as yet, although no full explanation was given them, and the veterans withdrew. Although their entrance into the Socialist convention hall was a complete surprise, the veterans did not create any disorder.

16-Foot Octopus Is Killed After It Had Fastened Onto Boy

Eureka, Cal., June 29.—A 16-foot octopus was killed near the old shipping ways at Samoa, Humboldt county, late Tuesday, after it had fastened its tentacles on George, the 8-year-old son of Captain O. Petersen of the tug Ranger. The child was wading in the shallow water while his two older sisters, Geraldine, 9, and Marie, 12, were paddling about in a boat. The boy's screams alarmed the sisters and they frantically attacked the sea monster with their oars. The octopus lashed out with its other tentacles and wrenched an oar from the hands of the younger sister, Marie, using her oar bayonet fashion, partially stunned the octopus, which loosed its hold on the boy's leg and crawled to the rocks, where it was beaten to death. Later the children killed another octopus of about half the size of the first.

Building Collapses; Twelve Are Injured

Denison, Texas, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Twelve persons were seriously injured today in the collapse of a three story building. It is understood that more than 25 persons were in the structure at the time. Firemen and police were searching in the wreckage for bodies, but it is not believed that any lives were lost.

G. A. R. Vets Will Attend Reception To Mrs. Goodman

Members of the Grand Army and allied organizations will be guests at Betsy Ross tent No. 1 of the Daughters of Veterans at a reception held at 8 o'clock Thursday night in honor of Mrs. Nellie M. Goodman of Boston, Mass., national president of the order. The reception will be held in room 525 of the courthouse and will follow a meeting of Betsy Ross tent scheduled for 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Mrs. Goodman arrived in Portland on a tour of inspection Tuesday night. She will leave Friday.

5 Grain Warehouses And Wheat Burned Near Pendleton

Pendleton, June 29.—Five grain warehouses and an elevator with about 100,000 sacks of wheat were destroyed by fire at Myrick station, five miles north-east of here, this morning. The blaze is supposed to have started from fires set by railroad section men burning grass.

The loss is estimated at about \$150,000 and is well insured. Three of the warehouses belonged to the Pacific Coast Grain company, one to H. W. Collins and one warehouse and the elevator to the Myrick Elevator company.

House Rejects Plea For Aviation Station

Washington, June 29.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—The house today rejected a motion by Representative Miller of Washington to accept an amendment to the naval bill providing \$600,000 for an aviation station at Sandpoint, Wash. This is especially advocated by Senator Poindestor, and is expected to lead to further struggle in conference. The house voted it down, 84 to 30.

Business Block at Union Wiped Out

La Grande, June 29.—Damage estimated at \$25,000 was done by a fire at Union when almost an entire block in the business section of that town was wiped out by fire. Only a small portion of the loss is covered by insurance.

Endeavor Delegates To Take Leave for East on Thursday

On Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock the Christian Endeavor delegates will leave the Union depot for the 1921 international convention in New York city. Much interest is being taken in this event as with the delegates goes an official invitation to the trustees of the united society to allow the 1921 international convention to be held in Portland. Mrs. W. R. Corbett and Ward Robinson officially represent Multnomah county, and several others are going from among the state officers. Endeavorers are asked to be at the depot and give the delegates a good send-off.

Giolitti Refuses to Form New Cabinet

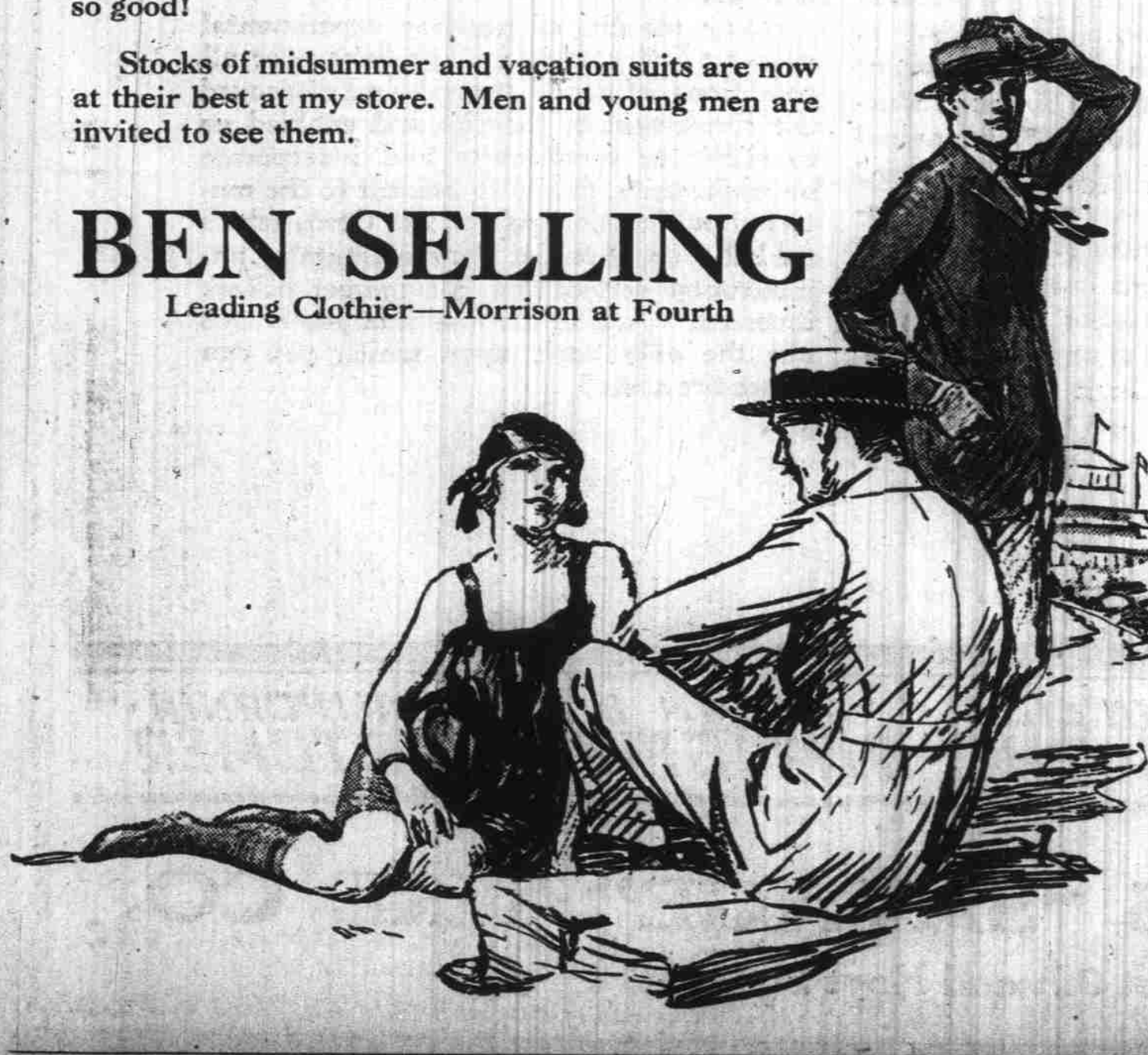
