

CORNELL ACCOUNT IS EXPLAINED AT HY EILERS' TRIAL

W. L. Cornell, former secretary of the Eilers Talking Machine company, took the stand in Circuit Judge Stapleton's court today in the case of the state against Hy Eilers, charged with embezzlement, and testified as to the "Cornell special account" in the Ladd & Tilton bank, through the manipulation of which Eilers is alleged to have made away with the firm's money.

Cornell stated that Samuel J. McCormick, then president of the talking machine company, gave him a \$1000 check on the Canadian Bank of Commerce on February 5, 1918, with directions to cash it and deposit the cash in his own name in the Ladd & Tilton bank.

Other witnesses were L. B. Potter, auditor of the Ladd & Tilton bank; H. W. Sifton, trustee in bankruptcy for the Eilers Music house, and C. B. Seawall, cashier of the Eilers Music house. They testified that they were in a perfectly healthy condition. The defense maintains that this was done in a lawful manner.

OTHERS TESTIFY
McCormick, who was on the stand Wednesday afternoon, testified as to the Cornell special account and said that its purpose was to have money which creditors could not get at in case of a business failure. He testified that he had no knowledge of the handling of the account by telegram and letters, he stated.

Roth to Pilot Journal Plane Run to Seaside Begins Friday

Pilot Archie Roth, with a great record of successful flying to his credit, today was designated by Victor Vernon, general manager of the Oregon, Washington & Idaho Airplane company, to direct the course of flight of The Journal's giant Sea-gull hydroplane on the first newspaper delivery of the 1921 season to Seaside and Astoria Friday afternoon.

Vernon, with Roth as a passenger, this morning flew from the Lewis & Clark field landing basin to the foot of Yamhill street, where they tested the capacities of a new hydroplane slip constructed especially for the use of The Journal plane.

The slip served its purpose admirably and is so built that, when the high water has receded, the Journal automobile trucks can back up against the float and deliver its load of bundled papers directly to the pilot.

From this slip each week day about 2 p. m. The Journal plane will rise and head for Seaside. Approximately 80 minutes will be allowed for the flight to

After the first flight Friday afternoon Roth and Pilot Jack Clemence will alternate on the air delivery trips, with Victor Vernon filling in when occasion demands.

FINANCING PLANS FOR 1925 FAIR ARE BEING PREPARED

Pessimism is the enemy of progress and as such was definitely defeated at a meeting of 60 prominent Portland business men in the Old Colony club rooms of the Multnomah hotel Wednesday afternoon. The meeting was called by Julius L. Meier, chairman of the executive committee for the Atlantic-Pacific Hydro-Electric exposition, to discuss plans for financing the fair to be held here in 1925.

The meeting went on record as enthusiastically favoring the exposition and the finance committee was instructed to prepare a plan for raising \$3,500,000 by subscription and taxation to put the project across. With the exception of A. L. Miller, president of the First National bank, the business men who addressed the meeting were practically unanimous in their support of the exposition.

MILLS ASKS ABOUT MONEY

Mills qualified his support of the enterprise with the suggestion that a definite assurance of sufficient funds to carry the fair through successfully should precede any other plans for the big exposition. Financial conditions are such that it would be hard to raise enough money to put the exposition over, he said.

John B. Yeon opposed the stand taken by Mills. "There never will be a time when we will not have enough public enterprise if we wait for the unanimous approval of the bankers and business men of the city," Yeon stated. "We met with the same kind of pessimistic opposition to the construction of the Interstate bridge, to the building of the bridge and to the building of the highway; still all of these projects have proven beneficial to Portland."

OLMSTEAD AT WORK

Emery Olmstead, chairman of the finance committee of the exposition, announced today that his committee is on a plan for financing the exposition and would submit its findings at another meeting during the coming week. "I am absolutely confident that the Portland 1925 fair will be a success and it will be the biggest thing ever done by the business men of the city," Olmstead stated today. "Money has been liberally subscribed for preliminary expenses and it is apparent from inquiries already made by members of the finance committee that it is necessary that we raise \$1,000,000 by subscriptions from Portland business men. An amount equal to or larger than this can be counted on from smaller towns throughout the state and from cities in Washington and Idaho indicate that strong financial support may be counted on from those sections."

Members of the finance committee, headed by Olmstead are: Guy W. Talbot, James A. Cranston, C. C. Colt, John F. Daly, Ira P. Powers, Robert E. Smith and David M. Dunne. The committee is unanimous in the belief that the exposition will be held and that it will be a success, according to Olmstead.

Among the speakers who endorsed the exposition at the Wednesday meeting were James B. Kerr, who stated that a tax levy in support of the exposition would meet with approval in outlying sections of the state; Leo Friede, who cited his experiences as a member of the board of directors of the Lewis & Clark exposition in 1905, and Mrs. Ida Callahan of Corvallis, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs.

A fund of \$3,500,000, to be raised by the business men of Portland and Oregon, would be necessary as a nucleus for financing the exposition, Meier stated, and he proposed that \$1,000,000 of this be raised in the city and the balance in subscriptions of \$50 each by 50,000 people in the state. The motion calling on the finance committee for a definite plan of action was presented by Marshall Dana and amended by President Cookingham of the Ladd & Tilton bank.

PUBLICITY MEN MEET
The first step in an international campaign of publicity and promotion for the 1925 exposition was taken at a meeting today in the Hotel Portland. Committee organization included Charles F. Berg, chairman; W. J. Hofmann, vice chairman, and W. S. Kirkpatrick,

secretary. Tom Emory, David Botsford and Dan C. Freeman were asked to serve as the committee on design, and Marshall Dana, W. J. Hofmann and C. A. McKenna as the committee on organization of work. A design bearing "Portland, 1925, Oregon," was adopted. Included among committee members present were: Charles F. Berg, S. B. Vincent, Tom Emory, William McMurray, W. S. Kirkpatrick, Dan Freeman, W. J. Hofmann, Harry Marcus, Dean Collins, Marshall Dana, Edward Cookingham, David Botsford, C. A. McKenna, J. E. Gratek, Gus Metzger, Charles Rafield and Harry Critchlow. The next meeting will be held in two weeks.

Express Company's Proposed Tariff Is Ordered Suspended

Salem, Or., June 30.—The proposed increase of 20 to 25 per cent on intrastate shipments of buttermilk, condensed milk, cream, milk and ice cream involved in a tariff filed by the American Express company with the public service commission more than a year ago, was permanently suspended in an order issued by the commission this morning.

Temporary suspension of the rates had been made by the commission in four previous orders, the last suspension covering the period to July 1. Based upon the attitude of the express company in other states in which their proposed increases have been denied by the public utilities commissions it is expected that the proposed rate increase will be taken into the courts on an appeal from the order of the state regulatory body.

The suspension order of the commission this morning is based largely on the general revision of wages and prices downward, in which reductions the railroads and express companies have participated along with other industries. The order also scores the express company for its inability to produce records to prove its contentions that an increase in rates in this state was necessary in order to cover operating costs.
