

SHIPPING BOARD'S 'ADVISERS' FAST LOSING INFLUENCE

Washington, June 30.—(WASH-
INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOUR-
NAL.)—It is safe to say that all
things will not be as they were in
the shipping board offices under the
new board. For one thing, it is be-
lieved that limitations will be placed
upon the activities of W. L. Clark
of Seattle, representative of the Pa-
cific Steamship company, who has
been much in evidence in Washing-
ton and a familiar figure around the
shipping board offices.

Clark was frequently in the office of
Robert A. Bean, chief counsel of the
board and one of the chief advisers of
Admiral Benson during the time the
admiral was chairman of the board.

It has been reported that Clark had
a desk in Dean's office and made that
his "headquarters." Dean denies that
he had any desk there, but says Clark
was frequently in his office; Dean has
now resigned his connection with the
board.

"I have heard these reports before,"
said Dean when his attention was di-
rected to the matter. "Clark had no
desk in my office. He was frequently
in there and he gave us a great deal
of valuable information. He has a
great fund of information about ship-
ping and we talked a great deal about
the law, the shipping acts,

"I believe that at one time there
was some criticism about Clark before
the board, but after that was in-
quired into and the chairman under-
stood the situation the criticism was
shown to be unfounded, as Clark was
assisting us and not promoting private
business."

It is understood that the new board's
inclination is to discourage the ap-
pearance of "sneaky" representatives of
private shipping interests or their constant
presence as unofficial advisers of officials
of the board on the ground that this
is bad practice in a public office.
The Pacific Steamship company has
been vitally interested in securing al-
location of ships from the shipping
board for operation out of Puget Sound
and has succeeded very well.

Hendricksen Will Contest Is Taken Under Advisement

The legal fight over the late Thomas
E. Hendricksen's war-fortune ended in
Circuit Judge Tazewell's court Wednes-
day and the court took the matter under
advisement. Eugene E. Hendricksen,
a nephew of the dead man, con-
tested the will, which left the bulk of
the estate to David Dahm, Hendricksen's
partner in the Pacific Tug & Awning
company. The nephew alleged that da-
m was used in getting the will signed.
Mrs. Nettie Jacobson, a sister of Hen-
dricksen, and her two sons also in-
terested in the outcome of the suit.

Hendricksen had only a modest busi-
ness until the war broke out. Then
his business grew until on May 4, 1920,
the day of his death, he had an estate of
\$112,000.
Three wills were made by Hendrick-
sen, according to the testimony. The
first of these left virtually the entire
estate to his relatives. The second will,
April, 1920, gave his partner a fourth
interest in his share of the tent busi-
ness. This will was signed in the of-
fice of Emil Slovorp, Portland attorney,
who testified at the trial that Hendrick-
sen said he made the change because
"Dave was raising hell about it."
On April 22, 1920, Hendricksen signed
the third will in the office of Jerry E.
Bronaugh, attorney, giving property
worth \$65,000 to Dahm and property
worth \$47,000 to the relatives.

Postoffice to Be Advanced to First Class in Corvallis

Corvallis, June 30.—With the total re-
ceipts of \$42,971 for the year ending De-
cember 31, 1920, Corvallis won rating
as a first class postoffice, beginning
Friday. In 1919 the receipts were \$37,-
990 and six months of that time was on
a 3 cent basis. The office has been in
the second class since July 1, 1906, when
receipts were \$8553.33.

Under the new rating the postmaster,
Victor P. Moses, will receive an increase
in salary of \$200 a year, an additional
clerk will be added to the force and it
is expected that the postoffice building
will be considerably rearranged after a
visit from the inspector. At present the
office employs, beside the postmaster,
an assistant, five clerks, one auxiliary
clerk, seven city carriers, one auxiliary
carrier and four rural carriers.

Oregon Normal School, Monmouth,
June 30.—The first social event of the
summer session will be a reception
given by the faculty to the new stu-
dents this evening. The students have
been divided into county groups, all
represented except Crook and Curry
counties. At the end of the summer

their names placed on a large silk
flag displayed in the library.

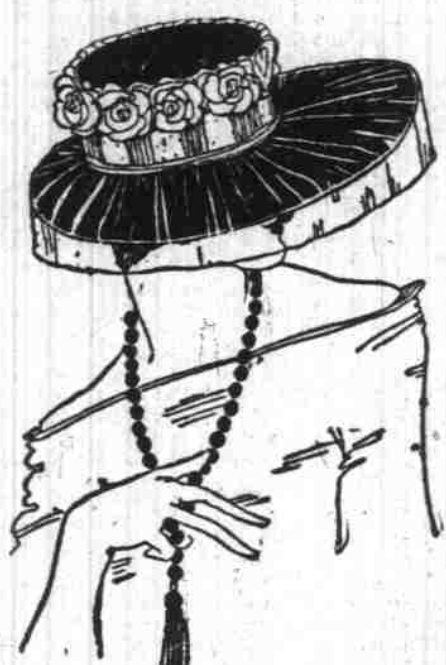
