

NON-PARTISANITES ISSUE CALL TO ARMS IN OREGON

The National Non-partisan league has its eye on Oregon, but apparently it is not reaching its fingers quite so far into the pocketbooks of its members as heretofore.

But, be that as it may, the head men of that organization operating from the national headquarters at Minneapolis have started their recruiting work here, desiring, as they announce, "to see the work of organization pushed into every state just as rapidly as possible so that we may be a power to be reckoned with nationally in the next biennial and presidential campaign," and they add that in a number of the states this result will be accomplished "through the Farmer-Labor party."

ISSUE SUBSCRIPTION FORMS

The newly lithographed subscription form, which bears the heading "Organization Extension Fund of the National Nonpartisan League" reads:

"Realizing that the struggle of the farmer and wage-worker must be conducted along national lines, if it is to be in any degree effective, that no one state or small group of states can stand alone or even make an effective protest against the encroachment of the middleman on the rights of both producer and consumer;

"We further realize that the most effective weapon to be used is political action through the organized vote of the farmer and city worker;

"Therefore, desiring to see the work of organization pushed into every state just as rapidly as possible so that the farmer and wage-worker may be united nationally in the next presidential campaign, and then follows spaces left for signatures and announced contributions to the cause.

STATE FINANCIAL PLAN
The call to arms which accompanies this subscription circular announces that former financing plans have been changed so that the state membership will bear the cost of the organization work within its boundaries, as an initial proposition, instead of being required to put up a flat fee to be sent to the national organization and redistributed as the central managers might desire.

"In the past the national office assumed all responsibility, financial and otherwise, superintending all details connected with the organization work," the announcement reads. "Due field of action has grown to such proportions" it continues, "that this can no longer be done. We are therefore compelled to shift most of this work directly on the leading men and women in each state. This will enable us to start the work in the various states with a much smaller advance payment."

TO CALL CONVENTION
The letter then instructs the recipient that it will be necessary "to raise just enough to cover the expense of calling a state-wide meeting, paying the expense of our national speaker and other incidental expenses, such as advertising, hall rents, etc."

"It is necessary to call this state-wide meeting in order to select a temporary state executive committee to take full charge of the work until the first state convention of delegates is called," the announcement says. And it goes on to promise that "as soon as a sufficient

amount is secured" the national headquarters will call the state wide meeting and the organization work will be started immediately.

The letter asks that those to whom it is sent "canvass your neighborhood and solicit from \$1 to \$5 from each as a contribution to the fund."

TO MAKE ACCOUNTING
After the state meeting has been called and the expenses paid by the national organization, an accounting will be made to the state committee and all balances, "if any," will be turned back to it for further use within the state.

It is understood that large numbers of these letters have been sent into Oregon, as they undoubtedly have been into other states, and that an active and concentrated effort will be made to create a state organization and build up a large league membership in the state between now and the 1932 primary and general elections.

Veteran Convoying Alleged Deserter To Jail Arrested

Roseburg July 6.—To be arrested while bringing in an alleged army deserter was the experience of Sherman C. Foster of the American Legion post at Pomona, Cal., who picked up E. Scott, alleged fugitive from Camp Lewis, at Brant, a few miles south of Roseburg, Monday evening. Foster was hobnobbing his way south when he was joined by Scott and a companion. Scott carried a vicious looking army revolver and in conversation boasted that he had "gone over the hill." As the train slowed down for the station Foster seized the revolver, held up the two men and herded them into a passenger coach. Scott's companion jumped out the opposite side of the vestibule and dashed into the nearby woods, despite a shot fired into the air by Foster.

When the conductor came through for fares, neither had money to pay his way into Grants Pass. Foster explained the situation but the conductor thought it was a new bunco game and put both off at Glendale, turning them over to the marshal there. They were brought back to this city and Foster was released. Scott being held for word from Camp Lewis.

SPECIAL REALTOR TRAIN TO LEAVE PORTLAND TONIGHT

A special train carrying Portland and Northwest delegates to the annual convention of the National Association of Real Estate Boards at Chicago, will leave Union station at 11:30 tonight.

According to William McMurray, general passenger agent of the Union Pacific system, the train will be the finest ever run out of the Northwest. It will consist of 10 coaches made in local shops and used for the first time on the realtor's excursion.

Delegates from cities in Western Oregon and Western Washington will join the Portland delegation here and others will be picked up en route through Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho.

Stops of eight to 12 hours will be made at Salt Lake City, Denver and Omaha and the special train will arrive at Chicago in time for the opening of the convention July 12.

Special advertising material for the 1931 exposition will be distributed en route and at the convention by the Northwest delegates. Several thousand bronze pins bearing the legend, "Oregon 1931," and thousands of rosebuds shipped east from Portland will be given out to the visitors to the Northwest headquarters in the Auditorium hotel at Chicago.

Judge Bean listened kindly. At times a note of sympathy crept into his voice as he questioned the citizens who sought to escape from the confining atmosphere of the courtroom. One by one the judge permitted the prospective jurors to slip away, but some were told that they were excused only until Friday.

The excuses varied from sickness to business. One man claimed exemption because of six years' service in the national guard, another presented a certificate from his physician, a third was busy with crops, several superintendents of departments in various lines of business appeared to say their firms would be forced to close up if they were forced to take their seats in a jury box.

The jury was being drawn for the July term of court. When court convened 33 men were seated behind the railing in the courtroom. After Judge Bean told those who desired to be excused to step forward only 16 of the original 33 prospective jurors remained.
