

COUNCIL MEMBERS WILL ADOPT NEW PARKING MEASURE

Unless some unforeseen complications arise, the city will have a new ordinance governing automobile parking shortly after 10 o'clock next Wednesday morning. The new ordinance is scheduled for appearance before the city council at that time for final consideration, and there is unanimous sentiment among the members for its immediate adoption.

The council devoted this forenoon to going over the ordinance draft, section by section, and Mayor Baker familiarized himself with the work of the special traffic committee performed during his month's absence.

Although it was expected that the council chamber might not be able to accommodate the crowd of people directly interested in this hearing, not more than a dozen people appeared. They, however, made objections, in most instances, to the new ordinance interfering with parking privileges in their immediate localities. A petition signed by 36 physicians was presented, asking the council "not to change or restrict the parking of automobiles in the congested district."

DISAGREE ON FEATURE

On behalf of some of the automobile dealers in the northern Broadway district, W. C. Garby asked that that district be excluded from the parking restrictions, but other dealers were in favor of it. Frank H. Hilton asked for exemption for cars of attorneys, but members of the council could see no reason for such exemption.

J. "Hat" Hitchens, who is just out of a four months' sojourn in a hospital from injuries received in being run down by an automobile, asked that the council require the sounding of horns or gongs at turns and that driving by persons under 18 within the congested district be prohibited.

THREE CLASSES PROVIDED

After all phases had been considered, the council decided that the ordinance as drawn is adopted, that that district can be made at this time, with the exception that a paragraph will be inserted providing for elimination of left-hand turns within a district bounded by Third street, Yamhill, Broadway and Stark.

The ordinance was referred to Captain Lewis of the traffic department for this change, and will appear complete next Wednesday morning.

In its general provisions it provides for three classes of parking—15-minute stops on Yamhill in the market blocks; half hour stops in another section of the congested district, and two-hour stops outside of that zone within the congested district.

No parking is to be allowed on Alder, Morrison and Washington streets between First and Tenth streets, except to load and unload.

BARBER PROPOSES CITY USE EMPLOYEES' CARS, PAY BILLS

The use of cars owned by city em-

ployees in municipal business and providing for allowance for upkeep and gasoline, instead of municipal investment in the cars required to carry on the work, is deemed a better business arrangement by Commissioner Barber, and he is considering the presenting to the city council of an ordinance making such provision. Whether there are legal obstacles in the way of using such a plan has yet to be determined.

Inspector Plummer of the building department says he found on his recent trip to cities of the Middle West that the use of employees' cars obtains in several places, and that in St. Louis, Denver, Minneapolis and St. Paul allowance of from \$30 to \$35 a month is made for each such car.

City Hall Briefs

City Treasurer William Adams has issued a call for the presentation for payment of municipal improvement bonds numbered consecutively from 27859 to 28009, inclusive, dated August 1, 1914. These are payable August 1, and from that date, even if not presented, interest thereon will cease.

Bids will be opened at the city council's session next Wednesday for the construction of a sewer in East Fifty-sixth street, from Thompson to Tillamook street, and in Tillamook street, from East Fifty-sixth to East Fifty-seventh street. At the same time bids will be opened for the improvement of Alma street, between Lombard street and Central avenue.

The city council has adopted a resolution providing for changes in grade of Powell Valley road at nine separate locations. Remonstrances must be filed with the city auditor by July 22.

American-German Peace Proposal Is Put Before Cabinet

Washington, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—A tentative draft of a presidential peace proclamation was presented to President Harding and his cabinet when they met today.

Attorney General Daugherty took him into the session a draft of the proposed proclamation which he prepared at the president's direction and it was put up to the cabinet for due consideration.

Dallas Voters Turn Down Bond Issues

Dallas, Or., July 8.—The special city bonding election held here Wednesday resulted in the defeat of both measures. The \$25,000 for extending water mains and installing additional hydrants for fire protection was defeated by a vote of 96 to 133. That for \$15,000 for purchase of a site and erection of an additional tank for sewage disposal was defeated by a majority of 4, the vote being 113 to 117. About a 25 per cent vote was cast.

OLD SOL STRIKES CHICAGO AGAIN

Chicago, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—The heat wave which has prevailed in Chicago for more than two weeks returned today after a temporary break caused by a severe electrical storm last night. Indications were that the thermometer would again mount to levels that have been customary since June 18.

The storm which swept Chicago and vicinity last night came suddenly and afforded welcome relief. The temperature dropped from 95 degrees, where it stood at 5 o'clock, to 71 degrees.

Torrential rains accompanied the lightning and thunder, and basements and sewers were flooded. Several buildings were damaged by lightning. Nearly two inches of rain fell within two hours.

NO RELIEF IN SIGHT FOR SWEATERING NEW YORK

New York, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—No respite was in sight for the sweating tenement house dwellers of New York this morning. A feverishly hot night was succeeded by a day even hotter than yesterday.

At 9 o'clock, just when the work-going crowd becomes dense in Park row, street thermometers registered 77 degrees. The official weather bureau instrument showed 74 degrees.

Cool Breezes In Portland

Cool breezes from the north which suddenly stopped the upward climb of the mercury in Portland's official thermometer Thursday afternoon, will continue to fan the city today and keep things cool.

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No Relief In Sight

Washington, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—There is no hope for an early break in the heat wave, E. H. Bowie, forecaster of the United States weather bureau, stated today.

Des Moines Beats Portland in Race For C. E. Gathering

Des Moines won out over Portland for the 1923 International Christian Endeavor convention, according to telegraphic information received at the local Christian Endeavor office shortly after noon today.

Ward Robinson, one of the delegates, said the only reason Des Moines won was because she has "been after it for 13 years."

Even though the convention was lost, Oregon has received much publicity, and the delegates took about 25,000 pieces of literature with them for distribution among the 80,000 young people from all parts of the world who are attending a convention.

Des Moines has won several church meetings lately, among them being the last quadrennial meeting of the Methodist Episcopal church throughout the world and the Northern Baptist convention.

Driver Hurlled Out Seat as Auto Hits

Norman L. Landis of 2019 East Main street was thrown from his soap box seat on the outboard chassis of his automobile Thursday night in a collision with East Seventy-second and Thornburn streets.

Carl Hansen of 108 West Park was traveling west in Thornburn as Landis' car was going south in Seventy-second. Motorcyclist Mobley found both drivers equally at fault, though Landis had the right of way, and no neither was held. Landis' collarbone was broken.

Police Puzzled Over Injuries to Guest of Hotel

With severe injuries to his head, a man who has been unable to give the police his name, but who has been identified by papers found in his room in the Eason hotel, 24 North Third street, is lying in a bed in the emergency hospital in a serious condition. He is thought to be George Dirk. Hospital attendants say he may have a fractured skull, in addition to several cuts about the mouth and the top of his head.

The proprietor of the rooming house called Patrolman Lathrop early this morning when Dirk was found lying in a pool of blood in the hallway. Lathrop reported he found blood marks on the floor and the bed in the room occupied by Dirk, who had only been in the rooming house a short time.

Other blood marks were found on the skylight just outside of the window to his room. The proprietor reported that he heard no noise that would indicate Dirk had been attacked in his room. The police believe that Dirk had been drinking.

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Baptist Preacher Of Newport Held On Libel Charges

Newport, Or., July 8.—Rev. B. C. Black, pastor of the Baptist church here, was arrested Thursday by the city marshal, charged with posting libelous cards reflecting on the character of Ernest and Charles Ewing of this city. For some time past, Black has been appearing in public places and until recently no clue was obtained as to the author.

More than a year ago Black made complaint against both the Ewings, alleging a statutory offense against Black's daughter. The charges were later dismissed by the grand jury. Black is out on bail, his preliminary trial set for July 11. Both the Ewings were members of Black's church but quit following Black's charges.

Big Fight Pictures To Be Shown if No Protests Are Made

Washington, July 8.—Provided state censorship boards approve, it is probable that the motion pictures of the Dempsey-Carpenter fight may be shown in other states than New Jersey.

This is a federal law which was passed at the time of the Johnson-Jeffries bout, forbidding the interstate transportation of fight pictures.

While he ventured no opinion with regard to this law, Attorney General Daugherty today indicated that if state boards approved and no protests were received by the department of justice, exhibitions of the pictures would not necessarily be interfered with by government authorities.

Durland's Death Is Held to Be Accident

Roseburg, Or., July 8.—That Samuel J. Durland of this city, whose body was found in his ranch home near Brockway Wednesday evening, met his death accidentally was the verdict of the coroner's jury returned Thursday. Durland, while cleaning a small rifle, which was loaded, dropped it. The bullet entered his forehead and caused instant death. The body was found upright in a chair, with the gun at the feet, by his small son.

Patrick Burke Buys Coeur d'Alene Line

Spokane, Wash., July 8.—Patrick Burke, of Wallace has secured an agreement with the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company permitting him to purchase and rebuild the 14 miles of railroad up Pritchard creek in the North Fork district of the Coeur d'Alene, washed out four years ago. For the right-of-way and rails he is to pay \$55,000 and the company agrees to lease him a locomotive and rolling stock sufficient to operate the line. The railroad company retains the privilege of buying back the railroad.

Employe Confesses He Robbed Employer

Astoria, July 8.—Bernard Sherman, arrested in Redlands, Cal., charged with stealing Frank Hesse's automobile, forging checks and taking \$20 belonging to Hesse, his employer, is alleged to have confessed. He was brought back Thursday. He says he left Hesse's car early in the morning, reached Portland in three hours, and drove only by night until he reached the Oregon-California line.

Woman Dies After Extraction of Tooth

Seattle, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—Mrs. Mary Wilson of Yakima died here today following the extraction of a tooth which brought on a hemorrhage.

Woman Descends Face of Cliff to Crater Lake Rim

Medford, July 8.—Lydia Sturtevant of Berkeley, Cal., a guest at Crater Lake Lodge, was the first woman this year to make the descent from the rim to the lake and the first woman to catch fish in the lake. The trail is not yet open, and those daring enough to go to the water's edge have had to climb down the face of the steep cliffs, where one misstep meant death. Besides Miss Sturtevant, only a few men climbers have made the trip.

Double Funeral of Overseas Veterans To Be on Saturday

Oscar W. Garver and Elvin S. Hansen, overseas veterans, will be buried Saturday afternoon with military honors from Finley's undertaking parlors.

The bodies of the two soldiers arrived in Portland Thursday in company with those of several Washington men.

Veterans of the 147th field artillery, with whom Garver served, will have charge of his funeral, and the pallbearers will be selected from among his former comrades. Portland chapter No. 2 of the American War Mothers will attend the services for the former attorney, which will be held at 1 o'clock.

The Hansen funeral will be held at 2:30 o'clock, with the American Legion in charge. Hansen was a private in the 341st machine gun battalion of the 89th division, enlisted from Omaha, Neb., where he was employed as a salesman by J. C. Co. He was born and raised in Portland and was educated in the public schools here. He fell while manning a machine gun in the St. Mihiel drive on the morning of September 27, 1918. He sailed for France June 4, 1918, and was on the line for several weeks with his division.

Garver enlisted from Portland and went overseas with the 147th field artillery. He went through many heavy engagements with his battery, only to lose his life from pneumonia following the signing of the armistice.

Funeral services for Mrs. E. D. W. Cramer, 335 Sixth street, victim of a collision between an automobile and a streetcar, were held Thursday afternoon from Holman's chapel with Dr. Oswald Taylor officiating. Mrs. Cramer was 66 years old. She was born in San Jose, Cal., coming to Portland with her parents at the age of two years. Her husband was Gustav H. Cramer, a civil engineer. She is survived by four children. They are Madge, Elsie, Gustav H. and Johanna Cramer.

International Chiefs of Unions Arrested in Raid

Williamson, W. Va., July 8.—(I. N. S.) Twelve men, mostly international officers of the United Mine Workers, were arrested today when the mine workers' headquarters were raided by state police under orders of Major Thomas B. Davis, representative of Governor Mingo. The men are being held in the city jail without bond and charged with violation of the martial law regulations.

Among those under arrest are David Robb, international financial agent, and his secretary, Hely Copp; John W. Brown, international organizer of the Indianapolis; Jasper Metzger, international organizer of Herron, Ill.; Edward Dobbins, international board member of Louisville, Ky.; Robert Gilmore, international organizer, Pittsburg, Kan., and Herbert Hall, international organizer, Danville, Ill.

Boats Collide; Five Hurt

Boston, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—One man was badly injured and five others were thrown into the waters of the lower harbor today when the Nantuxet excursion boat, Old Colony, collided with the fishing schooner Active of Provincetown, sinking the schooner.

Stolen Auto Recovered

Ridgefield, Wash., July 8.—Rufus Malkoon, son of G. H. Malkoon, proprietor of a Ridgefield hotel, recovered an automobile at Albany Thursday which had been stolen in Portland while Malkoon, Elsie Tetz, Mary Baker and Claude Atterbury were attending a theatre on the Fourth.

Famous American Ace Here; States Fair Is 'Gaining'

Announcement of the 1925 world's fair at Portland has stimulated interest in the Pacific Northwest throughout the United States, according to Eddie Rickenbacker, dubbed America's "Ace of Aces" and general manager of the Sheridan Motor company of Oakland, Cal. Rickenbacker arrived this morning from Seattle and spent the day looking over the local field for the establishment of a sales agency.

The Sheridan company is a unit of the Durant Motors corporation, which is building a manufacturing plant at Oakland. The new factory will be in operation in January, Rickenbacker said, and will have a maximum capacity output of 150 cars a day. The plant will cost more than \$1,500,000 and will employ more than 7000 operatives.

Portland was favorably considered as a possible site for the Durant industry prior to its location at Oakland, and it is possible that an assembling plant will be established here should the growth of business in the Northwest warrants such a move. Rickenbacker leaves tonight for California.

'Duchess' in Suicide Pact With Her Son Gets Small Fortune

Paris, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—Madame de Guise-Ellie, self-styled "Duchess de Guise," who is in the hospital from poisoning, taken in a suicide pact with her son, George Harbaugh, today received a cable draft for a substantial sum of money from her first husband, G. E. Harbaugh, formerly of Cleveland, now a resident of California.

Harbaugh, from whom Madame de Guise-Ellie is divorced, is understood to be a millionaire, though money came too late to be of any use to the son. He died late last night.

Two Eugene Lads Rescue Girl From Mill Race Waters

Eugene, Or., July 8.—Two young lads, neither of them more than 14 years of age, played heroes Thursday afternoon when they rescued Lucille Bennett, 11-year-old miss, from the waters of the millrace that flows through the city. They are Kenneth Barker and Clifford Summers. The girl, while floating on her back, either caught up against or under a raft and was soon in difficulty. The Barker boy, 11 years old, swam 20 feet with the girl and was aided in getting her ashore by a 14-year-old Clifford Summers. When brought to land she was unconscious, but soon recovered.

Loss from fire amounting to \$10,000 was suffered by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spores, prominent Mohawk valley farmers, when their home burned Monday. There was no insurance. Some furniture, badly damaged, was saved. Jewelry and valuable papers were lost. Spores plans to erect a six room log bungalow to replace the house, which was recently completed.

Third Reprieve Is Denied; Man Hanged

Chicago, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—Antonio Lopez, convicted of slaying a grocer during a holdup, was hanged in the county jail here today. Lopez had been in jail more than a year and was twice reprieved by the governor. Governor Small yesterday refused to grant a third reprieve. During his stay in the county jail, Lopez became known as the "Chatterbox of murderers' row" because of his limitations of a crowing rooster.
