

HOSPITAL PERMIT SETTLEMENT DUE NEXT WEDNESDAY

Whether permission to erect a hospital on the half block of vacant ground on the south side of Lovejoy street between Nineteenth and Twentieth shall be granted to an association of Portland surgeons, or the district reserved for residence purposes, will be determined at a meeting of the mayor and council Wednesday.

The site was zoned for hospital purposes by the city planning commission and proposed to be used as a site with determined opposition on the part of property owners in the neighborhood. There are four hospitals in the district south and west of the proposed location and Dr. Wiley Jones and Dr. Laurence Selling, who head the promoters of the new enterprise, stated today that there would be decided advantages in locating the surgical hospital in this vicinity. Their plans call for a building costing about \$200,000.

PLANS FOR FOSTER ROAD SEWER PROMISES SCRAP

Plans for the construction of the Foster road trunk sewer promise to precipitate a lively scrap on the preliminary hearing to be had in the circuit court Thursday on the appeal of a number of property-owners for a temporary injunction.

According to officials of the city engineer's office, the protestants represent only 22 per cent of the area served by the sewer, and many of the petitioners are owners of unplatted acreage outside the city limits which would not be assessed for the construction of the sewer. This group is understood to have retained a law firm to represent them at the hearing.

Property-owners favoring the sewer project have secured the services of Makarkey & Seabrook to assist the city attorney in opposing the appeal for an injunction. One of the principal objections of the property-owners who protest against the sewer is the proposed dumping of surface water into Johnson creek during the winter and spring months.

Investigation made last week by City Health Officer Parrish showed the waters of the creek to be badly polluted at present with refuse matter which would be carried away by the sewer. The health of the neighborhood would be benefited materially by the construction of the sewer, Parrish stated.

DEMOTED FIRE LIEUTENANTS MAY YET BE REINSTATED

A. L. Pullen and E. L. Boatwright, who were demoted from fire department lieutenants to hosemen in the latter part of 1929, may be reinstated if certain procedure is taken, according to an opinion given by City Attorney Grant today.

These men took the examination for lieutenant and were placed on the eligible list January 31, 1929, and were appointed as lieutenants February 3 of the same year. Later Commissioner Bigelow became dissatisfied with their work and on November 4, 1929, they were demoted to hosemen. After Bigelow had made charges that their work was unsatisfactory.

Bigelow would now withdraw this charge, so that the men may be reinstated as lieutenants. City Attorney Grant holds that as the discharge was made before the expiration of the probationary period, Bigelow has the right to withdraw his charges and reinstate the men if they will file with the civil service board their acceptance of a new probationary period of six months. He says the board should adopt a rule which will set forth that demotion is to be considered the same as a discharge from the position.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS COME UP FOR DISCUSSION

Proposed revision of civil service examinations for police officers was set for discussion at a conference between Mayor Baker and the civil service commission at 3 p. m. today. Recent failure of several efficient members of the police force to pass the examination led to an investigation by the mayor and it was shown that in mathematics and a number of other subjects policemen were required to pass severe tests.

Mayor Baker contends that examinations should be planned to test the ability of the applicant for the particular work he proposes to perform and that few values should be placed on extraneous subjects. John F. Logan, chairman of the civil service commission, stated today that he is not opposed to a revision of the rules of the commission affecting examinations if it can be shown that the proposed changes promote efficiency in the departments affected.

SMALLPOX ISOLATION WARD TO GET ADDITIONAL ROOM

Plans for the erection of a new smallpox isolation ward at Kelly Butte hospital have been altered to afford accommodation to a larger number of patients, according to H. E. Plummer, chief building inspector. A one story cottage built near the heating plant at Kelly Butte will be raised to afford basement room for stores and equipment, giving the entire ground floor for hospital use.

18 Months Sentence To McNeils Island For Drug Peddler

Upon pleading guilty to violating the Harrison drug act, Peter Ravagino, who was arrested for possession of 56 ounces of cocaine and morphine and was sentenced to serve a term of 18 months on McNeils Island by Federal Judge Bean this morning.

Ravagino was arrested in company with William Wallace at the Union station May 15. The morphine and cocaine which, they carried in a black grip at the time of their arrest, was valued at about \$20,000.

The boys are Roy Boatright, 17; Clovia Sims, 16; and Ted Pickett, 15.

The youngest two will be placed under the custody of the juvenile court. Sims will be held in the city jail until the arrival of Hubbard authorities.

The lads were arrested by Lieutenant Wada on a charge of stealing two hats from \$25. Fifty-seventh avenue. At police headquarters they were turned over to Moloney and several detectives, who are said to have secured a confession.

PETITION IS FILED WITH COUNTY FOR ST. JOHNS BRIDGE

A petition for the construction of a high bridge across the Willamette at St. Johns, with more than 1200 signatures, was presented to the county commissioners this morning by C. C. A. Gannon, W. E. Ashby and P. A. Bredeen, a committee appointed by the petitioners to take up the matter with the board.

Completion of the bridge before the 1935 fair is the aim of the petitioners, according to a letter addressed to the board by the Fraternal boosters. The letter points out that the ferry service across the river from St. Johns is inadequate and that it is growing more and more so.

Between 10 at night and 6 in the morning cars must go 15 miles to get directly across the river from the town. It is stated. The industries of St. Johns need direct connection with the highways from the Lower Columbia and with the financial district on the west side of the river, it is argued.

The best location for the bridge, the letter states, would be from the intersection of Fessenden and Edison streets, on the east bank of the river, to Liberty street on the west bank, and from there connecting with the Columbia highway.

A bridge high enough to allow ships of every size to pass under is proposed. The commissioners put the petition in the records. Permission must be secured from the state highway commission and the war department at Washington before the county commissioners can take up the matter further.

The sheriff's office was planning this morning to organize a posse of rough riders, carrying lasso, guns and everything, for a roundup of two wild, horned steers that escaped from a slaughter house in Linton last week, made their way to the Buckley avenue district in East Portland and are raising Cain with gardens, berry patches and the dignity of cowboys.

District Attorney Evans this morning Steve Kaptur, meat market owner and owner of the steers, that he would have to capture his steers or a posse would be formed to go out and take them, whole or in pieces.

Sunday the two steers broke up a picnic at Lents, scattering the young people in every direction, and it is reported, calmly helping themselves from the sacks of sugar.

MAKE JAPAN QUIT SIBERIA, IS URGED

Washington, July 11.—(I. N. S.)—An appeal to the United States by the Far Eastern republic to compel Japan to withdraw her troops from Siberia "at the earliest possible date," is contained in a note handed to the American minister in Peking, the text of which reached here today. Similar notes were addressed to Great Britain and China.

The note, which was the work of M. Youn, minister of foreign affairs of the China republic, accuses Japan of instigating the coup in Vladivostok by which the anti-Bolshevik forces overthrew the existing government, and asserts that all the allied governments which sent troops into Siberia during the World war are responsible for the presence of Japanese troops on Russian soil.

Because of this common responsibility, the note declares, the allied governments, including the United States, are under obligations to compel the immediate withdrawal of the Japanese from Siberia.

Finnish Miner From Montana Is Drowned In Clackamas River

Oregon City, July 11.—Matt Hyttiainen, aged 33, a Finnish miner from Montana, lost his life in the Clackamas river near Gladstone at 6 o'clock Sunday morning, when he suffered an attack of heart failure.

With his wife and small child he had been camping on the banks of the river for the last 10 days, having come down from the higher altitudes of Montana on his doctor's orders, as a possible remedy for heart trouble. Early in the morning he went for a swim in the river and died while in six inches of water. The body was immediately recovered and is being held at the undertaking parlor of Holman & Pace, pending arrangements for burial. So far as has been learned Hyttiainen had no relatives besides his wife and child in this country.

R. E. Howard, vice president of Ladd & Tilton bank and a director of the public welfare bureau, was authorized to arrange for preserving fruits and vegetables at cost at the Graham cooperative cannery and dehydrator.

County Agriculturalist Hall suggested that potatoes be immediately planted for the needy in several hundred acres near Fairview which are being uncovered by the receding waters of the Columbia.

Chairman Holman of the county commission stated that certain facilities at the county farm could be used to good advantage in the campaign. The aid of the Community Chest in creating a revolving fund with which to finance food preserving enterprise was suggested.

Farmer Hurt in Runaway

La Grande, July 11.—Frank N. DeFries, a farmer, is in a serious condition as the result of a runaway yesterday eight miles from La Grande. He was thrown out of his buggy and is suffering from a broken shoulder, crushed skull and other serious injuries.
