

VISITING MOTORIST GIVES OREGON FEW ROAD SUGGESTIONS

From the viewpoint of an experienced automobile traveler who takes the roads as they come, John D. Wright, head of the Wright Oral School of New York City, went on his way toward British Columbia Tuesday with some kindly but pointed comments on Oregon highways.

Wright, who is accompanied by Mrs. Wright, their two children, a governess and Mrs. Morris Barretto of San Francisco, visited the city several days and Folger Johnson, knowing them and interested in the roads himself, asked Wright, who lives most of the time at Santa Barbara, how the roads impressed him.

SCENIC BEAUTIES ENJOYED
"I have just motored up from Santa Barbara and have enjoyed the wonderful scenic beauties of Oregon to the full," Wright said. "I consider Crater Lake as one of the most beautiful and interesting natural objects in the world. It is a treasure that should mean much to Oregon as time goes on."

"If we found an extraordinary activity in Oregon in road building, it is most a feverish activity. It is evident that the state is determined that the motorist shall eventually be able to see the country in Oregon, at least, on the through north and south route, as comfortably as any other part of the United States, not excepting the wonderful Southern California region where paved roads are found everywhere."

"The motoring stranger is at present subjected to some hardships by the failure to keep one route open and good while improvements are being made on another. The road building does not seem to be conducted along this principle."

"We have also been much annoyed by the failure to remove detour signs when the road was passable and to see that the stranger fares as well as the local people."

SIGNS INADEQUATE
"In several instances we have been compelled to go 10 and 15 miles out of our way over bad roads because we were law-abiding and followed the official signs that marked the way, while others who had inside information went sailing along over good roads that we might have enjoyed."

"The stranger carries away with him only the ideas that are founded on his own experience and when he sees signs of carelessness and stupidity it is hard to make him believe it is not characteristic of the community. At some critical points we found the entirely unmarked which is also a trial to the visiting motorist."

"It is evident, however, that we are just a little ahead of the game and that if we came again in two or three years we would find Oregon up to the standard of other parts of our country."

Coos and Curry Fair Board 'Razzed,' Quits

Lenin Appeals to Senator for U. S. Aid, Says Report

Berlin, July 13.—Lenin has appealed to the American government, through Senator France, who is reported to be in Moscow, "to come to the aid of the Russian peoples, who are gravely threatened by starvation, by sending food," according to a dispatch from Moscow to the East Prussian Gazette. The correspondent claims to have this information "from an absolutely reliable source." He further asserts that the American government has informed Moscow that it is, in principle, inclined to inaugurate relief work on a large scale. But this only on condition that independent representatives elected by the Russian people and subject to no political influence shall have control and supervision of the distribution of supplies.

Lenin, declares this correspondent, is trying to meet these requirements, despite the opposition of the extremists.

Direct Hits Made on Ex-German Destroyer By Martin Bombers

Langley Field, Hampton, Va., July 13. (I. N. S.)—Direct hits on the ex-German destroyer G-103 were scored in an attack by Martin bombers at 10:40 a. m., according to reports made by returning airmen here this afternoon.

The airmen who reported to the commanding officer here were unable to state whether the hits had sunk the destroyer or not.

Two planes which left here this morning for the bombing operations at sea have failed to return and are unaccounted for. Major McManus stated that no apprehension was felt for the safety of the crews of the missing ships.

**Chicago May Get
New \$2,500,000
Elk Headquarters**

Los Angeles, July 13.—(I. N. S.)—The final decision to make Chicago the national headquarters of the Elks was considered the most important thing before the grand lodge when it convened today for its second business session of the convention here. A committee which has visited more than half a dozen cities has recommended Chicago as the most suitable for the new \$2,500,000 headquarters building contemplated, and recommendation will be accepted by the grand lodge, according to an authoritative announcement from high officials.

The expected selection of Atlantic City, N. J., as the next meeting place, the final decision on headquarters and the reports of several committees were

to occupy the grand lodge's attention today.

Boy Dives After Eating Big Meal; Shock Kills Him

La Grande, July 13.—Theodore Curtman, 15 years old, died last night as the result of diving into the Grand Ronde river immediately after eating a hearty meal and being overheated. Death came from the sudden shock, his heart having been weak. The accident happened at about 8 o'clock.

Efforts were made to revive him, a pulmotor being used for over an hour. Doctors declare that death came instantly on hitting the water.

1898 VETERANS TO HAVE BIG TIME AT ASTORIA MEETING

Astoria, July 13.—Lower Columbia river veterans of the days of '98 are feverishly putting the finishing touches on their plans for the entertainment of the United Spanish War Veterans of Oregon at their annual encampment which will be held in this city July 15, 16 and 17.

Samuel Hines and G. J. Neece, in charge of the convention from this end, declare that they have their plans so formulated and arrangements made that there will be no hitch when the convention comes to "ten-thus" Friday morning.

BIG ATTENDANCE EXPECTED
Word from over the state indicated that an unusually large number of delegates will be attracted through the convention and the committees from Edward Young camp of Astoria and J. B. Komer camp of Hammond, the organizations acting as hosts to the visitors, predict that Astoria and even the veterans themselves will be surprised by the number of delegates in attendance at the convention.

Major Clarence Hotchkiss, commander of the Spanish War Veterans, department of Oregon, has named Dr. L. W. Hyde of Hillsboro, toastmaster of the banquet which will be the feature of the entertainment on the opening day of the convention. Beside the regular business sessions of the meeting, banquets, dances, boat trips about the harbor and motor tours of the city and beaches, have been arranged for the delegates.

PORTLAND ON JOB
George F. A. Walker of Portland, assistant state adjutant, has written that the delegates from in and about Portland will take the night boat down, the

river Thursday, arriving here early Friday morning.

A local chapter of the Military Order of the Sargent will be instituted here during the convention. A large number of local veterans will be initiated and a parade in honor of the "Great Snake" will be held through the business section of the city.

There has been little pre-convention political talk between the hosts to the delegates, but it is known that there will be a spirited contest over the next convention. Fendleton has already cast its sombrero in the ring and has authorized D. O. Bowman to issue the 1932 meeting for La Grange town at any cost. Several other cities have hinted that they will seek the honor for themselves.
