OREGON NOTES

Boys' clubs of Linn county will hold a big fair at Lebanon September 24. The concert of the Linn county high school was held at Roseburg this afternoon.

The Independent of Cottage Grove has increased \$4,465.31 in the last five years.

Miss Nell Bushy has purchased the rolling interest in the Coast Telephone company.

At present seven new residences, varying in cost from \$1500 to \$1500, are under construction at St. Helena.

Frank Spores sustained a loss of \$15,000 when his residence at Donna, Lane county, was destroyed by fire July 4.

Of the 35 building permits issued at Eugene in June, nine were for new residences costing from \$2000 to \$5000 each.

J. A. Huff was fined \$20 at Klamath Falls for passing a worthless check for \$45.50 on J. T. Perkins, a furniture dealer.

A. S. Mellinger, who lives on the river bank south of Newberg, states that he will get more than \$1000 in royalties from his 50 acres this season.

L. A. Hunt, for several years agricultural agent for Morrow county, has returned to Morrow county, where he is engaged in the Oregon Hay Growers' association.

The appointment of a county roadmaster, to be in charge of the county road supervisors, representing as many road districts, losing their jobs.

George Hyde was seriously injured when a horse ridden by Oliver Coon bucked under him at the fairgrounds.

The ports of Toledo and Newport have appropriated \$50,000 which the United States government has matched this year.

With interest amounting to \$22,555 due on the series of bonds which must be paid by August 1, Astoria's city treasurer is now negotiating for \$25,000 to meet the interest.

WASHINGTON

John Wherrett, one of the oldest pioneers of Washington and a resident of Tenino for 35 years, died in that city last week, aged 92 years.

Figures have been compiled showing that Japanese farmers in the Yakima valley are producing 25 per cent more than \$1,000,000 from their crops.

Gordon Brown of Chehalis has four big tractors and a big motor. He intended to cut his automobile but was forced over a bridge while driving to Centralia.

George C. Jewett of Spokane, general manager of the Northern Columbia River association, has been elected vice president of the United States Grain Growers.

A car stolen from Jack C. Agnew, teller in a Tacoma bank, was found at the end of the road in a field. It is thought at least one of the occupants was drowned.

The highest peak in the United States, was made last Wednesday when Henry H. Henshaw, aged 72, led a party of five men up the peak.

New machinery just purchased by the Tilton Electric Co. will enable the company to double the output of its mine at Lindberg, in Eastern Lewis and Clark county.

Since the issuing of the order permitting the discharge of those who make 100 per cent of their quota, 25 per cent of the men stationed at the front in France have been discharged.

John Juell, a Prosser merchant, observing that the Indians were anxious to remove a 250-pound Indian from a burning tent, at great risk plunged into the flames and dragged Jacob Lee to safety.

Between 50 and 100 acres of wheat on the Perry farm, near Challa, Washington, was destroyed by a fire Saturday, started by employees who were using matches. The loss was about \$4000.

Unemployment in Spokane has forced the Columbia River Fishery Commission to make an appropriation for the families in which there were able-bodied men. It is estimated that expenses this year will amount to \$25,000 above the previous year.

The report of the Washington state assessor shows a deficit of \$1,375,722.20 for the public highway—\$17,334.99 for the fisheries, \$1,358,387.21 for the state highway and \$114,442 for the Centralia state normal school.

The first carload of Idaho potatoes to be moved this year was loaded at Kingston, Idaho, on Monday.

Indications are that there will be a surplus of 100,000 tons of hay in Canada this year. The surplus is expected to be in good condition, the report of June 30 showing an increase of \$300,000 in deposits since April 22.

William Conkle was killed near Horse-shoe Bend when a car driven by James Tyson of Banks overturned into a ditch.

Another cloudburst occurred last Wednesday near Challa, Washington, in the Canyon road for the second time in three weeks.

Thieves entered the store of the Deer River Hardware Co. on Tuesday night and carried away \$300 in currency and silver.

No bids were received in the office of the state assessor for the appropriation to the third advertised sale of the state of Idaho \$2,000,000 highway bonds.

W. C. Kennedy, who served in France as an aviator during war, is dead. He was killed by a gas attack while in the service of the state.
