

'BROTHER BILLS' SEEING PORTLAND EN ROUTE HOME

Wearers of the royal purple, representing every Elk lodge in the New England states and numerous organizations in Wisconsin, New Jersey, Kentucky and Illinois, arrived in Portland this morning en route home from the national convention of the organization, which was held at Los Angeles last week.

By tomorrow Portland will assume the appearance of a national convention city itself as 77 special cars of Elks in addition to numerous individual delegates will be in Portland for the day. It is anticipated that 200 "Brother Bills" will be here for the entire day.

WAGNER KEPT BUSY

The New England and Wisconsin delegations almost got into the city without being met by a reception committee this morning. The New England group, occupying four special cars, was scheduled to arrive at 9:15 o'clock this morning. About midnight Monday night Fred W. Wagner, general chairman of the Elks entertainment committee, received a telegram saying the group would be here at 7:30 o'clock.

Wagner did not have time to get any other members of his committee together, so he served as a committee of one. At the station he located a group of Elks and placed them in automobiles only to find that he was serving as a reception committee for a surprise party. The new arrivals were from Milwaukee and Madison, Wis., and were 58 in number.

CORRALS NEW ENGLANDERS

Hastening back to the station, Wagner found the New England delegation, 59 in number and representative of every lodge in the North Atlantic states, floundering around helpless so he engaged more automobiles and hustled them to the Multnomah hotel.

Upon their return from the highway trip this evening, they will be given an open house entertainment, a theatre party at the Liberty and then will depart for the Canadian Pacific trip and 10 for the Yellowstone national park. Mixed with the New Englanders are some delegates from New Jersey and Kentucky.

CHIEF ELK COYOTE

Monday evening delegates from the Fairmount, W. Va., lodge of Elks came as the forerunner of the 4000 returning "Bills" who are expected to be guests of the city this morning. The Virginia lodge was taken on sightseeing trips and after a seven hour visit left for the East. Arrival of W. W. Mountain of Toledo, the new grand exalted ruler, and other grand lodge officers Wednesday morning will be a big event in itself for the local lodge to make arrangements for. William McKinney will serve as chairman of the reception committee for the grand lodge officers.

Dr. Earl Morrow is heading the reception committee which is meeting every incoming train from the South. A. L. Tetu is chairman of reception work, and he is being assisted by Frank Smith and A. S. Robinson.

HAND OUT ROSES

Presentation of roses to the visitors is being handled by a committee headed by Mrs. J. Curtis Simmons. Ray Cullen, head of the house committee at the Elks club, has arranged numerous special features for the entertainment of the visitors. The lost and found department and other bureaus are on the main floor of the Multnomah and a special reception room is provided on the seventh floor.

Wednesday morning there will be special train and special car parties from St. Paul, Connecticut, Jersey City and Newark, Brooklyn, Bronx and Queens and New Orleans. All will remain for the day.

In the evening the Elks' band will give a concert to visiting Elks at Laurelhurst park. Arrangements have been made through the police traffic bureau to prohibit all parking around the park to cars other than those bearing the official Elk insignia.

ATTORNEY GENERAL TO UNTANGLE KNOT

Oregon City, July 19.—A decision by the state attorney general will be necessary to straighten out the tangle in the Clackamas county health office, according to Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health, who was in Oregon City Monday. It is expected that an opinion will be rendered by the attorney general within the next few days.

Dr. O. A. Welch, who is still recognized by the state board of health as the county officer, but who has been succeeded by an appointment of the county court by Dr. W. E. Hemstead, was appointed to the office under the old law, which made the tenure in office two years. Dr. Welch was still in office when the new law was passed establishing an indefinite tenure. Under the new law the tenure in office is dependent on the action of the state board. The attorney general will be called upon to decide whether Dr. Welch, who was appointed under the old law, can serve under the provisions of the new law. If the attorney general finds that the passage of the new law has made a vacancy in the office, the appointment of Dr. Hemstead will be legal.

America Led Into War by Idealism, Says Ambassador

Rheims, France, July 19.—(U. P.)—Idealism led America into the World war, Ambassador Myron Herrick declared in an address here today. Cheering Frenchmen who heard the speech at the laying of the cornerstone of the new municipal library, considered the statement a reply to Ambassador Harway's declaration in London that America fought for herself alone.

Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, also spoke. He handed to the French a rebuilding fund of 2,000,000 francs, collected in America. Herrick paid tribute to the progress France has made in reconstruction. Then he touched on the causes of the war and America's entry, declaring he had unalterable faith in the lofty and practical idealism of the French.

"Two million men came from the United States and fought for the practical ideals of humanity, liberty for men and nations," he declared. "Without ideals we cannot live. Materialism cannot prevail. Sooner or later it will be checked and defeated by the progress of those spiritual forces which, through the ages, have lifted mankind to a new and higher plane."

Mrs. Olga A. Burns, Formerly of Canby, Buried at Old Home

Canby, July 18.—Mrs. Olga Anderson Burns, a former resident of Canby, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Bailey, in Baker, Or., July 18, and the body was brought to this city for burial in Zion cemetery last Wednesday. Services were conducted by Rev. W. E. Feltz, pastor of the Baptist church of Oregon City.

Mrs. Burns was a native of Copenhagen, Denmark, but had been a resident of the United States more than 50 years. She was a resident of the Canby district up to about 12 years ago when she removed to Baker. For the past two years she had been ill with dropsy, which was the direct cause of her death. Surviving besides the husband, J. P. Burns, are two daughters, Mrs. George Bailey and Mrs. William Breckenridge, and a niece, Violet Clark.

TURKS IN FLIGHT TOWARD BLACK SEA ARMENIANS MOWED DOWN BY 'REDS'

Athens, July 19.—(U. P.)—Turkish troops in Asia Minor are fleeing headlong toward the Black sea, according to reports from the Greek front today. The reports said the Greek troops had occupied Kutachia after serious fighting. Turkish troops, following the line of the railroad, were abandoning guns and provisions in an effort to evade their pursuers.

Kutachia, 150 miles northwest of Smyrna, is the end of a short railway branch, and its possession gives the Greeks command of a long stretch of rail leading into Eskişehir.

Husband Shoots Dead Wife Who Attacked Him While He Slept

Vallejo, Cal., July 19.—(I. N. S.)—Jennie Budzisko arrived at her home here shortly before 6 o'clock this morning and attacked her husband, who was asleep. She struck him on the head with a flatiron, cut him with a knife, cut a gash in his head with an ax and shot him three times. Budzisko arose from his bed, seized the revolver and shot his wife through the heart, killing her instantly.

He is in a hospital and cannot live. Police believe that Budzisko had been admonishing her because she stayed away from home at night. She was fully dressed when found by the police and indications were that he had been asleep when she attacked him.

REFRIGERATOR SCOUTS CAMP
Hesper, July 15.—Eighteen members of the local Boy Scouts troop, accompanied by Scoutmaster Livingston, hiked with their packs 25 miles to the mountains and spent last week in camp there. The distance was covered there in one day, arriving at their destination at 4 o'clock p. m. Returning, the same distance was covered in eight hours. Hesper has a troop of 24 members and is doing excellent work.

SEATTLE HUSHES NEWS OF SERIOUS AUTO ACCIDENT

"Can the news of a major accident, in which a city-owned vehicle crashed into a private car, injuring the occupants so severely that they had to be taken to a hospital, be suppressed by municipal departments upon which possible blame might fall?"

This is the opening sentence of a story which appeared in the Seattle Star nearly a week after a Seattle fire truck crashed into the automobile of W. S. Kirkpatrick, president of the Portland Ag club, injuring both him and Mrs. Kirkpatrick so badly that it was necessary for both to be removed to the minor hospital.

According to a direct statement sent to The Journal by Kirkpatrick, the firemen made no report of the accident and sought when interrogated to place responsibility for the omission on the police officer who was present immediately after the collision, but who also failed to make a report.

CRASH OCCURS

"The dirtiest outrage imaginable" is Kirkpatrick's expression concerning the treatment accorded him. He added that, coming from the home of friends in Kirkland, Wash., where he and Mrs. Kirkpatrick were removed after a week in the hospital.

"The accident was in no way our fault, nor could it be foreseen or anticipated. We were driving about 15 miles an hour through one of the Seattle suburbs, six or seven miles from the center of the city, last Saturday evening, July 9, about 6:30 o'clock, when the fire truck dashed out of a blind highway onto the paved highway and crashed into us without sounding a warning and at an excessive rate of speed. The only thing that saved the lives of all of us was my purely automatic action in swerving the car, causing the truck to hit us at an angle instead of square on. The car took the blow right at the center thus preventing it being turned over. We were taken into a house and from there an ambulance took us to the hospital.

WOMAN BABY INJURED

"Now strange to say the whole matter had the soft pedal placed upon it and nothing appeared upon the police blotter about it and nothing in the papers."

The only news which got to Portland was by way of night letters sent the Ad club and my office last Sunday evening (July 11). While it would be natural to expect that an unusual case against the city of Seattle for extreme negligence and carelessness on account of one of its departments, attorneys inform us that we haven't a fighting chance due to the operation of a traffic law obsolete these last 18 years. However, we are all thanking a kind providence who still permits us to be in the land of the living."

In the car with the Kirkpatricks were Dr. and Mrs. D. V. Truesblood and their small son. The heavy Studebaker was carried 50 feet by the impact until it lodged against a telephone pole. Kirkpatrick's arm, thrust through the windshield, was deeply lacerated. A surgical quiet prevented him bleeding to death. Mrs. Kirkpatrick was rendered unconscious and for several days was unable to walk. Dr. Truesblood was cut by flying glass and suffered a fractured rib. News of the accident was obtained in Tacoma from an item in The Journal.

Wife Says Husband Was 'Vamped' by Friend of Family

San Francisco, July 19.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Mary F. Alexander, wife of Wallace Van Winkle Alexander, wealthy Los Angeles broker, charges that her husband was "vamped" by a family friend, Mrs. C. Edith Prudhammer, 50 years old, and 10 years her own senior.

Mrs. Alexander, accompanied by private detectives, broke into Mrs. Prudhammer's Larkin street apartment and claims to have found her husband there, hiding in a closet in his underwear. When her husband came out of the closet, she says, she produced a pencil and he signed over to her their beautiful Los Gatos home, all of the house furnishings and their automobile.

The following day, just as she was about to bring suit for divorce, she was served with a summons of a similar action by her husband, who charged cruelty.

Ukrainian Revolt Is Crushed, but Soviet Fears New Outbreak

London, July 19.—(I. N. S.)—The revolt of the peasants in Ukraine has been crushed, according to a Central News dispatch from Moscow today.

A Riga dispatch quotes M. Zinoviev, one of the leading communist chiefs in Russia, as telling the Third International: "The Russian communists must prepare for attacks from all sides." Advice from Helsinki on Monday quoted travelers from Russia as saying that Russia was mobilizing in anticipation of further warfare.

Bela Kun Held as Red Plot Suspect

Copenhagen, July 19.—(I. N. S.)—Bela Kun, former communist dictator of Hungary, has been arrested at Lemberg for plotting a Red uprising in Galicia, according to a dispatch printed by the Berlingske Tidende today.

Ten thousand dollars is the capital stock of the Willamette Stevedoring company, with M. Williamson, H. K. Barnes and C. H. Johnson, the incorporators.

Tillamook, July 19.—The Tillamook chautauquus for 1931 closed Friday night. A contract was signed to bring the chautauquus back next year under the Cadman bureau's management.

American Legion Asks Work for Disabled 'Vets'

Efforts are being made by the employment bureau of Portland post of the American Legion to find work for two disabled veterans. Both men are unable to do heavy work but are capable of positions as night watchmen or elevator operators. A bulletin from the bureau states that more than 50 men are out of work and have to depend on odd jobs to make out an existence. The bureau telephone, Main 5347, is in constant use by men desiring work.

Real Estate Man Must Give Office, Not Home, Ruling

Salem, Or., July 19.—The designation of a banking office where the broker is engaged in both the banking business and that of real estate broker, is a compliance with the law, according to the opinion of I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, which was handed down today at the request of A. C. Barber, insurance commissioner and ex-officio real estate commissioner.

"The real estate brokers' law requiring every applicant for a real estate broker's license to give the location of his office, which shall serve as his place of business, does not authorize one to reside at a stream and have the location of his office his home in the country when his business is transacted in the city, nor his home in the residential district when his business is actually conducted elsewhere," said the opinion. "but it requires each real estate broker to maintain an office for the conduct of his business."

Woman Made Ill Blames Poisonous Mixture on Grass

Prindle, Wash., July 19.—Mrs. Gus Backe set forth from her home to an adjacent farmhouse for berries. Her way led along the railroad tracks and at each step she pushed aside the tall grass ahead of her with her hands. Arriving at a stream she paused to drink, cupping her hands to do so. An hour after she had returned home she was taken violently ill. Medical aid was summoned, to which she responded as if out of danger. It is believed that poison sprayed on the grass along the railroad right of way to kill it had been transmitted to her when she drank and in turn communicated internally in the drinking process.

3 More Husbands Of Society Woman Reported in Bill

Chicago, July 19.—(I. N. S.)—Three other undivorced husbands of Mrs. Ethel Hallett Hayes, New York society woman, were named by Mayor Philip Hayes, West Point army instructor, in his suit for annulment, according to records made public here today. The annulment was granted by Judge Joseph Schaefer.

The marital tangles of Mrs. Hayes involved a California broker, a Kansas City contractor and a New York sportsman, according to Hayes in his suit.

PROPOSED DUTY ON ASPHALT DEFEATED

Washington, July 19.—(I. N. S.)—The house ways and means committee must defeat again today when the house votes, 123 to 26, to place asphalt on the free list.

This action was taken despite the ways and means committee recommendations for a tariff on asphalt.

Under the pending bill, asphalt was placed on the dutiable list, while previous tariff bills have carried this commodity on the free list.

It was claimed by those favoring road construction that the duty imposed would add millions to the cost of road building planned by the several states and would defeat the purpose of federal financial aid to highway improvement.

Clamping duties on oil and on asphalt as hostile to construction of good roads and further development of motor transportation systems as adjuncts to railroad carriers, the rural members of the house lined up in opposition and their attacks on the committee recommendations were sharp and vigorous.

Action to the asphalt item will clear the way for the batch of committee amendments to the bill, numbering more than 300.

Four major items of the bill have been disposed of by open action in the house. These were hides, which were taken from the free list and made dutiable at 15 per cent; chemical dyes, on which the three year embargo subject to control of the tariff commission was permitted to stand; silk, which were taken from the dutiable list and put on the free list, and cotton, which was taken from the free list and made dutiable at 15 per cent on staple 1 1/2 inches in length and over.
