Frank Payne Caught Soon After Escape From Penitentiary Motorcycle Rider Is Hurt in Crash With Automobile

Salem, Or., July 27.—Frank Payne, 18, an inmate of the state penitentiary, who made his escape Tuesday afternoon, was captured by guards in a hebo camp, about midway between Marion and Tuesday evening. He offered no resistance. A track walker, who had been asked by Payne to buy a fountain pen carried by the convict, immediately notified officials and several guards were dispatched to Marion. Hobbes in that vicinity had seen the arrival of the officers and had warned Payne, but the escaped man was discovered a few minutes later, hiding behind a log located a short distance from the railroad track. Payne had not discarded his prison garb, and the red numbers, boldly showing him to be a convict, made him easily recognizable. Payne escaped about 2 o'clock Tuesday after he had gained a note which gained him permission to visit the state highway garage. He had been working in a gang at the prison brickyard and was not a trusty.

Alsea River Lumber Company Goes Into Hands of Receiver

Eugene, July 27.—The Alsea River Lumber company, a concern capitalized at \$1,500,000, was granted a receivership in Judge G. F. Skidworth's court here Tuesday. Henry Fisher was appointed receiver. The firm owes about \$500,000 to various creditors and has a number of suits on its hands. It is understood that the receivership was a friendly one, so that the company would be able to reorganize. The assets are said to be about \$1,200,000, consisting of a large sawmill at Glenbrook, railroads, equipment, standing timber in the Alsea river basin and that territory, which is in Clatsop county.
