

DR. YOUNG FINDS RELIEF IN THE LEGAL CLIMATE

Dr. Benjamin Young, who won his way into Portland hearts as pastor of the First Methodist church, and who left eight years ago for another pastorate, is in the city for a few days, the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Amede Smith at their Riverside home.

Dr. Young is now pastor of the big Union Methodist Episcopal church in the heart of downtown St. Louis, and he is assisted by a staff of eight specialists in the various departments of the church. Those who had not seen him for eight years could discern no change in Dr. Young's appearance. Though he has celebrated his fifty-first birthday, his hair has lost only the least bit of its ruddy color around the temples and his face is that of a youth.

He came West primarily to help his brother, Rev. W. B. Young, and Bishop Shephard, dedicate the new \$60,000 Methodist church at Ellensburg, Wash., of which his brother is pastor.

"I couldn't stay away from Portland when I was so near," he said, "and really, now that I am here, I realize more than ever that I am a Pacific coast man. I hope to come back to the coast some day."

"St. Louis, however, is a great city. It has a million persons. Its industrial achievements are marvelous and its recent growth is startling. The temperature is far from pleasant now. For 35 days the thermometer ranged from 90 to 100 degrees, never during the entire period lower than 80. The Portland summer weather is incomparable."

Dr. Young will preach Sunday morning and evening at the First Methodist church here. He will return to his own pulpit the last Sunday of this month, keeping a Chautauqua engagement at Piasa, Ill., on his way back.

This is on the line with the theory that tax burdens should be diverted to a period of years so that future generations may bear a large part of the cost of the war.

This policy, however, is opposed by Republican economists in the executive branch of the government who think the government's borrowing power would be adversely affected by such a plan.

STARKER LINES UP
The country will see some strange political lineups before the end of the present session of congress. Many western Republicans do not like the idea of repealing the excess and profit taxes. Several Democrats will find it necessary to vote for the Republican tax and tariff bills while a goodly number of Republicans whose constituents will have been hard hit by the tariff or tax measures will vote against their party.

But broadly speaking, the Democratic party will range itself against the Fordney tariff and the new revenue law and back its whole attack against the next congressional elections. It is too early to know what the Democrats will do about the peace treaty situation. They are waiting to see what formula is brought forth by the Harding administration.

The other day, however, Senator Harrison of Missouri, Democrat, fired the opening gun by inquiring vainly from the Republicans as to whether America was at peace with Germany.

WILL NOT SWALLOW IT
The Democrats, for the most part, are silent, however, while the Senate conducts its secret negotiations with Germany and the allies. The Democrats will unquestionably decline to accept the Hughes formula, when submitted on much the same grounds as were adopted by the Republicans against Wilson.

The Democrats are already beginning to say that the party which many is not being arrived at very openly and that when the treaty is finally submitted they will not swallow it without the crossing of a "t" or the dotting of an "i."

Instead they will endeavor to attack the Versailles pact with the League of Nations covered and the Senate voted down they will offer the Versailles treaty with the Lodge reservations and call for a vote in an effort to place the Republicans on record as having reversed themselves on foreign policy.

CAN BLOCK RATIFICATION
The Democrats control more than one-third of the senate and can block ratification of any treaty. They are saying that the senate will not ratify the treaty in advance of the agreements being made with foreign powers and that as a consequence amendments and reservations will be in order when the treaty is finally submitted for ratification.

The Democrats are quiet now, but they are planning to play a more aggressive part as an opposition party as soon as the Republicans have passed tax or tariff legislation. Politics which have been adjourned for several months will soon be reconvened.

A PYRAMID OF HAPPY CAMPFIRE GIRLS



Members of Portland's new organization, who left this morning for an outing at their summer camp on the Clackamas river, where they will spend three weeks in work and play.

Seventy-five members of Portland's newly organized Camp Fire Girls left this morning for their summer camp on the Clackamas river. The start was made from Central library, members of the council and other friends contributing a dozen machines to convey the campers to their destination and Hill Military academy contributing two huge trucks on which the baggage was carried.

One of the trucks started at an early hour loaded with groceries and the sec-

ond was used to take the bedding and personal baggage. Representatives of the national guard have spent the last few days at the scene of the camp, erecting tents and otherwise putting the place in order.

The camp will be called Camp Namoun, which is the Indian for beaver, symbolic of Oregon and indicating industry. A regular schedule of work and play will be adhered to each day, with classes in many kinds of camp craft and nature lore in charge of com-

petent teachers. Mrs. Elizabeth J. White, the Camp Fire Girls' executive, will be in general charge of the camp and she will be assisted by the guardians of the various groups and the council. The camp will be open for three weeks. Many of the girls are remaining for the entire period. Others will remain only one or two weeks and their places will be taken by girls who are already registering at the headquarters at Meier & Frank's.

when the shots struck him. His loaded revolver, which had not been fired, was found beside his body, indicating that he had time to draw the weapon before his slayers opened fire.

According to Deputy Sheriff C. A. Patton, who investigated, Mrs. Obenchain said she was on the top step of the stairs, above Kennedy, when he was killed. Patton said that the wads of the shotgun discharges were found embedded in the back of Kennedy's head, showing the shots were fired from close range.

A baffling angle of the investigation was the conflicting versions of Mrs. Obenchain's love affair with Kennedy. Mrs. Obenchain, herself, declared she loved Kennedy and was to marry him. She said she had been the cause of her divorce from her husband, Ralph B. Obenchain, a Chicago attorney, a year ago a half ago. She said Kennedy had begged her to marry him.

On the other hand Kennedy's father, John D. Kennedy, declared Mrs. Obenchain had "hounded" his son, aged 26, because of his persistent refusal to marry her. He said Mrs. Obenchain, aged 28, who was once voted to be the most beautiful girl on the Northwestern university campus, was "madly in love" with his son.

KILLED WITH SHOTGUN

Kennedy was killed with a shotgun. The back of his skull was blown off.

Mrs. Obenchain, who is the divorced wife of Ralph B. Obenchain, a Chicago attorney, is said to have been a passenger in "chummy roadster" before she was divorced. Mrs. Obenchain obtained a divorce from her husband on the ground of desertion by her husband with other women. Obenchain, at his office here today, was greatly perturbed when he heard of the Los Angeles affair.

"The Kennedys are friends of my former wife's family," he said, "but Kennedy had absolutely nothing to do with our trouble, which occurred in Chicago more than a year and a half ago. I cannot think of any reason why anyone should want to shoot Kennedy."

Tacoma Banker Escapes Trial For Bank Crash

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 6.—(U. P.)—J. E. Chibberg, former president of both the Tacoma and Seattle Scandinavian-American banks, which collapsed last week, will not have to stand trial in superior court on five felony indictments. Judge Clifford today sustained Chibberg's demurrer to a charge of manslaughter.

Chibberg was accused of allowing a director of the Tacoma bank to borrow from the bank's funds without first obtaining permission from the board of directors.

Chibberg's attorneys claimed the loans were not new, but were simply renewals of the five indictments.

Chibberg had given the bank in 1917.

City officials and various business organizations are endeavoring to work out a plan that will permit the street cars to resume.

R. C. Chambers, receiver for the street railway company, contends that the cars could resume service if buses were de-permissioned to use car line streets.

He asserts that if this were ordered the street railways would reduce fares from \$1 to 7 cents after a few months.

Commerce are said to favor resumption of street car service at a 5-cent fare with the understanding that bus competition be entirely removed.
