What we want is reciprocity, and if the Washington officials exclude Oregon contractors and business houses from participating in their business, Oregon officials, too, must take similar action and exclude Washington firms from participating in the business being done by our public institutions. The proposition can work both ways and immediate action must be taken. Any official who wishes to ascertain for himself can view the letter


