Oregon Boy's Body Brought Home From France for Burial

Cornelius, Aug. 13.—The body of Wesley J. Cooper, who lost his life in France, was brought to Forest Grove July 31 for burial, the funeral taking place at the Cornelius cemetery last Sunday morning at 10 o'clock, under the auspices of the Loyal Legion, Rev. F. G. Crozier, former pastor of the Methodist church, had charge of the services.

Bid on Flint Street Work Is Rejected; New Bids Are Asked

A difference of \$4719.50 was disclosed between the estimate of the city engineer and the bid of Manning & Co. for the improvement of Flint street, from the north line of Tillamook street to 350 feet northerly, when the bid was opened at the city council session. This company was the only bidder on the work. The city engineer's estimate was \$11,852. The offer was \$7,132.50.

Pasco Council Is to Elect New Member

Pasco, Wash., Aug. 13.—Considerable interest is being manifested in the Tuesday evening meeting of the city council, when a successor to E. W. Newman as councilman is to be selected. Newman resigned, giving as his reason that he did not care to be a member of a council when little or no effort is being made to enforce ordinances regulating or forbidding gambling, bootlegging, etc.

Cle Elum Men Make Bid for 7,000,000 Feet Forest Timber

Bid for the sale of 7,000,000 feet of timber on the Mosquito creek watershed in the Wenatchee National forest was received from Miller & Dunn of Cle Elum by T. T. Munger of the forest management division of the U. S. Forest service. The stand, located a few miles from Easton, consists of Douglas fir, western white pine, hemlock and western red cedar. The bid was \$3 a thousand for the white pine, \$1.50 for the fir and cedar and 75 cents for the remaining species.

Vancouver Claims Oldest Apple Tree

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 13.—The oldest apple tree in the Northwest stands on the military reservation below Fifth street. It is 85 years old this year, and it grew from a seed brought from London in 1835 by an official of the Hudson Bay company, then sole occupants of the present site of Vancouver. In 1911 the discovery was made that the trunk of the tree was rotting at points where the limbs had broken off, leaving deep wounds that held moisture. Chat Knight and A. A. Quarberg scooped out the rotten wood and filled the holes with concrete and saved the life of the tree. The old tree is 18 inches in diameter and stands about 40 feet high and is still bearing

apples which are eatable, although not up to the standard of Clarke county production.

La Grande, Aug. 13.—Charles Brill, who was injured in a hayfield several days ago, died Friday as the result of his injuries. He slid down a hay stack, landing on a fork, and was internally injured. He was 14 years of age.

Accept Wage Reduction—Shop craft employees of the American Railway Express company, through their representatives, have agreed to accept a reduction in wages which will become effective September 1, according to advice received by Rex N. Shinn, business representative for the International Association of Mechanics. The reduction amounts to 4 cents an hour, and while affecting a large number of employees throughout the country, only affects a small group locally. The proposition has been submitted to the employees affected.

Espea Employees Pledge—Approximately 2500 Southern Pacific railway company employees and members of their families attended the annual picnic of the S. P. company held at the fair grounds at Salem Saturday. A special train of 14 cars carried 1500 Portland employees to the picnic and another special train of seven cars operated from Roseburg to the fair grounds to bring the employees and the southern part of the Oregon lines to the gathering. An extensive entertainment program including sports of all kinds, was provided by the entertainment committee.

Counterfeit Half Dollars Found—Two clever imitation half dollars were taken to the police station Friday by victims of a gang of counterfeiters believed to be operating in the city. Both coins were made of lead and struck off from a die exactly like the latest design for Liberty half dollars. J. Kreiger, 803 Union avenue, and the Twentieth Century grocery store were the victims. The police issued a warning against the counterfeiters, advising the public to examine their change carefully and notified the federal authorities.
