

HAUSER HAS PLAN FOR CRATER LAKE POPULARITY BOOM

Klamath Falls, Aug. 16.—Thousands of tourists are visiting Crater lake where there should be hundreds of thousands, declared Eric V. Hauser of Portland, president of the Crater Lake National Park company, in an address at a banquet given the Portland Ad club here Monday night by the Chamber of Commerce.

Hauser announced that he would return here in a few weeks and lay a plan before the business men designed to make Crater lake immensely popular and attract to it throngs from all parts of the country.

He did not reveal his plan, but it is understood that it will consist largely of the establishment of a scenic circle tour that will include all the major scenic attractions of Southern Oregon and link together such big things that tourists would be compelled to include the circuit in their trip.

Julius L. Meier spoke for a closer relationship between the communities of the state, declaring that a statewide spirit should be developed. "With Oregon becoming all dressed up, building good roads, completing transcontinental highways and developing generally, it seems to me that Klamath Falls has an opportunity second to none among the communities of the state," he said.

A. H. Devers said he noted a change in Klamath Falls, that the city was Oregon in spirit rather than Californian. The visit of the Ad club, he said, was to show that the northern part of the state is interested in the southern border and also to tell what might be expected by the state to follow a great exposition in 1925.

The Ad club party in 12 automobiles departed this morning for Bend en route to Portland.

AD CLUB MEMBERS SING

CRATER LAKE'S PRAISES
Crater Lake, Or., Aug. 16.—Members of the Portland Ad club, en route through Southern Oregon, sang "Crater Lake" early Sunday morning for Crater Lake, arriving at Crater Lake lodge in time for dinner. For many the trip to the lake was something new and many were the expressions of admiration for the natural beauty of the park and the splendid facilities and conveniences of the lodge.

Since C. Y. Tengwald, the new manager of the Crater Lake National Park company, took over the active administration of the lodge and adjoining grounds, many changes have been made, both for the benefit of the guests of the lodge and campers in the park. Virtually all facilities of the lodge, which heretofore have been in the hands of the Crater Lake National Park company, have been placed at the disposal of all. Water, which campers were compelled to obtain from the government station, is now available in the heart of the camping grounds.

LECTURE IS ENJOYED

Quite a number of the Ad club party are camping and all are generally in their praise of the work of the new management. Sunday night the guests of the lodge were entertained with a lecture by Ira W. Williams, geologist from the state bureau of geology. The formation of the crater in which the lake is located was vividly explained by Williams and graphically demonstrated on a series of charts.

Dancing was the order of the evening, following the lecture. Early Monday morning members of the party were taken on a trip about the lake in the new boat, "Sparrow." All the Ad Clubbers were guests of the management on the boat trip and upon their return to the landing place the new boat was christened and dedicated to its future service on Crater lake by George Ranch, vice-president of the Portland Ad club.

RAIN SETTLES DUST

Everything was done by the Crater Lake National Park company, of which Eric V. Hauser is president, to make the stay of the Portlanders pleasant. Admission to the park was arranged by the company, members of the caravan being provided with the Crater Lake National Park emblem, complimentary registration fees being cared for by the company.

Roads from Medford to the lake are in fine condition and all are generally night having settled most of the dust and making the drive through the mountain forest most enjoyable.

Most of the members of the caravan left Crater Lake for Klamath Falls early Monday afternoon.

Forest Supervisor Reports Workmen On Sky Line Road

T. H. Sherrard, supervisor of the Oregon national forest, returned Monday from looking over road construction on the Sky Line road south of Clackamas lake, on the summit of the Cascade mountains. This is a section of the proposed road to connect the Mount Hood loop road with Crater lake along the summit of the Cascades.

Sherrard reports that 16 men are working on the road with a 10-ton tractor and a full equipment of road machinery. He said the road has been completed from Clackamas lake for five miles, which makes 15 miles of excellent road from Clear lake south towards Mount Jefferson. Scores of campers and huckleberry pickers are in the mountains, Sherrard said.

DRAMATIC SCENE EXPECTED

OBERCHAIN LOST HIS JOB WITH INSURANCE COMPANY
Chicago, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—Ralph S. Oberchain, who was called the "man in a million" when he went to the aid of his former wife, Mrs. Madalynne Oberchain, accused in Los Angeles of the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, is out of a job today.

Oberchain was employed as an attorney for the Aetna Insurance company. Mrs. Oberchain objected to Oberchain going to Los Angeles, claiming that his connection with the case already had brought the company sufficient notoriety.

When Oberchain insisted on going to Los Angeles the firm terminated his connection with it.

THREE SEE TOGETHER
On the two nights preceding the death of John Belton Kennedy, Madalynne Oberchain, Arthur C. Burch and the murdered man met in Burch's room at the Russell hotel, police operatives assert.

A scrubwoman in the Laughlin building, where Kennedy had his office, just across the street from the Russell hotel, first told the police she had seen the trio in conference. Her statements have been corroborated by employees of the Russell hotel.

Mrs. Oberchain entered Burch's room first on each occasion, according to the story told the police. Burch told the night clerk at the hotel that Madalynne was his cousin, according to the clerk's deposition.

JOINED BY KENNEDY
A few minutes after entering the hotel room the first night, Mrs. Oberchain is alleged to have waved from the window to Kennedy, whose office is just across Broadway. Kennedy answered the summons without delay, police officers say, and joined the trio in conference, in the hotel room.

On the second night, it is said, Kennedy went across to the hotel and saw Mrs. Oberchain in her room without waiting for any signal.

Pointblank questions put to Burch as to the alleged meetings were met with silence. Burch refused to make comment of any sort and maintained his unbroken silence regarding the crime.

Madalynne, who has been willing to talk freely on other aspects of the case, also asked to be excused from discussing the police statement.

"If Mr. Burch will not talk, I will not," she said.

Infantryman's Wife Kidnaped; Posse Is Seeking 3 Negroes

Anniston, Ala., Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—A posse headed by military and police authorities is searching for three negroes who last night kidnaped the young wife of Gail Stormer of Birmingham, member of Company K, Fourth Infantry, Alabama National Guard, in training at Camp McClellan here.

According to the story told authorities by Stormer, his wife was walking about the city when the three negroes jumped from an automobile and kidnapped her.

CROPS DAMAGED IN TWO COUNTIES BY STORM OF SUNDAY

Elgin, Or., Aug. 16.—Spring grain, as well as some winter wheat, still standing in the field, was considerably damaged by an electrical hail and wind storm, which visited some sections of Union and Walla Walla counties Sunday night.

Hail stones as large as English walnuts fell on Cricket flat and in the Milnam districts, accompanied by considerable wind and rain. Fruit in many farm orchards was stripped from the trees and battered and bruised until virtually ruined.

Fortunately, most of the winter wheat had been harvested and was little injured. The hail did not reach the commercial orchards of the Elgin, Imbler and Summerville sections. The section immediately surrounding Elgin entirely escaped the damage.

REPORTS OF DAMAGE AS STORM RESULT ARE FEW
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 16.—Although the inland Empire and Spokane was struck Sunday night by one of the worst dust, wind and electrical storms since 1913, few reports of material damage have followed.

Heavy showers fell from below Walla Walla on the Oregon-Washington line as far north as the Canadian boundary. Washituna, Hooper and Lamont appear to be the west line of the rain, which fell in Lincoln county in generous quantities.

At Ritzville the wind blew down some fruit and put the electric light plant out of commission for a few hours. The electric display was unusually severe here. Rain began falling at Ritzville Monday morning.

PROPERTY SWEEP AWAY

MUD, ROCKS FILL HOME
Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 16.—The Red Cross responded to a call from near Arroyo, where they found the home of Simon Bough badly damaged by Monday's cloudburst. Located at the foot of a canyon it was half filled with mud and water and huge boulders that had crashed down upon it. Poultry, furniture and all clothing were swept into the river and all trace of the well had disappeared.

Mrs. Bough and the five children had rushed about 20 feet from the house when it was struck by the flood of mud and water.

GRANDE RONDE DAMAGE LIGHT

La Grande, Aug. 16.—Damage done to grain and other crops in the Grande Ronde valley by hail, rain and wind storm believed to be slight so far as has been learned. The wind and rain storms were general in the entire valley.

Reserve Bank Head Takes Up Complaint Made by Portlander

Washington, Aug. 16.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Governor Harding of the Federal Reserve board informs Senator McNary he is communicating with Federal Reserve bank at San Francisco to investigate a complaint brought to McNary's attention by T. J. Smith of Portland, who represents five million dollars urgently needed to finance the wheat crop, but that accommodation is refused by member banks.

Harding says he does not believe banks have refused the usual credits and that the trouble probably is due to their inability to accept drafts on warehouse grain yet unsold, a policy which he says is approved by experience and previous rulings. He promises an investigation and action to the full extent justified by law and sound policy.

DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS IS TO DECIDE COURSE ON TAX BILL
Washington, Aug. 16.—(I. N. S.)—The Democratic attitude on the tax revision bill will be decided at a caucus of house Democratic members late today.

While there has been adverse criticism of the bill and the tax revision presented by some of the Democratic leaders on the ground that it was a sham and camouflage, the general course of Democratic members in support or rejection of the bill has not been determined.

It was expected this morning that many of them will follow the opinion of George White, chairman of the Democratic national committee, that the bill proposed is bad and prepared for the purpose of fooling the people, and vote against the measure when it comes up for final action in the house.

Republican leaders went ahead this morning preparing their plans for consideration of the bill in the house and its final passage next Saturday.

FORMER HOUSE LEADER MANN INSURGERS AGAINST TAX PLAN

Washington, Aug. 16.—An insurgent movement of unexpected strength, led by former Republican House Leader "Jim" Mann of Illinois, has temporarily set awry the administration's plan to repeal immediately the excess profits and reduce sur-tax.

A party caucus late Monday turned down the recommendations of President Harding, Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and a majority of the Republican members of the house ways and means committee, that reduction of the taxes on rich corporations and wealthy individuals be made retroactive to January 1. The Republicans voted 95 to 87 that the excess profits levy on corporations should be repealed and the sur-taxes on persons with large incomes shall not be reduced until January 1, 1922. The effective date of the increase in corporate income tax from 10 to 15 per cent as a partial substitute for the excess profits, also was postponed until next January by the ways and means committee, after the caucus cut the increase to 12½ per cent.

The action of the caucus would mean increased revenue during the current year of about \$50,000,000 and would cut the next tax reductions to only \$250,000,000 below the highest war rates. As it now stands, the tax bill would raise about \$350,000,000, or about \$350,000,000 more than is estimated as necessary.

Back of Mann in the insurgent movement were nearly all of the Western and Middle Western Republicans.

He argued that the retroactive reduction and repeal of these taxes would enable the corporations to pocket hundreds of millions which they had collected from the people for the government. All business concerns paying the excess profits, already have tacked on their products enough to pay this levy, he said.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO BOOST CRATER LAKE TO TOURISTS

Accommodations are so much improved at Crater lake national park that the Southern Pacific Railway company will no longer hesitate to encourage tourist travel through Southern Oregon's most scenic territory, said Charles S. Fee, passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific system today.

Fee has just completed a tour of the park and expressed satisfaction with the results obtained by the new management. Data obtained has been sent to the San Francisco office and a folder will be prepared to encourage further tourist travel to Crater lake. For many years the Southern Pacific did not do more than it had to in encouraging tourist travel to Crater lake because it believed accommodations unsatisfactory.

WILL PROVIDE BOATS
In addition to the circulars Fee says that arrangements will be made to honor main line tickets between Medford and Weed over the Klamath Falls branch so that tourists can make the trip through Crater lake park by making a through trip between Klamath Falls and Medford. He says that new boat facilities will soon be provided on Klamath lake so that tourists may take that 30-mile trip.

In commenting upon the material improvement that has taken place at Crater lake Fee said:

"Mark Twain once made the statement that the absence of Jane Austen's novels made a good library. Those who are familiar with the hotel system at the rim of Crater lake will get my meaning."

Reduced summer excursion fares did not add sufficient passenger traffic for the Southern Pacific Railway company to offset the shrinkage in the volume of passenger travel from former years, according to Fee.

TRAFFIC FALLS DOWN
"Present revenue returns from passenger traffic are very unsatisfactory," said Fee. "Outside of the Elks, K. of C. and Men's clubs, we have had no conventions on the coast this summer that yielded any considerable westbound transcontinental traffic, and the excursion business to California last winter was not up to normal."

"The volume of tourist business to the coast for 1921-22 will not, in my judgment, equal tourist travel of this season. Restrictions on immigration traffic will also operate to reduce the passenger earnings of all the rail carriers and altogether there is nothing encouraging in the outlook for passenger traffic this winter or during 1922 unless business as a whole takes a very radical turn upward."
