

WIFE ABOUT TO SEPARATE PIPER FROM HIS BIRTH

Even though his candidacy for appointment as collector of customs bears the joint and official indorsement of both Senator McNary and Senator Stanford, George U. Piper of Portland is not out of the political woods, according to political gossip, which has it that an avalanche of protest has been started Washingtonward. Much the same condition is said to confront Dr. Linville of Carlton, nominee for appointment as federal prohibition enforcement officer, against whom the Anti-Saloon league influence is reported to be concentrated.

To put it mildly George Piper's recommendation for collector of customs threw an awful jolt into the old time party leaders and head men of the state when its announcement was made from Washington. He was a candidate, and an energetic one. Everybody who knew anything about patronage activities, was aware of that. But there were few who believed he would be able to do a job more than a subordinate one. When he landed at the top general and shocked surprise was manifested on every hand.

BOYS GETTING BUSY
And now, that the boys have recovered their breath somewhat and have taken note of the fact that Piper's name has not been sent to the senate by the president and can not be until that body reconvenes the latter part of September, they are getting busy.

Piper's appointment is not relished for many reasons, some of them political, and some otherwise. From a political standpoint it is the only one that he has not voted in Oregon nor taken any part in party activities in this state for years prior to the campaign of 1920. During that period he centralized on the Standard candidacy, and this undoubtedly, had much to do with his success. For his appointment is a Stanford selection purely, and is so recognized among political leaders.

British proposals should be rejected unanimously. "It is still wide open," De Valera declared after he had finished. "Mickey" Collins, minister of finance, told the Dail that it was planned to send a mission of 100,000 pounds sterling to Ireland and \$30,000,000 in America. After he had read to the Dail his letter to Lloyd George, De Valera said: "There are enough women and men in Ireland to take our places so that before the last is taken the British government will be out of existence."

PEACE PROPOSALS REJECTED. BRITISH PREMIER ANNOUNCES

Roseburg, Aug. 26.—Special Agent S. B. Sanderfer, better known as "Booze-Hound," arrived here today from Medford to confer with Sheriff Starmer. Sanderfer, assisted by four deputies, has completed a successful two weeks' siege with Jackson county whiskey runners, making 30 arrests. Among those awaiting trial is "Shine" Edwards, who the officers say, is one of the principals in the large bootlegging ring which has been operating in Jackson county for some time. Sanderfer, who worked out of the governor's office, is hot on the trail of "Dug" Walgemont, who is alleged to be carrying on operations by automobile. He is supposed to be headed for the Canadian line after a fresh supply.

HAWAIIAN SPAN DISREGARD; TO ASK NEW TENDERS

The county commissioners this morning in special session decided to reject all bids for the work on the Hawthorne bridge and readvertise for new offers. The new specifications will provide that the work must be completed within 45 days, and if the contractor does the work in less time he will receive a bonus of \$250 for each day less than that time in which the work is completed. If he exceeds the 45 days he must forfeit to the county \$250 per day for the overtime.

Order Is Given to Destroy All Liquor; Keeping Cost High

Washington, Aug. 26.—(U. P.)—Federal Prohibition Commissioner Roy Haynes, in a general order today to prohibition officials, ordered the immediate destruction and disposal where possible of stocks of liquor seized in enforcing the national prohibition law. Automobiles, vessels and other vehicles taken from bootleggers also must be disposed of and a report made by each official before September 15.

Body Is Identified; Death Held Natural

Roseburg, Aug. 26.—The body found in a lonely cabin three miles south of Sutherlin Thursday was identified as that of Benjamin Hall, aged 77, who evidently succumbed to heart disease. No evidence of foul play was discovered. Coroner Rittner, who made the investigation, believes death due to natural causes.

MULTNOMAH FARM INQUIRY IS ASKED

Charging that the books of the county auditor are at variance with the contents of County Commissioner Holman to the effect that the Multnomah county farm has been paying an annual profit of approximately \$7500 for the past three or four years, a group of taxpayers have written a letter to the grand jury asking that an investigation be made, the ultimate facts determined and given publicity for the benefit of the public.
