

SHRINERS TO HOLD GREAT LABOR DAY PICNIC AT ALBANY

Albany, Or., Sept. 2.—Preparations for the big Willamette Valley Shriners' picnic and entertainment to be held here Labor day were formulated Wednesday night when H. J. Boyd, recorder, and Harvey Wells, captain of guards of Al Kader shrine, Portland, met with the local committeemen.

A parade, including all members of the local Shrine club, will meet a special train from Portland at the Oregon Electric depot at 10:45 o'clock Monday morning. The train will leave Portland at 8 o'clock. Included in the Portland delegation of between 200 and 300 shriners will be the Al Kader band, canters, dancing girls and patrol.

5000 ARE EXPECTED
The Salem patrol and delegation of 100 will be picked up en route, as will Shriners from way points. Eugene shriners report a delegation coming and the estimated attendance, including local Masons, is 5000.

The parade will disperse at Bryant park, where the majority of the festivities will be staged. At noon a picnic luncheon will be served under the direction of Mrs. E. E. Mason, F. H. Pfeiffer, and nine committees of local women.

At 1 o'clock the speaking program will begin. Mayor George Baker of Portland has been designated orator of the day. On the program is also F. H. Pfeiffer, Frank S. Grant, while either Mayor Percy A. Young or District Attorney L. G. Lewelling of Albany will represent the local club. At 1:30 o'clock a concert will be given by Al Kader band.

AMUSEMENTS ARE PLANNED
Following the speaking, amusement stunts by the dancing girls, an exhibition drill by the Salem patrol in new uniforms, children's contests and games and dancing in the Bryant Park pavilion, in which a dancing floor brought from Brownsville has been installed, will fill the afternoon.

At the Bryant Park swimming pool Miss Helen Hicks, Northwest champion swimmer; Miss Virginia Pembroke, Oregon state champion; Miss Thelma Payne, national champion; "Bud" Douglas and Chester Carlol, Northwest state champions, will give fancy diving and swimming exhibitions.

The evening will be devoted to a Masonic dance at the Albany armory.

During the afternoon a motion picture matinee will be in progress at one theatre, while another showhouse will be kept open as a recreation center.

RAIN PROVISION MADE
In the event of rain the theatres, the armory, the Masonic Temple and the Albany Community House will be employed in housing the visitors and will be the amusement centers.

The Al Kader band will give concerts at the park and wherever the crowds assemble; the canters will sing at the park and matinee. The Al Kader patrol will also take a prominent part in the entertainment program.

Arrangements by the Albany Shrine club are being completed by 29 committees under the leadership of C. F. Hill, chairman of the general committee.
