High pressure continues in the eastern states and in the Gulf states and lower Mississippi valley, and a high pressure area is apparently central off the California coast. Over the remainder of the country the pressure is low, the lowest readings being in Southeastern Idaho. Precipitation has occurred in the lower Missouri and upper Mississippi valleys, and at a few stations in Texas, Nevada, California, Washington, British Columbia and Alberta. The weather is much cooker in Wyoming, North Dakota, Montana and the adjacent Canadian territory, but over the greater part of the United States the temperature remains above normal. The greatest excess in temperature is in Southeastern Idaho.


