

COUNTY SHERIFFS AND CLERKS WILL MEET NOV. 9-10

Sheriff T. M. Hurlburt, president of the Sheriff's Association of Oregon, and Joseph W. Beveridge, president of the County Clerks' Association of Oregon, announced today that the state conventions of both organizations will be held in Portland November 9 and 10, during the Pacific International Livestock exposition.

The dates set are for Thursday and Friday. The livestock exposition opens the Saturday before and ends the Saturday after.

The sheriffs will discuss the crime wave and methods of catching criminals who flee from Portland to upstate points or from upstate points to the city," said Sheriff Hurlburt.

Federal Prohibition Director Linville has expressed a wish to meet with the sheriffs and will be given a chance to advance any plans he has for stamping out the traffic in moonshine.

Sheriff Hurlburt stated that his purpose in calling the convention during the livestock exposition was so there would be a double attraction in Portland for the sheriffs. The convention will be in session mornings only, leaving plenty of time for attendance at the exposition.

DEFENDANT DISCARDS MILK FOR COTTON TO FACE JUDGE

Though Hattie Westmoreland, negro, was said to have been dressed in rich silks and furs when she was arrested in Meier & Frank's store on a charge of stealing a pair of silk hose, she appeared in unpressed and ragged cotton when she appeared before District Judge Bell to plead Saturday. Because of her apparent poverty she was allowed to go on her own recognizance.

The case was set for hearing Monday, but the defendant did not appear. Her attorney, Morris Goldstein, said he would enter a technical plea of guilty for her if the case would be continued. John Ericson, deputy district attorney, objected. Goldstein said he would demand a jury if the case went to trial. The trial was set for Monday.

EARL CIPER, WANTED FOR LARCENY, TAKEN IN SEATTLE

Earl Ciper, wanted in Portland for larceny by bailer, has been arrested in Seattle, according to word received at the sheriff's office. Ciper had a bad name on the books in the district attorney's office. Although only a little over 18, he has been up on charges of speeding, vagrancy, receiving stolen property and burglary in a dwelling house. In the present case he is alleged to have purchased a car from the Miller Motor Car company and driving to Central Oregon before the car was paid for. The car was finally recovered but Ciper got away for the time being.

COURT REPORTER QUILTS TO ENTER BUSINESS CAREER

Pat Allen, who has been court reporter in Circuit Judge Stapleton's court for some time, has laid aside his shorthand pad and launched into the business world. Allen is one of the incorporators of the Torrey Refrigeration Sales company, incorporation papers for which were filed Monday. He will be vice-president and general manager. Other incorporators are W. F. Kettenbach, president, and T. W. Hughes, secretary and treasurer. The company is capitalized at \$10,000. Its offices are in the Wilcox building.

Annual Clackamas Fair Is to Open in Canby Wednesday

Oregon City, Sept. 13.—The annual Clackamas county fair will open Wednesday morning at Canby for four days, with every indication of a banner exhibition. The dates were advanced this season to assure dry weather, and the splendid crop progress in the county assures a fine agricultural display. In every department, especially the livestock and poultry, there is to be an increased showing.

Since last year the grounds and buildings have been materially improved. Among the features of the fair this year will be a wild west round-up, with riders and ropers from Klamath Falls. Horse racing will also be a head-liner, as the track at Canby is good.

Wednesday is opening day, and Thursday is Oregon City day at the fair. Secretary David Long reports that special events have been planned for each of the four days of the show.

Divorces Granted In Oregon City Far Exceed Marriages

Oregon City, Sept. 13.—Exceeding marriage licenses by more than 300 in the past five years, 1496 divorces have been granted in Clackamas county from 1916 to 1920, according to figures compiled by Deputy County Clerk Guy Pace. During the same period 1177 marriage licenses were issued. The greater majority of the marriage licenses have been granted to county people, while approximately but eight of 10 divorces have been filed by residents of the county. The proximity of Oregon City to Portland is held responsible for the high percentage of divorces, as many Portland people prefer the comparative seclusion of the county courts to the Multnomah courts. In only one year since 1916 did marriages exceed divorces. This was in 1917, when marriages, due to war conditions, totaled 219 and divorces 203. A large percentage of the couples divorced here have been married at Vancouver, Wash.

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Salem Postoffice Allotted \$10,000 For Improvement

Salem, Sept. 13.—Ten thousand dollars has been allotted by the postal department to the improvement of the Salem postoffice, according to information contained in a telegram received by Senator McNary here this morning. The improvement, according to Postmaster Hackett, is to consist of a concrete or tile annex to the present building, affording an additional 1500 square feet of floor space.

The allotment comes as a result of a long fight for improvements to the local office, the needs of which have been variously estimated at from \$60,000 to \$150,000, the latter figure representing the recommendation of J. W. Roberts, supervising superintendent of the postal department, who inspected the needs of the local office several months ago.

Bids on the improvement will be called for in October. It is expected, and work started as soon thereafter as feasible.
