

Cuban Tourists in Caravan Travel in Car and 2 Trucks

Automobile tourists all the way from Cuba were among the arrivals Monday at the municipal camp ground. Mr. and Mrs. George Allen and their four children, George Jr., Chico, Adolphina and Arthur, arriving in a touring car and two trucks, the car and one of the trucks bearing Texas tags and the other truck bearing a Colorado tag.

"We came by boat to Galveston and from there we went to San Antonio by train, where we were outfitted, but by the time we got up to Colorado we found we needed another truck, so we got it there," said Mr. Allen. "We are out for a year and we want to be comfortable. We left San Antonio July 18.

"I went to Cuba during the Spanish-American war and did not leave until this trip. I married there. Our children have not been in this country before, but they are good Americans and are already in love with the country. They found much to marvel at, at first, but they are getting accustomed to the new sights and scenes now. We will spend the winter in California and will then go to Florida. I have to go back to Cuba in July on business and until I return we probably will not decide definitely where we will locate, but I expect it will be some place in the South, as we are so accustomed to heat that we have been cold almost all the time since we started. We thought we would perish in Colorado, but it turned out to be pretty chilly here this morning.

SPECULATION BRINGS DOWNFALL.
"We like Cuba and for the last 25 years it has offered fine business possibilities, but speculation in sugar was Cuba's downfall and during the war when the price of sugar went to such an abnormal figure, the financial bottom fell out of the country and as sugar and tobacco are the chief industries, it does not seem to relieve its economic troubles. The three large banks, each with from 40 to 50 branches, and 10 or 15 smaller banks, were all loaning money right and left, some of them loaning up to as high as 15 cents a pound. Well, when sugar dropped to four cents, you can imagine what happened. Every bank failed, a conservative estimate placing the loss at \$400,000,000. As is usually the case, the small depositors were the big sufferers. Things are still very bad. I understand that last year's sugar crop has not yet been marketed. Hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of sugar and tobacco are raised on the island annually."

TRAVEL TIDE TURNS
"It's funny how the tide of travel has reversed in the last few weeks," said O. R. Brady, one of the efficient superintendents of the camp grounds. "During July and up until the middle of August, virtually all of them Eastern travelers and those from the Middle West had come west by the Santa Fe trail and had come up through California and were on their way to Canada, the Yellowstone and Colorado, but since that time they are nearly all headed toward California for the winter or to remain permanently, having come over the northern route, visiting the national parks enroute."

"We have been out two and a half months and we have had fine weather," said L. L. Dawson, arrived Saturday afternoon. "We are on our way to California for the winter, but we are surely favorably impressed with the

gets so cold in the winter that we have decided to try California and are on our way to Anaheim to make our home." The party included Mr. and Mrs. W. J. "I have been in the mercantile business for 18 years, so I am always interested in the price of staple commodities and I must say that your prices are considerably higher than ours," said O. L. Hartley of Hannibal, Mo. "I paid 50 cents a pound for bacon this morning, with us it is 28 cents. In the 5 and 10 cent store the same chocolates that we sell for 30 and 25 cents a pound are selling at 60 cents. Bananas are 20 and 25 cents a dozen with us and here they are 60 and one place they were 80 cents. Sugar is the one thing that I have found to be the same price and we pay a dollar higher freight than you do."

FINDS HIGHWAY WONDERFUL

"I want to say, though, that you have a beautiful city. Your Columbia river highway is surely wonderful. Some one told us that the drive to Astoria is finer, but I don't see how it can be. I spent an hour down on the waterfront this morning watching the big ocean steamers and I tell you they afford a thrill to a middle western man like me."

"Fifty miles will cover every inch of untouched road between here and Denver," said F. C. Keenan. "By that I mean, road that has had nothing whatever done to it. There is a short stretch

of this in the Blue mountains and there is some bad road in Wyoming, but they are working on it at both ends of the line, and this beautiful country is well worth any hardships one has to endure."

"We like Wyoming all right, but the Mrs. has to get to a lower altitude, so we have decided to try it here a while," said John Larson of Greybull, Mont. "We have been near Salem picking hops for a week and we earned \$50, which isn't so bad, but I guess we will get a little house and settle down in Portland. Greybull is a refinery town and although it has a population of only 25,000, it has a monthly payroll of \$200,000. Four years ago there were

only 300 people in the town, so you see what a wonderful growth it has had."
