

Portland Boxing Commission Calls Off Bouts: Tilden Favored to Win Net Title Again

Boxing Body Fails to Pick Matchmaker

INABILITY of Frank Loneragan and Dr. Geller to attend Wednesday night's business session of the Portland boxing commission resulted in the postponement of the selection of a new matchmaker to succeed Bobby Evans until next Monday evening.

The commissioners, however, accepted the resignation of Walter B. Honeyman and Bobby Evans and ratified the appointment of Joe Wood as a member of the commission. Dr. E. C. McFarland was named to succeed Honeyman as secretary of the commission.

Next Monday night's meeting of the commission will be held in the office of Dr. McFarland. At that time it is hoped that the commissioners will select a matchmaker from the five who are after the position.

The commission went on record as favoring the matching of boys who offered their service gratis at the benefit smoker. A vote of thanks was tendered Bobby Evans by the commissioners.

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Dempsey May Box Johnson in Bout For War Veterans

Boston, Sept. 15.—The governor's council will be asked to approve a six-round bout between Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight, and the former title holder, Jack Johnson, George J. Highon, state adjutant general, announced today.

The bout would be a no-decision affair and would be held at the arena or about October 15, the proceeds to be used in relief work among the veterans.

Highon declared that he had already secured a signed contract from Johnson and that he had good reason to believe Dempsey would accept.

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Johnston Is Defeated by Bill Tilden

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 15.—(U. N.)—William T. Tilden, 3d, world's singles tennis champion, threw back his most formidable challenger, William M. Johnston of California, after losing the first set of their match here Wednesday afternoon in the fourth round of the national singles tournament. The scores were 4-6, 7-4, 6-4, 6-3. Tilden now has practically won the championship for another year. Johnston was believed to have a better than even chance to take back the title which he once held, but apparently the exertion of the battle with Vincent Richards on Tuesday, in which Johnston had to win three straight sets after losing the first two, had taken much steam out of him.

James Anderson of Australia eliminated R. Norris Williams in a match that went five sets, 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 4-4 and 4-1.

Gordon Lowe of the English Davis cup team defeated Stanley W. Pearson of Philadelphia in straight sets, 6-2, 6-2, 6-2, in the presence of Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambassador to the United States, among 15,000 other fans.

Wallace Johnson defeated Howard Kinsey, 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-1, and will meet Craig Foster in the fifth round. Francis T. Hunter, New York, eliminated Frank T. Anderson, New York, 6-4, 6-2. Willis E. Davis, San Francisco, defeated William J. Clothier, Philadelphia, 7-5, 7-7, 14-13 and 6-4, in a sensational contest.

The Tilden-Johnston battle will long be remembered as a classic of the courts, an exhibition of supreme skill. Johnston obviously was tired and stiff from his terrific fight with Richards the day before and the sun sapped his energy as he tried to go the pace set by the champion.

Johnston might have won, for he showed by the manner of taking the first set, when fresh, that he was outplaying Tilden. Following are the point scores of the Tilden-Johnston match:
