FASHIONS REALM

New York.—Narrow ties are expected to continue in favor throughout the season for men's wear. The latest bat wing ties are only about an inch and a quarter in width and the ties for wear with dinner coats are even narrower. Four-hand ties are on a three-inch graduated basis with few wide open ends shown at all.

New York.—Silk and wool knitted in blending shades such as black, white and orange or blue and tan form some of the most attractive dresses for fall. These knitted dresses usually follow the simple straight line silhouette with long sleeves and narrow ties. The neck line is usually cut in a deep V which may be closed and buttoned if desired. On one of these dresses in blue and tan, inch wide stripes of closer weave are placed at intervals and curve to give a scalloped finish at the hem line.

New York.—Look out for the felt hats, but do not overlook them. That

in the advice designers just back from Paris are giving customers. They declare that the felts in black, gray or tan, combined with velvet, will be a decided feature of this season's wear. Velvet ribbon is sometimes used on these models, laid softly on the brim edge of the mushroom types. On sailor models very short velvet strips overlapping over the side pointed brims. Quills of high color are used effectively on the dark toned felts. These in many instances are in shaded effects. Fancy pheasant feathers are extensively employed.

New York.—With the present vogue for black, it is often difficult to tell whether a costume is designed as mourning or not, but at least the new fabric employed for mourning blouses known as "alligator crepe," is not supposed to represent alligator tears. It is one of the novelty figured silk weaves with a heavy pebble surface and a pattern resembling alligator skin. This is used for collars and vests of mourning blouse and occasionally makes the deep lower portion of the waist and the lower half of the sleeves.
