Seals Hit Out Victory Over Beavers, 7-6

CHARLEY GRAHAM'S San Francisco Seals annexed their 100th victory and their twenty-first win over Portland Tuesday afternoon, noosing out Walter McCredie's Beavers, 7 to 6, in a free hitting game.

The Seals got away to a flying start when Bert Ellison homered over the right field fence with the Camm in second base in the first inning. Following Walsh's walk in the second frame, Yelle and Scott connected with Billy Plummer's delivery, two baggers and put over another tally.

Kamm's homer in the third inning, followed by singles by Ellison and O'Connell, Fitzgerald's double and Yelle's sacrifice fly, gave the Seals a 5-0 lead.

Manager McCredie put Kenneth Scott on the mound after O'Connell's single in the third and the former Washington High school hurler looked like a million dollars after the third inning. Kelly's walk, two infield outs and Ellison's single gave the Seals what proved to be the winning run in the fourth inning.

SCORE TIED IN FIFTH

It looked like the Beavers were going to be snowed under an avalanche of runs, but they came within a run, of tying the score in the fifth inning, after two men had been retired.

Poole's single, Paton's walk and Fisher's double gave the Beavers a run in the second and O'Connell's home run, his fifth in five days, resulted in another tally in the fourth. Poole's homer was the longest of the day, and he also had the shortest hit, when he walked down and two strikes on him in the fifth, he tapped a little roller in front of the plate. Jim Scott and Yelle pulled the Alphonso-Linton stunt in the hit, and Poole beat it out, chasing one run over the plate and another scored when Jim Scott threw past first base.

SEALS BLOW UP

THE ONE-WAY TRAIL

There is an old Indian trail that leads up and down, and up and down, that they call the old Apache trail. Many Indians traveled that trail, and it was the cause of many wars; and the white bones that lay along it were pleasing to the eye of the buzzard.
