

RAINS FIX SPUDS FOR WINTER USE

Now that the rains have fallen it's best not to forget that potatoes are in proper condition for winter storing. That is, if the stock has been dug since the rains.

Many are inclined to ask why potatoes from dry land sections retain their quality without rains at digging time when this is not possible of the stock from the sections where rains are liberal.

Nature has a way of maturing the potato no matter in what ground it is produced. In this section it is absolutely necessary to wait the fall rains before digging. Otherwise the stock will not keep well.

Potatoes may not be as sensationally high as some had believed, but the present outlook is for a liberal increase over the present value.

Consumers are advised to purchase Oregon potatoes or those from Washington section which grow Burbanks or similar types. The Netted Gem of the Yakima section is not so favorable a potato for the home, although the same potato grown in Oregon or nearby sections of Washington is better. The best Netted Gem potato that grows is produced in the Deschutes country of Oregon, in the vicinity of Redmond.

Visiting Farmers Will Be Taken on Tour About State

Although the first annual excursion of home-seekers from the Middle West to Oregon, which was scheduled to arrive in Ontario Thursday, is much smaller in number than first anticipated, the State Chamber of Commerce and the Union Pacific system which sponsored the tour will carry their plans through just as though the party was larger.

Advice was received today by the chamber that only eight farmers from the Middle West would be in the party. J. R. Huerter, special agent who has been planning the tour, wires that continued depression in the central section necessitated many prospective excursionists staying at home.

"When we started this campaign to bring the farmers west this spring it looked as if the period of depression would be over by fall and that a special train would have to be had to bring the home-seekers west. But conditions are

otherwise. However, I have visited 3000 farmers in the Middle West and told them personally of Oregon and have distributed 25,000 pieces of literature on Oregon."

The visitors will be taken for a tour of the farm lands of the eastern part of the state and will arrive in Portland Tuesday. Subsequently they will tour the Willamette valley and coast sections of the state.
